



A Capital Campaign for Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church

Continued Needs of Our Parish Family and Campus

While we are excited for the expansion of the capabilities of our Parish Family with the Pulte Family Life Center, and all the new programs we are establishing, part of our Build Our Future, Serve Our Past Capital Campaign illustrates a continued need. With a 25-year old church, other aging facilities, and grounds that require new safety lighting and care, we have a significant need for renewal of our campus. Our Capital Planning Committee, made up of leadership members of our Parish Family from the Finance Council, Pastoral Stewardship Council, and Buildings and Grounds Council, have identified the key and essential areas that we have to prioritize.

Not surprisingly, these needs are essential efforts that were already identified in our Capital Campaign, and so we have some of the resources allocated for their successful execution. We continue to have the opportunity to receive your gifts as nonassessable by the Diocese through March of 2018, so every dollar you provide to the campaign will go to our efforts. We wanted to communicate the top five priorities in case there is something that resonates with you, if you have not yet given:

- 1. Roof for the Church At 25 years old, the church roof has outlived its lifespan. This essential renovation will include the new metal roof system for our campus, which not only lasts longer, requires less maintenance, and costs less, it will follow our new "look and feel" for St. John to our most important building.
- Roof for the Parish Activity Center The newly renamed Parish Activity Center (formally known as the Parish Life Center, or PLC) had a flat roof replacement last year, which stopped several leaks and shored up the majority of the building's spaces. However, there are several sections of the roof that are traditional peaked roof, and those should be replaced as soon as possible.
- 3. Ballroom Renovation We have only received a small amount of funds via our campaign specifically to renovate the Ballroom. This heavily-used room is expansive and serves to support almost all the events of our Parish Family, from Big Band Dances to Vacation Bible School to Saint Patrick's Day Celebrations. Not only does it desperately need a face-lift, it requires a new dance floor to support the hundreds of dances that occur every year.
- 4. New Library We have a specific new Library planned as part of the Capital Campaign. This comfortable and cozy location will be housed in the Claussen Center, where the old Youth Room has been. By expanding the room on either side, and including physical book storage, electronic library services, small group discussion space, and cubbies for studying and tutoring, this location will support every level of learning for our Parish Family.
- 5. Parking Lots We have a major renovation for our front parking lot which will increase the total amount of parking spots, as well as make it easier to enter and leave, but we still need to implement new lighting and surveillance systems that will ensure we have a safe place for all of us to park and enjoy the campus of St. John. There are three parking lots that we will be renovating, so additional lighting for the middle and back lots needs to be addressed.

This Weekend We Celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday

This weeknd is Divine Mercy Sunday with a special Mass at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday with the chaplet. Divine Mercy Sunday is originally based on the Catholic devotion to the Divine Mercy that Saint Faustina Kowalska reported as part of her encounter with Jesus and is associated with special promises from Jesus and indulgences issued by the Church.

This feast of Divine Mercy, as recorded in the diary of Saint Faustina, receives from Jesus himself the biggest promises of Grace related to the Devotion of Divine Mercy. In specific, Jesus states that the soul that goes to Sacramental Confession (the confession may take place some days before) and receives Holy Eucharistic Communion on that day shall obtain



the total forgiveness of all sins and punishment. Additionally, the Roman Catholic Church grants a plenary indulgence (observing the usual rules) with the recitation of some simple prayers.

The Chaplet will begin at 3:00 p.m. followed by Mass on Sunday, April 23. One does not have to be present at the liturgy to obtain the indulgence.

Attendance at this Mass fulfills the Sunday obligation.

The Chaplet of The Divine Mercy

How to Recite the Chaplet

The Chaplet of Mercy is recited using ordinary rosary beads of five decades. The Chaplet is preceded by two opening prayers from the Diary of Saint Faustina and followed by a closing prayer.

1. Make the Sign of the Cross

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

2. Optional Opening Prayers

You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us.

(Repeat three times) O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fountain of Mercy for us, I trust in You!

3. The Our Father

Our Father, Who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name; Thy kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil, Amen.

4. The Hail Mary

Hail Mary, full of grace. The Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou amongst women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death, Amen.

5. The Apostle's Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was

conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; He descended into hell; on the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there He will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

6. The "Eternal Father" (bead before each decade)

Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

7. On the Hail Mary (small beads of each decade)

For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

8. Repeat for the remaining four decades

Saying the "Eternal Father" (6) on the "Our Father" bead and then 10 "For the sake of His sorrowful Passion" (7) on the following "Hail Mary" beads.

9. Conclude with Holy God (repeat three times)

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

10. Optional Closing Prayer

Eternal God, in whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion — inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase Your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to Your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself.





A Peaceful Intrusion


ince the Age of Enlightenment, the world has continued its quest to bring reason to and find answers for the questionable aspects of life. People persist in seeking wisdom and pondering the questions concerning existence and life itself. Many suggest that the Western world is, at the moment, in a spiritual crisis because it insists on building itself on a material framework. Others propose that we are standing at the threshold of a new spiritual revolution because of the resurgence of people seeking "alternative spiritualities". Why is this so? It seems that deep within our human nature there is a hunger to know more. While there are people who live superficial lives and will only believe what they see, there are still others who want to go deeper and who realize that there is a divine plan at work.

In today's gospel, we find the disciples locked away in a room, imprisoned by their uncertainties and fears. These people cannot see Jesus with their eyes and fail to recognize that resurrection brings promise. Thomas externalizes his thoughts and lack of belief, asking for physical proof. Jesus immerses himself into their doubts by peacefully intruding in the room of uncertainty. The hope that he offers them is the gift of peace. He

breathes the Holy Spirit upon their lives, giving the power to forgive sins and the courage to live through the moments of his passion, death, and resurrection. Jesus empowers

Thomas to make his affirmation of faith by reassuring him of his presence in the world. Even today, Thomas' affirmation of "My Lord and my God" continues to come from the prayerful and sometimes reluctant believers who seek the "why" of life

The reality is that the world does not need to keep on seeking. The answer has already come and is here. The gift of the resurrection offers hope to the unreasonable reality of death. Jesus *continues to be with us* as we invoke his name in every situation in which we find ourselves. At the end of the gospel reading we are told that there were many other signs, signs so numerous that they could not be recorded in this single book. The Fourth Evangelist was telling us that there was much more to Jesus' story. In the same way, there are still signs of His presence to be found among us. He promised us that he will be with us until the end of the world even in our weakest moments, when we feel afraid or alone. Our belief in his promise brings the blessing of God to our lives. Jesus tells us: "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." Trusting in such wisdom will ultimately bring the peaceful intrusion of Jesus into our lives.

A Note About Sacramental Preparation





St. John CYO at Florida Everblades Final Game


