

## Mass for Victims of Child Abuse Is Thursday, April 20 at St. William Parish

April is Child Abuse Awareness Prevention Month, and in conjunction with the Secretariat of Child and Youth Protection of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), the Diocese of Venice will hold a Mass for Victims of Child Abuse on Thursday, April 20 at St. William Parish, 601 Seagate Drive, Naples at 8:00 a.m.

This is the tenth consecutive year this Mass will be held in the Diocese. All are encouraged to attend.

## Elease join us for a special Mass to celebrate The Teast of Divine Mercy Sunday, April 23, 2017 at 3:00 p.m.

Divine Mercy Sunday is originally based on the Catholic devotion to the Divine Mercy that Saint Faustina Kowalska reported as part of her encounter with Jesus and is associated with special promises from Jesus and indulgences issued by the Church.

This feast of Divine Mercy, as recorded in the diary of Saint Faustina, receives from Jesus himself the biggest promises of Grace related to the Devotion of Divine Mercy. In specific, Jesus states that the soul that goes to Sacramental Confession (the confession may take place some days before) and receives Holy Eucharistic Communion on that day shall obtain the total forgiveness of all sins and punishment. Additionally, the Roman Catholic Church grants a plenary indulgence (observing the usual rules) with the recitation of some simple prayers.

Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun, reported visions and visitations from Jesus and conversations with Him. He asked her to paint the vision of his Merciful Divinity being poured from his sacred heart and specifically asked for a feast of Divine Mercy to be established on the first Sunday after Easter so mankind would take refuge in Him.

"I want the image solemnly blessed on the first Sunday after Easter,



and I want it to be venerated publicly so that every soul may know about it." (Jesus' words, *Diary* 341)

On Mercy Sunday, April 10, 1991, two years prior to the beatification of Saint Faustina, Pope John Paul II spoke about Saint Faustina, relating her to his encyclical and emphasising her role in bringing the message of mercy to the world, "The words of the encyclical on Divine Mercy (Dives in Misericordia) are particularly close to us. They recall the figure of the Servant of God, Saint Faustina Kowalska. This simple woman religious particularly brought the Easter message of the merciful Christ closer to the whole world".

Saint Faustina was beatified on April 18, 1993, and canonized on April 30, 2000. Pope John Paul II, who gave approval for Divine Mercy Sunday in 2000, died

just after the Vigil of Divine Mercy Mass in his room in 2005, was declared Blessed on Divine Mercy Sunday in 2011, and he was canonized Saint John Paul on Divine Mercy Sunday, April 27, 2014.

## #ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe – Happy Easter! A Time of Renewal

A joyous and happy Easter to all of you! We are so very blessed to have you here at St. John today, whether you are a dedicated daily Mass attendee or this may be your first time in a Catholic Church. Our Parish Family lives out our mission to know, love, and serve God and our community, and a big part of that mission involves welcoming anyone and everyone to the table of our Church. As the General Manager, I want to ensure everyone has a loving moment of encounter with their faith and their fellow man here at St. John. Please remember that as you exercise Christian patience as you are leaving the parking lot, as it may take a little longer than normal.

I want to divulge something to you. I was not always as involved in the church as I am now. Fifteen years ago, I had

a major crisis of religious connection, which made me walk away from the church I grew up in. It was 2002. Along with various other programs I was involved in after 9/11 in Washington, DC, one of the tasks I had was supporting the FBI in deploying advanced technology in the field to assist with child abuse investigations. The side of humanity that I had to experience, the pure evil that emanated from these abusers, turned my stomach and soul, and made it difficult not to break down when I held my one year old son in my arms. Then, to deal with cases where priests were not only doing the same thing, but that the hierarchy of the church was as guilty in covering up these pedophiles' actions, I was enraged. My wife remembers me storming into the house, saying I would never give another cent and I would never step foot

into a church again. For years, I barely attended, and only then on "major" holidays, like today, Easter.

I know there are some of you in the pews today who may feel the same way. Or, perhaps there was no real reason you fell away from the church and have perhaps become a "CAPE" Catholic: attending Christmas, Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, and Easter. Priorities. Questions. Disconnection. Negative experiences. Those are all reasons I know people felt their faith was not necessary, or was even wrong. I can tell you, however, after years journeying from that darkness to light, the Catholic faith is not only essential to my life, it fills my soul and makes me want to be a better person on a daily basis.

Comfort those who have left their own lands to migrate to places offering hope for a better future and the possibility


## Daily Masses

We will return to the winter Mass schedule in November.

## An Empty Tomb Full of Promise


oday, we join countless people all across the world in proclaiming Jesus Is Risen! The remote cemetery of Jesus' burial has become the garden of promise, opening wide the door to the world's salvation. To the skeptic, the empty tomb could bring speculation, but to the believer, the void is filled with the endless possibilities that God had intended to bring to the world. Even Mary of Magdala thought at first there was a sinister plot in which Jesus' body had been stolen. Peter must have been completely startled to see his burial cloths discarded. His denial must have also preoccupied his mind as he wondered about what was going on. However, as soon as the beloved disciple sees the empty tomb, he remembers Jesus' words and believes that He Is Risen. Peter and Mary of Magdala did not yet understand the Scripture that Jesus had to rise from the dead.

The first Easter represents Jesus' power over sin and death. The shadow of the cross is removed by the light from the towering Easter candle, reminding each one of us that Jesus is the Light of the world! We celebrate Easter every year to remind us that our lives do not end in death. The transforming power that enabled Jesus to rise is the same transformation that is offered to us today. As we experience loss after loss, the light from our

Easter candle reminds us the road through death for our loved ones is illuminated by the light of Christ's resurrection, showing them to their final dwelling.

As communities gather to celebrate the resurrection of the Lord, they gather as a changed community. Babies will experience their first Easter this year whilst others will occupy the seat of the Church, mourning the loss of a loved one who celebrated the paschal feast last year. However, Easter reminds us that such people are still with us in the communion of saints that gather around the altar every time we offer the sacrifice. How is this possible? It is all possible because of Jesus' resurrection.

The resurrection represents a promise for each one of us. One day people will mourn our loss just as people mourned over Jesus' death. We will be laid to rest just as Jesus was. However, we will share in the new life that Jesus experienced as he arose from the dead – that is God's promise to us. Until that moment, we are called to live as Jesus lived. We are invited to share in his divine life by loving one another with unconditional love, helping the poor, and living our lives with the compassion of Jesus. In order to be people of the resurrection, we have to put into practice the things that we preach. Our acts of love, kindness, and selfless giving, are the acts that open wide the gates of eternity to each one of us. Such is the gift of resurrection!


