

World Mission Sunday - An Opportunity to Reach Into the Peripheries

During these past years, Pope Francis has urged the Church to reach out into the peripheries of society and touch lives that are often forgotten. The voices of the poor are often crying out in the wildernesses of our world and suburbia is often so loud that it does not hear

them. Even though world poverty has decreased in the last couple of

decades, there are still 1.3 billion people living in extreme poverty. It is estimated that half of the world's population, which constitutes over 3 billion people, live on less than \$2.50 a day. UNICEF has estimated that almost 22,000 children die each day because of poverty. The words

of Jesus certainly ring

true, "The poor you will

have always", (Matthew 26:11). Much of the world's population still lives with inadequate food supplies, unclean water or lack thereof, and fall into the chasm where there is very little education or medical attention. In the midst of these realities, missionaries are at work, living and proclaiming a gospel of hope. Many of them are changing lives, one person at a time as they reach out through their educational and medical endeavors. The Pontifical Mission Societies (the Holy Father's outreach to missionaries), enable schools to be built, wells to be drilled, medical clinics to be erected, churches to be raised, and the homeless to be housed. Missionaries are

at the heart of this reality.



Pope Francis in his message for World Mission Sunday says, "The Church's mission is enlivened by a spirituality of constant exodus. We are challenged "to go forth from our own comfort zone in order to reach all the peripheries in need of the light of the Gospel" (Evangelii Gaudium, 20). The Church's mission impels us to undertake a constant

pilgrimage across the various deserts of life, through the different experiences of hunger and thirst for truth and justice." Missionaries often live in hostile environments.

Thousands of men and women have had the courage to be part of the constant pilgrimage each day as they continue to build environments in which the poor can feel a sense of hope. Missionaries embrace the people of the world that are abused, broken, and forgotten. Their humble presence in which they hold the poor and dying in their arms is a true testament to the risen presence of Jesus in his Church. The reality is the work of Catholic missionaries is changing the world one person at a time.

It is people like you that allow others to go to the peripheries and touch the lives of the poor. On World Mission Sunday, which is October 22nd, Catholics by virtue of baptism are asked to join in solidarity with missionaries throughout the world, through prayer and by giving generously to the Mission Sunday collection. Many come to know Christ and his way of life because of the missionaries that go out to serve them. CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

Priorities and Progress

We are quietly and constantly making progress on all fronts of our Capital Campaign to **Build Our Future**, **Serve Our Past**. The Life Center continues to take shape, with the foundation and utility work nearing completion. Our new Front Parking Lot will be available next weekend, once the paint is completely dry and the asphalt is sealed. Our offices have successfully moved back into the Parish Activity Center and Claussen Family Center and the programs of the Parish Family have begun again, including both youth and adult Faith Formation. We still have a long road of recovery to journey on together, but each day brings more improvement.

We have now turned to prioritizing the major undertakings that I know Fr. John has spoken about during Mass: repairing and restoring our campus that was damaged by Hurricane Irma. We have identified 5 major projects that we must undertake urgently:

- 1. Church Roof: The roof was heavily damaged in the storm, with major sections being pulled up. The roof will be replaced with a new, stronger metal roof system, and we will remove the overhead skylight (which has not been a skylight for over a decade, due to discoloration) as part of that effort.
- 2. Church AC Units: The two oldest air conditioning systems attached to the church were both destroyed by falling tiles from the roof. These units must be completely replaced.
- 3. Church Doors: Saturated by the driving rain and pushed by the storm wind, the wooden doors of the church must be replaced, especially the doors behind the tabernacle, which have completely warped.
- 4. Ballroom Restoration: The largest social space we have, the Parish Activity Center Ballroom, was completely destroyed in the storm. Leaks from the roof and water coming in from all the doors soaked nearly every component of the room, including the chairs.
- Bell Tower: The winds from Hurricane Irma pushed our Carillon, or Bell Tower, too far off its foundation, so it must be demolished and rebuilt.

Many of these projects were already part of our Capital Campaign's plan to "Serve Our Past", so we are blessed that we can move forward quickly with existing plans, but we must take on these projects with a clear priority and direction. We must ensure



our mission continues with Masses and Services without interruption, even as we move into the busy Advent and Lenten Seasons. We have already begun demolition in the Ballroom, in anticipation of the priorities to get the church repaired as quickly as possible, which will be a major engineering and construction task.

As we **Build Our Future**, **Serve Our Past**, we still need all the gifts, prayers, and support of our Parish Family. For the next month, a generous donor will match any and all donations for our Building Fund up to \$200,000. #ToLove, #ToServe – World Mission Sunday: Mission at the Heart of the Christian Faith

I hope you have all had an opportunity to meet our new NET Missionaries (see page 11). These wonderful men and women have dedicated their lives to St. John for the next year in support of our engagement to the larger community. They wear bright blue shirts each Saturday and Sunday and are assisting us with ushering and greeting, as well as integrating into our Parish Family. They are the epitome of the word "missionary". They put their entire lives on hold, sleeping sometimes on floors and in sleeping bags in the homes of the families of our Parish, focusing on spreading the joy and love of our faith through their outward actions. They go out from our church every day to speak to strangers, who they hope to turn into friends, and those friends into missionaries themselves.

On this World Mission Sunday, their example provides context to our whole Parish Family. We do not need to go to Uganda or Laos to become missionaries. The calling we all feel to assist those around us is our vocation tugging at our souls. We can reflect on the needs of the world and our own role in shaping the positive response to hunger, thirst, lack of education, poverty, homelessness, racism, forced migration, human trafficking, and all the facets of evil in the world. Pope Francis asks us in his message for today:

This Day invites us to reflect anew on the mission at the heart of the Christian faith. The Church is missionary by nature; otherwise, she would no longer be the Church of Christ, but one group among many others that soon end up serving their purpose and passing away. So it is important to ask ourselves certain questions about our Christian identity and our responsibility as believers in a world marked by confusion, disappointment and frustration, and torn by numerous fratricidal wars that unjustly target the innocent. What is the basis of our mission? What is the heart of our mission? What are the essential approaches we need to take in carrying out our mission?..

The Church's mission, then, is not to spread a religious ideology, much less to propose a lofty ethical teaching. Many movements throughout the world inspire high ideals or ways to live a meaningful life. Through the mission of the Church, Jesus Christ himself continues to evangelize and act; her mission thus makes present in history the kairos, the favourable time of salvation. Through the proclamation of the Gospel, the risen Jesus becomes our contemporary, so that those who welcome him with faith and love can experience the transforming power of his Spirit, who makes humanity and creation fruitful, even as the rain does with the earth. "His resurrection is not an event of the past; it

contains a vital power which has permeated this world. Where all seems to be dead, signs of the resurrection suddenly spring up. It is an irresistible force" (Evangelii Gaudium, 276)...

We will follow the winter Mass schedule until May, 2018.


Saint of the week: St. Anthony Mary Claret

Antoni Maria Claret i Clarà was born in Sallent, in the county of Bages in the Province of Barcelona, on December 23, 1807, the fifth of the 11 children of Juan and Josefa Claret. His father was a woollen manufacturer. As a child he enjoyed pilgrimages to the nearby Shrine of Our Lady of Fussimanya.

Claret received an elementary education in his native village, and at the age of 12 became a weaver. At the age of 18, he went to Barcelona to specialize in his trade, and remained there until he was 20 years old. Meanwhile, he devoted his spare time to study and became proficient in Latin, French and engraving.

Recognizing a call to religious life, he left Barcelona. He wished to become a Carthusian monk but finally entered the diocesan seminary at Vic in 1829, and was ordained on June 13, 1835, on the feast of St. Anthony of Padua. He received a benefice in his native parish, where he continued to study theology until 1839; but as missionary work strongly appealed to him, he proceeded to Rome. There he entered the Jesuit novitiate but had to leave due to ill health. He then returned to Spain and exercised his pastoral ministry in Viladrau and Girona, attracting notice by his efforts on behalf of the poor. In an area despoiled by the Carlist civil war, he added the practice of rustic medicine to his other endeavors.

Recalled by his superiors to Vic, Claret was sent as Apostolic Missionary throughout Catalonia which had suffered from French invasions. He travelled from one mission to the next on foot. An eloquent preacher fluent in the Catalan language, people came from miles around to hear. After a lengthy time in the pulpit, he would spend long hours in the confessional. He was said to have had the gift of discernment of consciences. In 1848 Claret's life was threatened by anti-clerical enemies



and he was sent to the Canary Islands where he gave retreats for 15 months. His missions were so well attended that he often preached from an improvised pulpit in the plaza before the church.

On his return to Spain, he established the Congregation of the Missionary Sons of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (The Claretians) on the feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel (July 16, 1849), and founded the great religious library at Barcelona which was called "Librería Religiosa" (now "Llibreria Claret").[3] Pope Pius IX gave approval to the congregation on December 22,

Pope Pius IX, at the request of the Spanish crown appointed him archbishop of Santiago, Cuba in 1849. He was consecrated at Vic in October 1850. Before he embarked, he made three separate pilgrimages: to Our Lady of the Pillar, patroness of Spain; to the Virgin of Montserrat, patroness of Catalonia; and to Our Lady of Fussimanya, near his home village.

Antoni Maria Claret i Clarà died on October 24, 1870, aged 62.

Anthony Mary Claret was beatified in Rome by Pope Pius XI on February 24, 1934. He was canonized 16 years later by Pope Pius XII on May 7, 1950. Pope John XXIII included him in the General Roman Calendar in 1960, and fixed his feast on October 23, where it remained for nine years until the 1969 revision of the calendar moved it to the day of his death, October 24, which had been the feast of Saint Raphael the Archangel since 1921.

Host Families Needed



A Radical Knowledge

he cunning of men can be very difficult to bear at times. Jesus was no stranger to deception. In today's gospel, we encounter the deceit of the Pharisees as they seek to entrap Jesus. It is hard to imagine why the religious teachers had such a problem with Jesus' teachings. Stranger still is how people could undermine a man who brought so much healing to the world. Maybe the religious establishment feared Jesus because it eroded their sense of control. Perhaps they saw him as a magician who brought temporary relief to those who were hurting. These leaders were most certainly skeptical. Nothing could convince them that Jesus' mission and ministry was the work of God.

When we look at the reality of Jesus, we see at work a radical theology that challenged the conventional religious thought of his time. Jesus taught that God was not only someone to be feared, but someone with whom one could have an intimate relationship. Jesus taught the people to refer to God as "abba", "father". The literal translation is "daddy". Such an outlook fundamentally changed the way in which humanity approached God. Jesus' wisdom revealed how people were no longer passive spectators in the history of salvation, but involved in

the divine drama that was unfolding. He healed disease and the negative traits of the human condition. The healing that Jesus offered showed the Pharisees that sin and illness could be overcome by God's grace. He also put humanity ahead of the Sabbath and tended to the needs of God's people who were crying out to him from the wildernesses of their lives. In this context, the Pharisees failed to bring Jesus down. Instead, they endeavored to rend Jesus powerless and make him an enemy of the Roman occupation by asking him if it was lawful to pay taxes to Caesar. Jesus sees through this and exclaims: "Repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God."

The challenge that Jesus gave the Pharisees two thousand years ago remains the challenge for the Church today, i.e., to give to God what belongs to God. We must discern what this means for us today. Obviously, we have to be faithful to the duties we have to society as citizens by paying taxes and abiding by the laws of the land. Each one of us has to be faithful citizens and work to protect the rights and dignity of the vulnerable. We have the responsibility in choosing governments that will strive to work for justice and peace. We have to be faithful citizens of the kingdom of God also. *The Church's challenge is to constantly seek its*

Christological heart. Church laws are important because they bring us to the ideal and perfection that God intends. However, whenever people fall short of the ideal, the Church must seek to offer Christ's compassion, listening, and love to those broken situations. Today, as the people of the Church, we are asked to offer ourselves to others as Christ did and be agents of transformation. We, like all missionaries across the world, are being called to take this radical message to those who have yet to encounter Christ.



So we must ask ourselves what belongs to God? The answer to this question is that everything belongs to God. The world in which we live and perceive the beauty of creation belongs to God. Every man and woman made in the image and likeness of God belongs to God. The children of every family belong to God. The most successful executive belongs to God. The migrant who flees from poverty belongs to God. The greatest of Saints belongs to God. Those ensnared by vice and sin belongs to God. All belongs to God. When we take this radical to heart, it is then that we can discern how we are being called to impact the lives of those who belong to God. When we live this radical discipleship we will discover the Church's Christological heart!

Prayer

Be with us Lord as we journey through life. Let our lives be a radiance of your divine compassion. Help us to learn to give completely of ourselves offering the gift that is truly yours. May we always be faithful to our call as citizens and as people of your kingdom. Amen.

Faith of the Fathers

Love of neighbor is thus shown to be possible in the way proclaimed by the Bible, by Jesus. It consists in the very fact that, in God and with God, I love even the person whom I do not like or even know. This can only take place on the basis of an intimate encounter with God, an encounter which has become a communion of will, even affecting my feelings. Then I learn to look on this other person not simply with my eyes and my feelings, but from the perspective of Jesus Christ. His friend is my friend. Going beyond exterior appearances, I perceive in others an interior desire for a sign of love, of concern. This I can offer them not only through the organizations intended for such purposes, accepting it perhaps as a political necessity. Seeing with the eyes of Christ, I can give to others much more than their outward necessities; I can give them the look of love which they crave... If I have no contact whatsoever with God in my life, then I cannot see in the other anything more than the other, and I am incapable of seeing in him the image of God. But if in my life I fail completely to heed others, solely out of a desire to be "devout" and to perform my "religious duties", then my relationship with God will also grow arid. It becomes merely "proper", but loveless. Only my readiness to encounter my neighbor and to show him love makes me sensitive to God as well. Only if I serve my neighbor can my eyes be opened to what God does for me and how much he loves me. The saints—consider the example of Blessed Teresa of Calcutta constantly renewed their capacity for love of neighbor from their encounter with the Eucharistic Lord, and conversely this encounter acquired its real- ism and depth in their service to others. Love of God and love of neighbor are thus inseparable, they form a single commandment. But both live from the love



of God who has loved us first. No longer is it a question, then, of a "commandment" imposed from without and calling for the impossible, but rather of a freely-bestowed experience of love from within, a love which by its very nature must then be shared with others. Love grows through love. Love is "divine" because it comes from God and unites us to God; through this unifying process it makes us a "we" which transcends our divisions and makes us one, until in the end God is "all in all" (1 Cor 15:28).



Living Life From Your Spiritual Center – A Bible and Catechism Study

Christ's disciples could not have been successful bringing the Gospel of Christ to the ends of the earth without the spiritual Gifts given to them by the Holy Spirit. Jesus told His disciples, "...if I do not go away, the Helper shall not come to you; but if I go, I will send Him to you." "When the Spirit of Truth comes,

He will guide you into all truth..." (John 16: 7 and 13)

Do you know your unique Spiritual Gifts? You are invited to join with other adult Catholics to learn how you are uniquely, spiritual gifted.

Tuesday afternoons from 4:30—6:00 p.m. in the Seminar Room of the Claussen Family Center for six sessions beginning October 24 (except November 21 of Thanksgiving week)

Apostle Paul reminds us that each person's giftedness is needed for

the Church community to thrive. He writes that the Church is like a human body, in that it has many parts, and each part has a different function; just as each part of the human body is necessary for the human being to thrive, each person is needed for the Church to flourish.

"There are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of workings, but the same God who inspires them all in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good." (1 Cor.12:4-7).

Throughout this study your eyes will be on God, the Giver of Spiritual Gifts for the purpose of building up the Church. You cannot create these gifts yourself. The Holy Spirit enables them. You only need to cooperate. For many, learning their spiritual gifts has been a life-changing experience. Each

participant will have the opportunity to take a Spiritual Gift Inventory to learn their own Spiritual Gifts.
