Breaking Ground on the Pulte Family Life Center





The Passion of the Christ is a great movie that depicts the final 12 hours of Jesus Christ in Jerusalem during his crucifixion. The term passion originates from Latin where it means suffering and pain. However, Christian theology broadened it to include the love of Christ for mankind.Now, The Passion of Christ means that he willingly suffered and died for us.

The Passion of the Christ begins from the time Judas betrayed Jesus Christ, condemnation by the Pharisees and his appearance before Pontius Pilate.


VIPs were able to sit and experience this moment of transformation. We are tremendously blessed with such active and engaged Ministries.

Jamaica Outreach Program Getting Down to Basics Is the Theme for Pocket Change Weekend, April 1 and 2

The importance of early childhood education has taken hold in the United States and is offered in hundreds of school districts in the United States. The idea is also spreading in Catholic schools in Jamaica, but in that country it is called basic schooling. In recent years the JOP has been supporting basic schools in Kingston at the parishes of St. Peter Claver, African Martyrs of Uganda and St. Pius the X. The cost of running these basic schools is roughly \$42,000 annually. Presently, the JOP support of basic schooling is \$10,000 to \$20,000 annually. Obviously, there is a shortfall in the needed funds.

We have been a main contributor to these schools providing grants for teacher salaries in the hope that parents whose children attend the schools would be able to pay tuition fees to make up the difference. While the parents appreciate the opportunity basic schools represent, many fail to meet the obligation to fund it. Since basic schooling is not mandatory in Jamaica, education is a luxury and is the first thing to let go of when discretionary spending needs trimming.

Any donation, large or small, will be greatly appreciated by those who give their all for the benefit of the children they serve. 



To See With New Eyes



o suffer the disability of blindness during Jesus' time was to suffer isolation in Judaic society. If you were born blind, you were automatically regarded as an outcast and a sinner. The Jews of Jesus' time believed that disability and illness were the fruits of sin. Therefore, it is no surprise that the whole debate of the man born blind is centered on the sins of his ancestors. Jesus' action of imparting sight to this blind man is a radical statement. By doing so, Jesus restores his place in society freeing him from the notion that his ancestors' sin will hold him captive. The blind man is given a new life through his sight and his belief in Jesus. The man born blind recognizes the giver within the gift and worships Jesus. Then Christ confronts the Pharisees reminding them that

spiritual blindness is much more devastating to the soul than physical blindness.

During this Lenten season, we are asked to focus on the spiritual blindness in our own lives. The reality is that we live in an imperfect world and we collectively add to its imperfection. Spiritual blindness is a result of personal and structural sin. Spiritual blindness bruises the soul and drains the divine imagination in each one of us. It fatigues the source of inspiration and saddens the heart. Spiritual blindness leaves a void and creates a poverty in our lives. Through the healing waters of baptism we can wash the sin from our eyes and see the world with a renewed faith. As Catholic Christians, we are invited to participate in the life of Christ by following his example of concern to others. Once we commit ourselves to the radical call of a Christian, we are asked to bring sight to those who suffer from the blindness of prejudice, those with a lack of concern for human life, and those who exploit the poor. We are

invited to open wide the eyes of our faith and see where God is ushering us to make known his presence. In the words of St. Paul in today's second reading: "You were once darkness, but now

you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light, for light produces every goodness and righteousness and truth." *Ephesians 5:8-9*

Practically speaking, spiritual sight allows us to see Christ in the needs around us. We can respond to this reality by engaging ourselves in the work of charity. As Catholics we are asked to share our treasures with those who have not. We are also asked to share our

time so that we can respond adequately to those in need. There are programs in our parishes in which we can participate. For example, the St. Vincent de Paul Society provides great opportunities to respond to the needs of the poor. Other organizations in parish life enable us to see one another as brothers and sisters journeying together in the life of Christ. Offering ourselves in ministry to the homebound and the sick opens us to the reality of Christ in the midst of suffering. By committing ourselves to the education of the youth, we are actually enabling our young people with the gift of spiritual sight as we share the message of truth. We can choose the good news over the life of sin.



Prayer

Lord, open our eyes that we may see. Lord, open our eyes and heal the blindness in us. Help us to open the eyes of the world to the reality of your presence. May we turn away from our sin and look upon the world with the vision of your truth. Amen.

Encounter Maria and Her Family



Maria de la Luz Lugo Martínez remembers what it was like growing up in Ejido Hidalgo, Mexico. "We said we were rich because we had a lot of corn, beans and animals." But now,

with few jobs and even less rain, young people — including Maria's children — are leaving the community in search of a better life.

To help families like Maria's, CRS launched a greenhouse project empowering women with meaningful work and community. Women visit their community greenhouses to grow cactuses to sell — but they also go for so much more. "At the greenhouses, we laugh, we talk, we spend time together. Sometimes we leave our homes angry or sad. But then we start working with the plants, and we forget. Talking, laughing — we forget our problems for a while," says Maria.

As the cactuses grow, so to do the economic opportunities. "We didn't believe we were going to get that far. It's a lot of joy, a lot of excitement to see so many plants flowering." The flourishing cactuses aren't the only things that give Maria pride. Even though they live far away, she still remains close to her family. "I give thanks to God that he gave me all my children and grandchildren," she says. "They give me strength and courage to work hard. My children call and say, 'Don't give up, Mom. Have faith in God.""
