

Parking Lot Renovation Begins Soon



Please join me in congratulating Tricia on her promotion and leadership for our Parish Family!


#ToLove, #ToServe - CAO Leadership and New Program Kicks Off with Saturday Night Fever



Courage to Live the Truth

an we dare to imagine what it was like to accompany Jesus during his ministry on earth? This itinerant preacher chooses ordinary people to reveal the extraordinary reality of God to the world. In last week's gospel, Jesus commissions the Twelve to go and minister to the people of Israel. In today's gospel, Jesus tells these humble men to take courage and not to be afraid of anyone or anything.

The apostles had every reason to have fear. As they walked along the dusty roads of Galilee and climbed the mountainous paths, they listened to an unconventional wisdom that challenged the world to embrace God in a new way. Jesus' message was to hold fast to the marriage covenant, to turn away from sin, to love one's enemies, to give alms, to pray, to abandon one's self to God. Jesus taught the people that to judge would

ultimately bring judgment and to follow him meant to pass through the narrow gate. Jesus healed many and brought peace to those whose spirits were crippled and possessed. Such was Christ's love — to heal and restore the people's relationship with the Father in heaven. The wisdom he shared, however simple, restorative, and loving, was still too difficult for the religious teachers to bear. These men loathed the radical approach Jesus took to communicate God's message. It challenged their conventional wisdom and forced them to consider the complexity of humanity in relation to faith. The religious teachers looked down on sinners, the sick, the helpless, the poor, and the possessed. They considered these people to be out of favor with God. Jesus embraces them and teaches them that they are God's possession. The apostles would have certainly been aware of the opposition to Christ's message. However dangerous, Jesus' wisdom offered luminosity to those living in the darkness of sin and doubt.


Jesus challenges the Twelve to share his Truth in love openly and without fear. Proclaiming this radical truth would cost them their lives. Jesus points out that it is better to lose the physical rather than to lose one's soul. In living out Jesus' message of right relationship and concern for others would be to witness to the Truth. We are challenged today to experience for ourselves what it means to live in this Truth — to embrace the sinful condition of the world and to speak the truth. What does this mean? It means that we confront the sinful structures of the world that diminish the dignity of humanity. We, as Church, must uphold the rights and dignity of the working poor, the hungry, and the abandoned. We must challenge governments and policies that allow the vulnerable to be forgotten or denied the chance to live. It also means that we approach the sinner and the broken with unconditional love and compassion, opening them to transformation. We are asked to be the light of hope in the darkness and the voice for those who have no voice.



Prayer

Lord, help us not to be afraid. Fill our lives with courage – the courage to face the Truth – the courage to reach out to sinner – the courage to embrace the poor, the vulnerable, and the broken – the courage to live our faith in freedom, solidarity and love. Amen.

Wisdom of the Fathers



"There is an urgent need, then, to see once again that faith is a light, for once the flame of faith dies out, all other lights begin to dim. The light of faith is unique, since it is capable of illuminating every aspect of human existence. A light this powerful cannot come from ourselves but from a more primordial source: in a word, it must come from God. Faith is born of an encounter with the living God who calls us and reveals his love, a love which precedes us and upon which we can lean for security and for building our lives. Transformed by this love, we gain fresh vision, new eyes to see; we realize that it contains a great promise of fulfilment, and that a vision of the future opens up before us. Faith, received from God as a supernatural gift, becomes a light for our way, guiding our journey through time. On the one hand, it is a light coming from the past, the light of the foundational memory of the life of Jesus which revealed his perfectly trustworthy love, a love capable of triumphing over death. Yet since Christ has risen and draws us beyond death, faith is also a light coming from the future and opening before us vast horizons which guide us beyond our isolated selves towards the breadth of communion. We come to see that faith does not dwell in shadow and gloom; it is a light for our darkness.

In the Bible, the heart is the core of the human person, where all his or her different dimensions intersect: body and spirit, interiority and openness to the world and to others, intellect, will and affectivity. If the heart is capable of holding all these dimensions together, it is because it is where we become open to truth and love, where we let them touch us and deeply transform us. Faith transforms the whole person precisely to the extent that he or she becomes open to love. Through this blending of faith and love we come to see the kind of knowledge which faith entails, its power to convince and its ability to illumine our steps. Faith knows because it is tied to love, because love itself brings enlightenment. Faith's understanding is born when we receive the immense love of God which transforms us inwardly and enables us to see reality with new eyes."

Our First, Most Cherished Liberty

Amendment I: Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press....

"We are Catholics. We are Americans. We are proud to be both, grateful for the gift of faith which is ours as Christian disciples, and grateful for the gift of liberty which is ours as American citizens."

These are the opening words of the Statement on Religious Liberty published by the ad hoc committee for religious liberty of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops five years ago. They continued:


"To be Catholic and American should mean not having to choose one over the other. Our allegiances are distinct, but they need not be contradictory, and should instead be complementary."

Only a few months earlier, Pope Benedict XVI addressed the bishops of the United States and worried that religious liberty in the United States is being weakened.

"Of particular concern are certain attempts being made to limit that most cherished of American freedoms, the freedom of religion.... Here once more we see the need for an engaged, articulate, and well-formed Catholic laity endowed with a strong critical sense vis-à-vis the dominant culture and with the courage to counter a reductive secularism which would delegitimize the Church's participation in public debate about the issues which are determining the future of American society."

It is useful to note that the First Amendment does not call for the "separation of church and state" but rather that there shall be no congressionally established religion as there was/is in many countries around the world. That Amendment also prohibits any law prohibiting the free exercise of religion and the related freedom of speech.

Today, some say the West is free and prosperous in spite of our Christian heritage. However, the historical development of the concept of freedom grew out of the Judeo-Christian world view and has biblical roots.



Our only hope for avoiding tyranny is to remember the ultimate source for all authority is not any human king or president, not the high court, but the name that is above all names; the Lord.
