November 5**



We will follow the winter Mass schedule until May, 2018.

Unique Opportunity: Month to Match Gift for Church Repairs and Deductibles

It has been an interesting month for all of us here at St. John, both in our personal lives and in our church environment. From celebrating Mass in our Seminar Room without power to serving those hit hardest in the area around our Parish Family, we have responded to this disaster with our hearts and our stewardship, showcasing the best of our faith. In the midst of our actions, we have been constantly recovering our campus from the serious damage that occurred during and after Hurricane Irma. We have been constantly asked when we will be “normal” again, and the answer to that question may be difficult to understand: we will not be “normal” again. Instead, due to the significant damage to all of our buildings, we will have to institute several construction tasks all at once. These projects, including replacing the church roof and the Ballroom renovation, were planned to be accomplished over the next several years. We will be repairing and renewing the campus in a major way over the next months, which will bring our campus to a “new normal”, with enlivened and enhanced spaces for worship and social activities.



Church Roof replacement is only one component of the church building repairs. One of the main AC Units for the church was destroyed by flying tiles and must be completely replaced.

In order to accomplish this feat, we will need your assistance. The time we had planned to gather the wonderful gifts of our Parish Family for our Capital Campaign for these projects must be shortened considerably. We must now pay for deductibles for the hurricane damage. However, we are most blessed here at St. John. An amazing anonymous donor has pledged to match every dollar we collect for these repairs and renewals up to \$200,000 starting on October 22, and going through Thanksgiving. If you have the ability in this time of need, please contribute to our Capital Campaign, **Build Our Future, Serve Our Past**, in any way you can. If you would like your funds to be directed only to the repairs of the church, make sure to state that on your donation.

I have described before our need for patience and flexibility during this time of renewal. Our entire clergy and Parish Staff appreciate every single one of you that has provided your positive support as we work tirelessly to restore, repair, and rejuvenate our campus so we can continue to grow as a Parish Family to achieve our Mission: To Know, To Love, and To Serve God in His Church and Our Community.

During the recovery from any disaster, man-made or natural, there is a tendency to start off strong, with lots of enthusiasm and vigor to immediately repair what needs to be done and get back to “normal”. We have seen it here at St. John within our Parish Family. I have cautioned the staff, however, that this is a marathon, not a sprint. It can seem like a grind sometimes, but the efforts we are taking to recover, repair, and renew our campus will have a lasting positive impact on the area. We are not just a parking lot and a couple of buildings. We are a church, made to serve the spiritual and pastoral needs of our Parish Family and our community. We provide shelter for support groups for those addicted individuals and their families. We are an after-school program that serve single parents that must work and have a safe, enlivening environment for their children. We are the center of social activities for people who otherwise might stay within the walls of their own homes, closing in on themselves. We are Saint John.

The positive and engaging environment we provide has been the product of decades of efforts here at St. John by countless ministries and groups. Pope Francis has asked that all of us continue in this effort as “Missionaries of Hope”:

Dear Brothers and Sisters: In our continuing catechesis on Christian hope, I would now like to speak of our calling to be missionaries of hope. October is traditionally dedicated to reflection on our participation in the Church’s mission. Saint Francis of Assisi, whose feast we celebrate today, can serve as our model in this regard. Francis was a true missionary of the joyful hope born of Christ’s victory over death and our own share in his risen life. Jesus asks us to be witnesses of that same hope, confident in the transforming power of his Spirit at work in our hearts and in our world. Joy is the sure sign of true Christian hope, for we know that evil will not have the upper hand, and that God’s love, revealed on the cross, will ultimately triumph. Certainly, there are times when the gift of hope proves costly. This is the case with so many of our fellow Christians who presently experience persecution, and with the martyrs in every age. Their witness inspires us to continue to hope in Christ’s promises. As missionaries

of hope, may we rejoice in God’s saving power, never lose heart, and help others to look to the future with confidence.

The disciples are announcers of Jesus’ resurrection not only in word, but with facts and with the testimony of their life! Jesus doesn’t want disciples capable only of repeating learned and memorized formulas. He wants witnesses: people who spread hope with their way of

welcoming, smiling and loving. Staying positive, flexible, and understanding during our recovery is not always easy. I have to thank our Parish Staff for their continued affirmative communication and outreach to all that come to our church, even though as of this writing we are still working out of the Narthex and Cry Room. It is a testament to their resilience and dedication to our Mission.

I also want to thank our Parish Family, who continue to serve those in need while dealing with our own personal recovery issues. I hope you are all seeing the constant improvements and repairs we are making across the campus every single day to serve you. The Front Parking Lot is nearly complete, even after the storm’s damage. The new lighting scheme has been finalized and been ordered, so we will have a safe campus after dark finally. Instead of a 200-day lead time to have our damaged tree removal accomplished, our church was prioritized and our damaged trees are being hauled away. The cross on our bell tower was damaged in the storm, but we were able to remove it completely and safely so it can be repaired and restored. Every day we are making progress and it is due to your prayers, patience, and support. Thank you for running this marathon with us!

SAINT OF THE WEEK: ST. IGNATIUS OF ANTIOCH

Born in Syria, Ignatius converted to Christianity and eventually became bishop of Antioch. In the year 107, Emperor Trajan visited Antioch and forced the Christians there to choose between death and apostasy (the abandonment or renunciation of a religious or political belief). Ignatius would not deny Christ and thus was condemned to be put to death in Rome.

Ignatius is the first to use the term “Catholic Church” to refer to the various Christian communities of the Roman Empire.

Ignatius is well known for the seven letters he wrote on the long journey from Antioch to Rome. Five of these letters are to churches in Asia Minor; they urge the Christians there to remain faithful to God and to obey their superiors. He warns them against heretical doctrines, providing them with the solid truths of the Christian faith.

The sixth letter was to Polycarp, bishop of Smyrna, who was later martyred for the faith. The final letter begs the Christians



in Rome not to try to stop his martyrdom. “The only thing I ask of you is to allow me to offer the libation of my blood to God. I am the wheat of the Lord; may I be ground by the teeth of the beasts to become the immaculate bread of Christ.”

Eucharistic living was so crucial to Ignatius that he was willing to die in order to model himself on the Lord who willingly offered all.

Ignatius bravely met the lions in the Circus Maximus.

We celebrate his feast day of St. Ignatius of Antioch on October 17.



Ready for the Feast



Our Scriptures today are a continuation of last week's teaching. In today's parable, Jesus is clearly teaching that many had been invited to the wedding feast but refused to come. The invitation was eventually extended to anyone who wished to come. However, once they had accepted the invitation they had to prepare themselves accordingly to attend the wedding feast. The parable of the wedding mirrors the reluctance of humanity to accept the will of God. The servants sent out to summon the guests are the prophets. The invited guests are the religious classes and the chosen people who follow the precepts of the law. They refuse the invitation to engage in this new radical life that Jesus was offering them. The final group of guests is the sinners and the poor. Once these people accept the invitation they are expected to clothe themselves accordingly in order to be worthy to attend the feast.

We are being shown that all are invited to experience the kingdom of God by engaging in the message of the gospel. However, once we are invited we must assume the responsibilities and be held accountable for what the kingdom expects of us. The image of the wedding garment is not about educating us as to the importance of the outward appearances, rather it points to the inner dispositions of who we are. If we are to clothe ourselves in anything, we must clothe ourselves in Christ and his teaching of compassion and mercy. Once our attitudes and choices reflect the life of Christ, we will be ready for the feast.

Reflection Questions

1. Why has humanity refused God's invitation throughout history?
2. What is important about the last invitation issued by the king?
3. What does the wedding feast and garment represent?
4. How has God invited you to participate in the wedding feast?
5. How do you clothe yourself in Jesus Christ?
6. Name the ways in which people can experience God's feast in today's world?

People have traditionally used our gospel today to point out the appropriateness of clothing for church services. While it is important that we make an effort to wear dignified clothing for the celebration of the Eucharist, this is not the point that Jesus makes. When we come to share in the Eucharist, we enter into linear time and stand on the edge of eternity. We become one with one another and with those who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith. God is not necessarily looking at our outward appearances. Rather, God looks at what is in our hearts and at the reality of our lives. The Lord sees how we respond to his call to make his kingdom known through our words and actions. God holds us accountable for the gift of life that he has given us. We have the opportunity to reach out to others in a way that Christ would reach out to them. In following the call, we will most certainly etch these achievements into the Book of Life. Jesus tells us at the end of the gospel that many are called to hear

the message: his message, but few are chosen. Christ's message has been proclaimed to millions of people around the world. The way in which we attend to God's Word and respond to others with the attitude of Christ will determine whether or not we are to be considered to be the chosen ones of God. Our free will gives us the choice to say yes or no to the invitation — to clothe ourselves in Christ and secure our place at the banquet table of eternal life.

The gospel requires that we live in freedom, but also calls us to live with mercy. Kindness and goodness are the hallmarks of God's reign and his Kingdom. These are the qualities of a true disciple. Is it possible that we will see people in the Kingdom of Heaven who may never have professed that Jesus is Lord? Of course it is! The inner dispositions of the human heart are evidence to God of one's worthiness to enter into God's dwelling place. Jesus' public ministry demonstrated how people were to live in right relationship and treat one another with dignity and respect. Of course he desired that people know him, and in knowing him come to experience the One who sent him. However, there are several reasons why someone may not know Christ. Those who do not know Christ yet live exemplary lives come to know something of God's goodness and truth. If non-Christians contribute to the building of a civilization of love, their efforts do not go unrecognized. Such people in clothing themselves in goodness and mercy will be seen dressed appropriately to join in God's Feast!

Wisdom of the Fathers

“One might ask: *How is the kingdom of God found?* Each of us has a particular path. For some, the encounter with Jesus is awaited, desired, long sought after... For others it happens suddenly, almost by accident, as in the parable of the peasant. This reminds us that God lets Himself be found, because it is He who first wants to meet us, and first tries to meet us. He came to be “God with us.” And Jesus is with us, He is here today. “When you come together in my name, I am with you.” The Lord is here, with us, among us. It is He who seeks us and makes Himself discoverable, even for those who do not seek him. Sometimes He lets Himself be found in unusual places and unexpected times. When Jesus is discovered, one is fascinated, conquered, and it is a joy to leave our usual way of life, sometimes dry and apathetic, to embrace the Gospel, to be guided by the new logic of love and of humble and disinterested service. The Word of Jesus, the Gospel.

How is the kingdom of God possessed? On this point, Jesus is very clear: enthusiasm, the joy of discovery, is not enough... we must put God first in our lives, prefer Him to everything. Giving primacy to God means having the courage to say no to evil, violence, oppression, living instead a life of service to others and in favor of the law and the common good. When a person finds God, the true treasure, they leave a selfish lifestyle and look to share with others the love that comes from God. Whoever becomes a friend of God loves his brothers, is committed to

safeguarding their lives and their health, also respecting the environment and nature... This is particularly important in your beautiful land that needs to be protected and preserved. 
