

#ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe -Vocations: Not Just Collars and Habits Year 2

The blessings of this Parish Family continue to support and encourage all of our community, both those of us within the walls of our church as well as the world around us. It is the calling we all have a Catholics to take our faith and turn it into positive, loving action. In fact, there is a specific word that is used to describe this call: vocation. When you hear the word "vocation", many of us immediately believe it means the calling to become a priest, or sister, brother or deacon. However, that is no longer the full definition of the word. All of us have a vocation, a calling from God. God speaks to all of us, asking us to live our life in His name and take that vocation into the world to make it a better place.

St. John is full of people living out their vocations, in ministry, in homes, and in their lives. I hope you all feel that calling from God and learn more about your own vocations. Our new Vocations Ministry will be actively engaging our community to educate us all on vocations and how we can all take an active role in our church and our world. In particular, there are four major categories of vocations: Priesthood, Religious Life, Married Life, and Single Life.

Let's focus on one this week, Married Life. Many of us have chosen that vocation, but may not have realized just what a vocation it is. In his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of Love, Our Holy Father illustrates just how important marriage is to our faith and our future:

72. The sacrament of marriage is not a social convention, an empty ritual or merely the outward sign of a commitment. The sacrament is a gift given for the sanctification and salvation of the spouses,


since "their mutual belonging is a real representation, through the sacramental sign, of the same relationship between Christ and the Church. The married couple are therefore a permanent reminder for the Church of what took place on the cross; they are for one another and for their children witnesses of the salvation in which they share through the sacrament". Marriage is a vocation, inasmuch as it is a response to a specific call to experience conjugal love as an imperfect sign of the love between Christ and the Church. Consequently,

> the decision to marry and to have a family ought to be the fruit of a process of vocational discernment.

There are challenges in married life, to be sure. If anyone is attempting to be an "ideal marriage", themselves. Instead, we are called in our vocation to love deeply, ask for forgiveness when we do wrong and give out that same forgiveness when requested, respect and honor our family members, and be open to the life that springs from

our unions. It is where we teach the future generations how those same actions should be applied in their own relationships, both personal and in society. Love, honor, and cherish.



St. Martin of Tours, (born 316, Sabaria, Pannonia, died November 8, 397, Candes, Gaul [France]; Western feast day, November 11; patron saint of France, father of monasticism in Gaul, and the first great leader of Western monasticism.

Of pagan parentage, Martin chose Christianity at age 10. As a youth, he was forced into the Roman army, but later—according to his disciple and biographer Sulpicius Severus he petitioned the Roman emperor

Julian the Apostate to be released from the army because "I am Christ's soldier: I am not allowed to fight." When charged with cowardice, he is said to have offered to stand in front of the battle line armed only with the sign of the cross. He was imprisoned but was soon discharged.

Legend holds that while he was still in the military and a catechumen of the faith, Martin cut his cloak in half to share it with a beggar. That night, he dreamed that Jesus himself was clothed with the torn cloak. When he awoke, the garment was restored. Moved by this vision and apparent miracle, Martin immediately finished his religious instruction and was baptized at age 18.

On leaving the Roman army, Martin settled at Poitiers, under the guidance of Bishop Hilary. He became a missionary in the provinces of Pannonia and Illyricum (now in the Balkan Peninsula), where he opposed Arianism, a heresy that denied the divinity of Christ. Forced out of Illyricum by the Arians, Martin



went to Italy, first to Milan and then to the island of Gallinaria, off Albenga. In 360 he rejoined Hilary at Poitiers. Martin then founded a community of hermits at Ligugé, the first monastery in Gaul. In 371 he was made bishop of Tours, and outside that city he founded another monastery, Marmoutier, to which he withdrew whenever possible.

As bishop, Martin made Marmoutier a great monastic complex to which European ascetics were attracted and from which apostles spread

Christianity throughout Gaul. He himself was an active missionary in Touraine and in the country districts where Christianity was as yet barely known. In 384/385 he took part in a conflict at the imperial court in Trier, France, to which the Roman emperor Magnus Maximus had summoned Bishop Priscillian of Ávila, Spain, and his followers. Although Martin opposed Priscillianism, a heretical doctrine renouncing all pleasures, he protested to Maximus against the killing of heretics and against civil interference in ecclesiastical matters. Priscillian was nevertheless executed, and Martin's continued involvement with the case caused him to fall into disfavour with the Spanish bishops. During his lifetime, Martin acquired a reputation as a miracle worker, and he was one of the first nonmartyrs to be publicly venerated as a saint.

Leadership - the Call to Serve

s we listen to the gospel, we find that Jesus makes no veiled attempts at putting the scribes and Pharisees in their place. Jesus' criticism of the religious leaders had been communicated by way of parable up until this point. Such criticism of the religious aristocracy brought Jesus' mission to another level. He was confronting the religious leadership with its weakness, i.e. power had become the focus of these men rather than service to the Word of God. Jesus warns his listeners to follow the observances of Moses, but not the example of the teachers. Jesus tells his listeners that it is not God's will that people be burdened by the massive constraints of the Law. He observes the fact that those entrusted with religious positions were doing nothing to help those around them. Jesus clearly preaches the ultimate teacher is God. The only true father is the Father in heaven. The Father of truth and love – the Father who is slow to anger and rich in mercy; the Father who takes away his children's burdens.

Many fundamentalists have used this gospel text to challenge the leadership of the Catholic Church. We often are asked, "Why do you call your priests 'father' when scripture states that you should not call anyone on earth your father; you have but one Father in heaven?" To approach the gospel in this way is too literal and misses the point that Jesus was intending. He was reminding the people that religious leadership is about service to God's Word, inspiring others to fall in love with the Father in heaven and listen to his commandments of love. The leader of faith should become selfless and transparent so that God may be encountered. The priest is given the title 'father' as a reminder of his mission to

bring others to God the Father and to love them as our heavenly Father does. Religious leadership should bring others to the teaching and truth that has been given to us by the Father in heaven. Sadly, there have been too many incidents within the Church's history where those entrusted with leadership have tied up heavy burdens hard to carry for the People of God. There have been priests and bishops who, through the observance of Church law and execution of Church law, have left people feeling rejected and ashamed of where their journey of life has taken them. When we fail such people, we also fail as missionary disciples of Jesus.

Since the Second Vatican Council, many have been called to leadership within the Church. Both the ministerial priesthood (clerics) and the priesthood of believers (the baptized) are asked to communicate the truth of the gospel. Together as priest and people, the Church strives to grow

in holiness as it serves humanity and the world. From the community, God calls people forth to offer their lives in humility and sacrifice, so that others may feel his saving power. Jesus is reminding us today that all of us share in the dignity of Christian leadership. We should not just be concerned about ourselves and those who are dear to us. Rather, we should be concerned with the redemption and salvation of all people. In concrete, this means that we should always have the humility to recognize that the broken reality of people's lives is really the fertile ground where God can do his work through us. Whenever we are confronted by suffering and sin, we are given an opportunity to give witness to Rabbi Jesus and follow his example of mercy and love. Our mercy and love must always come first.

You are Father in heaven. Through Jesus, You call us to serve. May your will be done, not ours. Inspire those who are called in service to the Church to lead and govern with mercy and love. Let the Truth always be communicated in love. May the ministry of the Church imbue all people with grace and Your presence. Amen

Wisdom of the Fathers



"I would like to mention another conduct typical of the scholars of the law, and I will say that there is often a kind of hypocrisy in them, a formal adherence to the law that hides very deep wounds. Jesus uses tough words; he defines them as "white sepulchers" who appear devout from the outside, but inside, on the inside...hypocrites. These are men who live attached to the letter of the law but who neglect love; men who only know how to close doors and draw boundaries. Chapter 23 of the Gospel of Matthew is very clear on this; we need to return here to understand what the Church is and what it should never be.

He describes the attitudes of those who tie up heavy burdens and lay them on other men's shoulders, but who are unwilling to move so much as a finger; they are those who love the place of honor and want to be called master. This conduct comes when a person loses the sense of awe for salvation that has been granted to him...The awe seems to fade, and this is the basis for clericalism or for the conduct of people who feel pure. What then prevails is a formal adherence to rules and mental schemes. When awe wears off, we think we can do everything alone, that we are the protagonists. And if that person is a minister of God, he ends up believing that he is separate from the people... he closes himself off from God's surprises."



STEP 2 - Make sure you receive the introductory email in your Inbox. If it's not there, check your spam or junk folders.

STEP 3 - You'll receive a brief email each morning. Each email will contain a link to that day's Gospel passage, so you can read the Scripture yourself. Then that will be followed by a short reflection on the passage from Bishop Barron.

It's short, simple, but extremely powerful.

Whether you chose to read weekly, listen weekly or read and reflect daily, there is a great way to get with God.

So sign up today and start reflecting on the Word of God.
