A Tale of Two Campuses

When we came up with our theme for the Capital Campaign over three years ago, to **Build Our Future**, **Serve Our Past**, never did we believe that we would need to accomplish both halves at the same time. Our Future is the Pulte Family Life Center, which has continued its construction timeline after Hurricane Irma, including the delivery of the pre-engineering metal building components this week. Did you know that we are helping with Hurricane Harvey relief with the construction of our building? These metal components were forged right outside Houston, and our steel order put people right back to work after their lives were impacted by their storm, just as ours have been.

To Serve Our Past, we had identified many opportunities to renew the rest of St. John, including a new roof on the church, renovations of the Ballroom, and other essential changes. Hurricane Irma's force has

damaged just about every other part of our campus, and will require significant efforts to repair and recover. We did not anticipate this opportunity in any way, and it will require a significant amount of money, as the insurance deductible is high and will be required for every building. First, I want to thank our Parish Staff, especially our Facilities Team. They were the first ones to come back to the campus after Irma, and immediately started the clean-up to make our church safe to begin Masses and services as quickly as we did. St. John is the second worst impacted parish in the Diocese, and our staff cleaned the Memorial Garden, the church and as much as we could so people could visit their loved ones and join back in our community, even without power. God was with us. There was catastrophic damage to the trees around our Memorial Garden and one large branch impaled a section of our plots 3 feet into the ground, but it landed directly between the spots and did not even scratch a single headstone or touch the remains below them. The staff have since continued to work out of the church as best we can to serve our Parish Family with critical needs and have stepped up to help with the donation process as well, driving water, food, diapers and all our gifts out to Immokalee and East Naples, where the need continues to be urgent. From communication to back breaking labor, we are so blessed to have our amazing staff committed to our mission.

Next, I need to thank the countless volunteers that have dedicated their lives to supporting our service to the community these past 2 weeks. We have had over 100 people gathering, sorting, prioritizing, and then moving donations from our Parish Family out to those in need. We fed families at Naples Park

Elementary with FEMA meals. We distributed water and ice for the local community with the assistance of FPL and our local Commissioner, Andy Solis (and his wonderful assistant, Angela Goodner). We stuffed Power Pack meals for youth that need food on the weekend when they are not in school for the free and reduced lunch program. We have Lectors, Ushers, and Eucharistic Ministers that served in our church even without power and Air Conditioning. Everyone in our Parish Family has stepped up, especially the Knights of Columbus. They have been here every single day for our Donation Center, making sure that we can get the needs met all over the area. Our second collection this past weekend was over \$40,000 for Hurricane Irma Relief efforts right here, that is spectacular. Many more have given the needed items that have continued to keep our Donation Center filling trucks and vans every single day. There are so many names to thank that we will need an entire page next week to showcase just how many people deserve all our gratitude.

Fr. Bob even went and blessed a house the day before the storm. We are so blessed to have such dedicated and devoted priests and deacons.

Finally, I want to thank my family. I have been a preoccupied husband and father these past few weeks, with my focus being directed for our entire Parish Family. My children came back with me to the church as soon as the storm cleared and helped with cleaning up the campus. Ben, Jack, Julia, and Stella have been helping every day until they went back to school with the Donation Center. My wife Donna is literally a saint for dealing with me, taking care of our family and our home, and on top of all that, she has been going to Saint Peter the Apostle on a daily basis with van loads of diapers and wipes for the children and adults of East Naples. Father G there now calls her "The Diaper Lady". I am blessed and honored to call her my wife, my soulmate, and my heart and soul.

I cannot truly express the love and gratitude I am feeling for our Parish Family and all those who have put our Mission: To Know, To Love, and To Serve God in His Church and Our Community into motion even in this challenging time. God Bless You All!

The hymn is found in the Roman Missal as a prayer of thanksgiving after Mass. A partial indulgence is granted to the faithful who devoutly recite this hymn in its entirety.

The Reluctant Giver

here is power in Jesus' Word today as he confronts the chief priests and the elders with their hypocrisy. He uses the parable method to present the case and then poses a question to the religious establishment. They seal their own fate in the way in which they answer the question. In Jesus' example, the first son does the father's will regardless of his reluctance to do what was asked of him. The second son, however, tells his father what he wants to hear and then does nothing about it. Jesus is pointing out to the chief priests and elders that they are like the second son. The Father in heaven wills that they bring others closer to him. The leaders accept the invitation, but then hide behind the letter of the law, failing to bring people into the presence of God. They give lip service to God's saving power but do not expend the effort to make it a reality in the world. Further, even though tax collectors and prostitutes were looked down on by the ruling classes, Jesus points out that these sinners were more ready to receive John's message than they were. God's grace was at work in their lives, turning them away from their sin and they allowed themselves to be transformed by the wisdom

they received.


Reflection Questions

- Which character of today's parable best reflects the way in which you respond to God?
- 2. What does the image of being called into the vineyard mean to you?
- 3. What do you think is meant by the kingdom of God?
- 4. Why does Jesus think prostitutes and tax collectors will enter the kingdom of God before the religious leaders?
- 5. What is God's will for you?
- 6. How do you reflect your belief in the kingdom of God in your daily life?
- 7. Name those moments of grace when you resisted God's will but then carried it out?

Cynics often criticize people who attend church on a regular basis for giving lip service to the message of the gospel. Some use this as an opportunity to suggest that is why they do not attend church. It is hard to be a Christian today because it demands more than lip service — it means that we must put into practice what we preach. A great deal of effort is involved in living the Christian life. The work of Jesus is never over. Even though we may be reluctant in our approach to the Father's will in our lives, once we struggle with the demands of our faith, God sees the blessing of our endeavors. *God loves the one who tries*. Jesus warned the chief priests and elders not to be self-righteous and superficial. Instead, he encourages these men to reach out to sinners and recognize the sacred ground of their road to transformation. *Jesus invites us to also journey down this road of transformation*.

In order to discern the Father's will, we need to discern the needs of those around us. God is constantly asking us to reach out to

the vulnerable and the poor. These people are present in our communities. Our response to their need ultimately reflects our understanding of the demands of faith and our commitment to God. When we truly live a Christian life we feel the pinch of sacrificing our time and we turn our energies to those who do not yet know the Living God. Jesus reminds us to hold onto the vocabulary of outreach and acceptance. This is what it means to know the Father's will — to follow the example of Christ and his commandment to love. The parable encourages us to move beyond spoken promises to incarnate the Word in our lives. By truly embracing the wisdom Jesus imparts in this parable, our lives become an expression of God's Word among us.



Prayer

Strengthen us, O Lord, help us to know your will. As the days pass, may we not neglect opportunities of fulfilling your will. Empower us to be doers of your Word. May our lives become a reflection of your presence to those we meet. Amen.

Wisdom of the Fathers

"In virtue of their baptism, all the members of the People of God have become missionary disciples (cf. Mt 28:19). All the baptized, whatever their position in the Church or their level of instruction in the faith, are agents of evangelization, and it would be insufficient to envisage a plan of evangelization to be carried out by professionals while the rest of the faithful would simply be passive recipients. The new evangelization calls for personal involvement on the part of each of the baptized. Every Christian is challenged, here and now, to be actively engaged in evangelization; indeed, anyone who has truly experienced God's saving love does not need much time or lengthy training to go out and proclaim that love. Every Christian is a missionary to the extent that he or she has encountered the love of God in Christ Jesus: we no longer say that we are "disciples" and "missionaries", but rather that we are always "missionary disciples". If we are not convinced, let us look at those first disciples, who, immediately after encountering the gaze of Jesus, went forth to proclaim him joyfully: "We have found the Messiah!" (Jn 1:41)...

... Of course, all of us are called to mature in our work as evangelizers. We want to have better training, a deepening love and a clearer witness to the Gospel. In this sense, we ought to let others be constantly evangelizing us. But this does not mean that we should postpone the evangelizing mission; rather, each of us should find ways to communicate Jesus wherever we are. All of us are called to offer others an explicit witness to the saving love of the Lord, who despite our imperfections offers us his closeness, his word and his strength, and gives meaning to our lives. In your heart you

know that it is not the same to live without him; what you have come to realize, what has helped you to live and given you hope, is what you also need to communicate to others. Our falling short of perfection should be no excuse; on the contrary, mission is a constant stimulus not to remain mired in mediocrity but to continue growing. The witness of faith that each Christian is called to offer leads us to say with Saint Paul: "Not that I have already obtained this, or am already perfect; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own" (Phil 3:12-13)."

I am a volunteer usher and help with hospitality. See you next Sunday!!!










