The Convocation of Catholic Leaders: The Joy of the Gospel

Fr. John Offers His Contemplations on the Recent Convocation of Catholic Leaders

The Joy of the Gospel in America

"Evangelii Gaudium" [The Joy of the Gospel], an apostolic exhortation, written by Pope Francis in 2013, was the subject of discussion for the Convocation of Catholic Leaders in Orlando from July 1 to July 4. Pope Francis has clearly called all of the Church, lay and clerics alike, to ponder how we can be proclaimers of the gospel in the midst of the modern world. This was a monumental gathering of the Church in America. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops consult with a body of lay advisers on a regular basis, asking them for their input on various topics. However, there was something different about this meeting. This was a first time for Catholics leaders to listen and converse on a plethora of topics to make sense of the gospel within the realities of life. The convocation challenged all of its participants to "Go to the

Peripheries", where we find Christ waiting for us. Bishops admitted openly that the Catholic Church has not done enough to make this a reality. The various keynote speakers said that Christ is waiting for us in the poor, the outcast, and the forgotten. They called on Catholic leaders to be missionary disciples in the important tasks to reach people on the margins of society.

The discussion points were clear and frank. Much discussion was given on the topic of embracing Spanish Speaking Catholics, African American Catholics, and Asian Catholics through the United States. Acknowledgments were made regarding ostracizing ethnic groups that live within the parish communities throughout North America. Some bishops acknowledged that diocesan offices were many times remiss in representing the varied ethnic groups in their administrative offices. There was a clear call to all of us to promote the

beauty of the Gospel and Catholic Social teaching in the way that we lead our various communities. Following the example of Pope Francis in regard to the mission of mercy, we were being invited to engage ourselves in accompanying those living on the peripheries. This involves accompanying migrants, refugees, and their families as they flee poverty and try and establish a better life.

Our parishes are being challenged to offer the hospitality that Christ calls us to (Matthew 25:38, 40) by offering generosity and support to the stranger. Our ministries are to reflect such hospitality, inclusion, and solidarity. After all, the Church in its essence is universal in nature, and reflects the multiplicity of communities.

The Convocation also dealt with topics addressing violence and racism, the reality of broken families and divorce, the disconnect of the youth from the Church, the growing number of those who do not identify with any faith, the growing number of fallen away Catholics, women who feel that their voice is not being heard in the Church, the discrimination and isolation of the LGTB community, and those who sit in the pews every Sunday feeling disconnected to the Church and her mission.

So, what did I take away from this meeting? This convocation reminded all of us that we need to go back to the beginning and become radical intentional disciples of Jesus. This means that we have to know Jesus and manifest his presence in the way that we deal with others. In concrete terms, it means that we follow the example of Jesus and his public ministry. Jesus accompanied the people who lived on the peripheries of his day, that is, the poor, the broken, the blind, the crippled, the leprous, the lost, the prostitutes, the tax collectors, the drunkards and the sinners. Jesus had the ability to meet people where they were at. He was gentle, merciful, and loving with

#ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe – Financial Report of Saint John the Evangelist: Income Focusing on Mission

As many of you who have glanced at my meandering contemplations on this page over the years know, I am particularly passionate about the Mission of St. John: To Know, To Love, and To Serve God in His Church and Our Community. It has been a driving force of mine to renew and restructure every facet of our Parish Family to focus on this mission, to enable all of us to live it in our hearts and souls with our actions. From creating and shepherding a Safe Environment without loopholes either physically (new lighting for the entire campus) or organizationally (with every Ministry committed to the safety of the constant flow of children and adults on our campus), to renewing the programmatic focus of the church to CYO and CAO, we have all worked together to achieve the vision Fr. John has laid out for us.

Nowhere is our transformation more tangibly visible than in our financial environment. Over the past 3 years, we have worked diligently to establish a transparent, efficient, and mission-focused financial organization. We have closed some

loopholes, and accounted for income and expenses on efforts like the Memorial Garden. It is, quite honestly, an honor and privilege to be able to serve you with the gifts of our Parish Family, and I take this responsibility extremely seriously, as do all our clergy and staff. This week, I wanted to provide an assessment of the income of our Parish Family for Fiscal Year 2017 (from July 2016 to June 2017). Next week, we will discuss the Expenses from that same timeframe.

St. John had yet another astronomical year. The Total Income of the Parish

was \$4,759,563.72. I think we all need to sit back and think about just how much good we have done with these resources. There are not many parishes in the country that have this level of resources to positively act in the interest of our faith. Hundreds of thousands of dollars have gone to feed people all around the world. Still other hundreds of thousands have gone to clothe, shelter and support people right in Naples Park next door, in Immokalee, and internationally, from Jamaica to Africa

to the Middle East. This number includes the gifts to renew our church and develop the Life Center, taking care of our church as well. Truly, we are serving God in every way possible with the gifts of your generosity in ways directly focused on our mission.


This huge number includes many facets of income for our church, including rentals, Faith Formation classes, the Capital Campaign, and most importantly, our weekly and special giving, called the Offertory. We had anticipated last year that our Offertory would be reduced by about 5% due to the Capital Campaign. We were all surprised that it actually increased 3% from 2015 to 2016. So, we again anticipated a 5% dip this year for the continued campaign gifts we have received. In FY2017, our total Offertory was \$2,025,518.02, exactly the 5% decrease from last year we were anticipating. That is completely normal when we have gathered nearly \$7 million in the past two years

for our Capital Campaign. Even with this change, we have still seen a 6% income increase since 2014, which is very impressive growth.

There are several interesting take-aways on our Offertory giving this year for me. The first is that we increased our Easter income by \$5,000 from last year, a clear illustration of larger attendance, even with the later timing of Easter. This fact, along with this chart showing the monthto-month giving over the past few years, showcases that we have much more stable income monthly, and that our Parish Family

can effectively plan our financial environment and expenses, which we will talk more about next week.

Words cannot express how blessed I feel to be on this journey with all of you and your continued gifts, prayers, support, and most importantly, your actions of joy, mercy, respect and love that are our Catholic Faith. those who needed comfort, healing, strength, and hope. Jesus afforded to those on the peripheries the chance for redemption and a new beginning. He said to those criticizing him for his outreach, "Go and learn the meaning of the words, 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice' (Matthew 9:13).

The example of Jesus has always spoken to me as one of Jesus' disciples. Just as people did not measure up to the obligations of the religious Law in Jesus' day, there are people today who fall short in the same way. Many people among us are struggling because of where life has taken them. Many people have gone through the heartbreak of divorce as a result of years of abuse or lack of love. The divorced try to pick up the pieces of their lives. Sometimes they find love in another who shows them the way in which God had intended them to be loved. There are some divorced situations that cannot be reconciled in the external forum of the Church (the annulment process) because of certain circumstances. These people find themselves in our pews invited to the Sacred Table, but feel rejected when they are told they are not permitted to receive the Sacred Meal (Communion). Many of these leave the Church. Families are broken and need support. Individuals who identify themselves as LGTB are looking for parents to accept them for who they are, and looking for support from their Church. Many feel disenfranchised by the way in which the Church deals with their situation. There are people in our community living with disabilities which the world often sees has weakness. Those with disabilities, whether they be mental or physical, are still part of our community and our parish

structures need to embrace them. There are people of all ages inside and outside of the Church looking for that moment of encounter with God. Somehow and in some way, the Church in her mission must reach them. People among us feel isolated because of depression or the constraints of old age. Those who are single feel awkward trying to experience fellowship in their community of faith. Migrants around us feel rejected and ostracized because of the negative press given them by sweeping generalizations. The working poor feel all alone. Many live trying to figure out what their purpose in life is, while others are content going through life with eyes wide shut. Many of our brothers and sisters live with the reality of addiction and others mental illness. Their plights normally end in court, prison, or sometimes death. In all these situations, Jesus is calling us to live intentionally as his disciples. Just as he reminded the faith community of his day, "You impose on people burdens hard to carry, but you yourselves do not lift one finger to touch them" (Luke 11:46), he reminds us too that we have a responsibility as a Church to accompany every person with our help and love.

While doctrine and dogma will remain unchanged, our pastoral vision and approaches need to change. We live in different times and are challenged by new realities. People often fall short sometimes because of choice or other times due to no fault of their own. However, we have been blessed with the advances in science, development of thought, and the reflection of faith to respond to situations in new ways. Just as Jesus reminds us that approaching God in new ways by the new wine, new wineskins concept (Matthew 9:14-17, Mark 2:21-22 and Luke 5:33-39), Pope Francis reminds all of us that how we approach the law has to change. He states, "what does this mean, that the law has changed? No!". It means, rather, "that the law is at the service of man, that it is at the service of God, and for this reason man must have an open heart". The attitude of those who say "this is how it's always been done...", in reality, is born from "a closed heart". Instead, "Jesus told us: 'I will send the Holy Spirit and he will lead you to the full truth". Thus, "if your heart is closed to the newness of the Holy Spirit, you will never reach the full truth". Additionally, "your Christian life will be a half-and-half life, a patched up life, mended with new things but on a structure that is not open to the Lord's voice: a closed heart, because you are not capable of changing the wineskins". (Pope Francis, Domus Sanctae Marthae, 18 January, 2016). This ministry of accompaniment means that we approach the mission of the Church in new ways by taking a risk. It also means that we might be criticized for doing it. Nonetheless, it is what Jesus calls us to do. It requires of us an open and generous heart.




Fr. Len (Gioeli) has returned to Naples and St. John.



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

illuminated the world of the three apostles. When Moses and Elijah appeared, it was a confirmation that the consolation of Israel had finally arrived. God's voice coming forth from the cloud was the crowning of the theophany (experience of God), revealing the Father's pleasure in His Son and giving the apostles the command to listen to Jesus.

The story of the Transfiguration might appear to be out of our reach. However, we are reminded today to look for Jesus' presence in society today. Hidden in the fabric of everyday life is the presence of the one who calls us to imitate him — the Lord of life with whom the Father is well pleased. We are called to listen closely to Jesus' request and pay attention to his summons in the needs of the world around us. When we are challenged to reach out to someone in our family or neighborhood, we have the opportunity to transform the broken realities that we encounter. It is then that Jesus is made manifest through us.




Our acts of love can make all things possible. Once we open ourselves to the forgiveness and healing of God in the way that we interact with one another, God is truly pleased with us.

The reality Jesus offers us is an optimistic overview of life. Jesus never makes any judgment against the sinner; rather he sees their situation as an opportunity for redemption and transformation. When he meets

the disturbed, the sick, or the outcast, Jesus sees this as an occasion for God's glory to shine through the brokenness.

The Transfiguration revealed the presence and glory of God to Peter, James, and John. It is a reminder that there is a deeper reality at work in the world. The apostles were simply regular people who experienced extraordinary things. These men chose to journey with Christ by setting everything aside to follow him. In this event, Jesus' image is transfigured into the brilliance of light — a sight the apostles would recall after the resurrection. As we celebrate the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord, we too are invited to set aside those things which are nonessential so that may allow God to lead us to the recognition of his presence in our experience. We are also invited to "transfigure" ourselves as we give witness to our transformation through the gospel.





Pre-school Catechism Class Helps Children Grow Closer to God

The Saint John the Evangelist pre-school catechism class, based on the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, Level 1 program, is about to begin its fourth year! The program will be offered to pre-schoolers ages 3-6 on Wednesday afternoons from 12:15 until 2:00 p.m. The program is under the direction of Charlotte A. Williams.

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd's (CGS) religious formation of the child is rooted in the Bible and Liturgy and is founded on the educational principles of Maria Montessori. The children gather in the "atrium", which is a room prepared for them containing simple yet beautiful materials that they use to help them absorb the most essential proclamations of our Catholic faith.

One of the key principles of CGS is to "Help me (child) to grow closer to God by myself." This is done by incorporating the "work" of the child in the presentations to the child. In this approach, it helps the child to fulfill their desire to "work". Practical life activities such as pouring, hand washing, flower arranging etc... are also incorporated into the program. These activities involve concentration. Concentration in turn aids in contemplation. The goal of the catechism presentations is to foster contemplation.

The catechesis is administered through a series of presentations that have proven to be the most essential to an age group. Some of the themes include: Liturgical colors, the Altar and its articles, Advent and Christmas (Infancy narratives), the Holy Bible, The Kingdom of God Parables (the mustard seed, the merchant and pearl, the leaven) the Parable of the Good Shepherd, the Cenacle and Last Supper, Baptism, the Liturgy of Light, Easter and Pentecost. Once a child is given a presentation, the child is free to work independently and choose what he/she would like to work with.

One unique aspect of the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is that adults are drawn to and nourished by many of the presentations that are given to the children, just as the children are.

Saint John the Evangelist is blessed to have Charlotte A. Williams and her faithful assistants leading this program for our preschoolers. There are still spots available for this year-long class that begins on Wednesday, September 20 and follows the 2017-2018 Faith Formation Calendar. 

All allegations of child sexual abuse by diocesan personnel, including clergy, should be reported to law enforcement, the Florida Department of Children and Families and to the Victim Assistance Coordinator. 
