

#### Saint of the week: st. andrew

St Andrew has been celebrated in Scotland for over a thousand years, with feasts being held in his honour as far back as the year 1000 AD. However, it wasn't until 1320, when Scotland's independence was declared with the signing of The Declaration of Arbroath, that he officially became Scotland's patron saint. Since then St Andrew has become tied up in so much of Scotland. The flag of Scotland, the St Andrew's Cross, was chosen in honour of him. Also, the ancient town of St Andrews was named due to its claim of being the final resting place of St Andrew

Despite his relatively humble upbringing, St Andrew was known throughout his life for being a generous man. When we talk of him today we specifically look at these traits that made him so saintly (figuratively and, later, literally). St Andrew's philosophy was incredibly simple: take what you have and share it with those less

fortunate! He became known as a strong and fair man who took every opportunity to help others whenever he could.

His fairness and generosity have always struck a chord with the Scots for thousands of years and to this day they still remain important aspects of how we treat others. Anyone who has visited Scotland can vouch that this co-operative spirit is still alive here today. If you're lost, there's always someone there happy to point you in the right direction. In fact, Scotland is known around the world for its incredibly warm welcome and friendliness. It's one of the many things that keeps people coming back to visit.

His desire to help those who are less fortunate is also embodied in the many social enterprises that are thriving across Scotland. You only have to look at the amazing success of companies like Social Bite, who are pioneering charitable causes in an unprecedented way. They're not the only ones, as Scotland is home to more than 5,600 social enterprises, with approximately 300 new enterprises starting up every year. All these incredible companies are dedicated to providing an ethical and more sustainable way of doing business and working towards helping those less fortunate and creating a fairer world.

Despite the fact that St Andrew has stood as Scotland's patron saint for



so many years, it wasn't until the 18th century that the popular celebration of his day became commonplace. What might surprise you even more is that the tradition of celebrating on November 30 was not even technically started in Scotland, but by a group of ex-pats in the USA who were keen to reconnect with their Scottish roots.

It all began with the creation of the 'St Andrew's Society of Charleston' in South Carolina was founded in 1729 by a group of wealthy Scottish immigrants. The organisation is actually the oldest Scottish society of its type in the world and was set up with one simple premise. Their goal was to adhere to St Andrew's philanthropic beliefs and they became famous throughout the region for their work assisting orphans and widows in that area.

This was followed by another society, this time in New York, which was founded in 1756. 'The

St Andrew's Society of the State of New York' is the oldest charity of any kind registered in New York and was founded by Scotsmen who were looking to relieve the poor and distressed in the town. From these seeds, St Andrew's societies have spread around the world as Scots have travelled and settled in the far reaches of the globe. They have taken with them the ideals that are all too evident in their homeland and helped spread this kindness and goodwill that St Andrew was known for.

More recently, St Andrew's Day has become more and more special to Scots and ranks as one of three major dates during the winter period. Starting off Scotland's Winter Festival each year on November 30, people across the country gather together to celebrate St Andrew and share good times. The day is usually marked with a celebration of Scottish culture, including dancing, music, food and drink, with parties going on long into the cold winter night.

#### #ToKnow, #ToServe - USCCB Leadership at 100: Passion of Our Faith for the Future

At the end of the Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis created a November 13 & 14 marked the 100th Anniversary of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, the leadership of the Church in our country. All the bishops, archbishops and cardinals attended, and they discussed the serious issues of our national culture, our faith, and the intersection of the two. One interesting theme that was clearly understood by our leadership is eerily similar to our current Capital Campaign. We must Build Our Future, while we Serve Our Past as a Church. Secretary of State of the Vatican, Cardinal Pietro Parolin, said at the outset of the Assembly Meeting of the Bishops:

Tonight I would like simply to recall the message of encouragement that the Holy Father addressed to you during your meeting last year. He noted that the great challenge

that we face is "to create a culture of encounter, which encourages individuals and groups to share the richness of our traditions and experiences, to break down walls and to build bridges. The Church in America, as elsewhere is called to 'go out' from its comfort zone and to be a leaven of communion. Communion among ourselves, with our fellow Christians, and with all who seek a future of hope"...

In this time of epochal change, that same spirit of unity is more than ever necessary, in order to confront with creativity and conviction the realities of a rapidly changing world

and the task of the new evangelization. In this regard, allow me to repeat the charge that Pope Francis laid before you during his Pastoral Visit to the United States: "The path ahead is dialogue among yourselves, dialogue with your presbyterates, dialogue with lay persons, dialogue with families, dialogue with society". Only through the unity that is forged from dialogue and encounter will you find the wisdom to rise to the challenges of the coming century with the courage and farsightedness that marked your predecessors in the century that is now ending. - http://www. usccb.org/about/leadership/usccb-general-assembly/2017november-meeting/upload/parolin-cardinal-pietroremarks-20171112.pdf

The focus of our Catholic Church was made clear by Archbishop Christophe Pierre, the Papal Nuncio to the United

What are we as bishops truly passionate about? I think this is a fundamental question so that the memory of the illustrious past of your conference gives rise to a future with Christ the Lord at the center of your ministry and the Church. At the Convocation of Catholic Leaders, Cardinal Tobin warned of a great threat to evangelization, namely spiritual slothfulness, citing Evangelii Gaudium 83:

> "And so, the biggest threat of all gradually takes shape: 'the gray pragmatism of the daily life of the Church, in which all appears to proceed normally, while in reality faith is wearing down and degenerating into smallmindedness.""

What are some things about which we should be passionate?... In July, at the Convocation of Catholic Leaders, Hosffman Ospino presented the stark reality:

In 1991 about 3 percent of the U.S. Population selfidentified as non-religiously affiliated or "nones." Today, 26 years later, about 25 percent of all people in our country self-identify as such. The trend is very clear.

We know that about 20 million people in our country who were born and raised Catholic do not self-identify as such

anymore. It is likely that many of them, especially those who are young, joined the ranks of the nones.

Bishop Barron pointed out that nearly fifty-percent of Catholics under age 30 identify as "nones". And what of the nearly 14 million Hispanics born and raised Catholic who are here but also have become "nones"? With six Catholics leaving the Church for one who enters, perhaps we could

become discouraged; however, we are a people of hope. Our hope is principally in the Lord and in the Holy Spirit.

Are we passionate about our youth? If we are, then this means being willing and open to accompanying them personally, as spiritual fathers, even if this makes demands on our time and energy. A passion, born out of love, also means providing sound catechesis and formation, so that amid the pressures of a secular culture, they can make wise choices that lead to authentic human flourishing. Love, rooted in the truth, demands that we contribute something to the culture – something of the true, the good, and the beautiful – that will support them in their journey. 



# he Word &

Ezekiel 34:11-12, 15-17 Psalm 23:1-2, 2-3, 5-6 1 Corinthians 15:20-26, 28 Matthew 25:31-46

#### The Christ of Many Faces

t is so hard to believe that we have completed another Church year once again. During this past year, we have journeyed through the gospel of Matthew, the teacher. We end the year with the great Solemnity of Christ the King and the poignant passage of the Last Judgment in Matthew's gospel. Jesus extends his reign today to include those who were normally excluded from society. Jesus tells us that whatsoever we do to our brothers and sisters, we actually do to Him. He is clearly calling us to recognize him in the midst of hunger, thirst, the stranger, imprisoned, naked, sick, and the imprisoned. Through worldly eyes this seems to be an unlikely place to find a king, but through God's eyes this is where the king of glory is

to be found and attended to.

#### **Reflection Questions**

- 1. What do you think the title "Jesus Christ the King" means?
- 2. Do you allow Jesus to rule over your life?
- 3. In what ways have you allowed Jesus to take possession of your life?
- 4. How is Jesus to be found in the midst of the world today?
- 5. What is important in your life?
- 6. Do you allow other things/people to take over your relationship with God?
- 7. How do you imagine the kingdom of God?
- 8. Do you give witness to the kingdom in the way you live my life?
- 9. What is today's gospel specifically calling you to?

Jesus is directly associated himself with a fragile and broken world. He reminds his listeners, as He does with us today, that the Son of Man will judge us according to how we have responded to the vulnerable ones around us. To fail to reach out to the needy is to fail Christ. To treat the broken with discontent and their plight is to treat Christ with discontent and apathy. The wisdom of today's parable challenged the conventional wisdom of the religious establishment of the day. The poor, sick and imprisoned were regarded as those with sin and outside the faith. Jesus gives such people the dignity of God, making them kingdom people.

If we are truly honest, we would probably say that not a lot has changed. The poor tend to be forgotten by the majority of the world. Those who are imprisoned are treated with contempt because of their crimes. Those who go hungry because of unemployment or bad domestic choices can often be looked down upon. How many of us, for example, have heard negative

comments about the migrant worker who comes to find work, but falls prey to illness and requires medical treatment? Furthermore, how many of us have heard or even made judgments about the one who cannot hold down a job and so depends on the State to feed them? When did we last welcome a stranger into our community? In essence, this is where the message of Christ challenges us to the very core of our existence. Christ is calling us to be faithful stewards of creation and the people of the world. Wherever need is perceived, God is to be found, calling us to recognize that the needy are truly our brothers and sisters. As Catholic Christians, we are challenged to be the light and leaven for all those who struggle and are vulnerable. To be faithful witnesses to the message of Jesus, we have to become the voice for the voiceless and strength for the weak.
