


Independence Day Celebration Honors Veterans, Service

After their rousing Drill Team and Drum Line Exhibition, our guest speaker, Gary McClain, provided his passionate description of integrity as well as his efforts for the Military Archdiocese on behalf of the Knights of Columbus. While 25% of the military identifies as Catholic, there are only 200 active Catholic Chaplins in our armed forces. There is a significant need.

The honorees of this year's celebration then came forward and we were able to honor men from both World War II and Korea for their service. It was incredibly special that Fr. Bob Kantor, who was a Military Chaplin, happened to have a special medal given to him for D-Day service, and he was able to pin it on one of our honorees.

The night ended with music and dancing as we all celebrated together. We all thank the Knights who dedicated so much of their time to putting together this wonderful event. God Bless the USA!

Access Road, Sidewalk, and New Parking Lot Construction Begins

In our constant attempt to improve the safety and accessibility of St. John for our Parish Family and the community, we have finalized the construction planning of new approaches to enter and leave our campus. Did you know that our church actually began with Masses in the school next door, Naples Park Elementary School, while our church was being built? We are blessed to have such a wonderful neighbor who provides their needed parking and access to our church. Our Ministry efforts, led by the Ladies of Charity and Sewing Group, have directly impacted the lives of the children and families of the school with food, school supplies, and clothes for years.

This relationship will be strengthened even more in this next year due to the efforts to expand the access to and from both of our campuses. This week, the expansion of the roadway between the school and church will begin: providing a safe, two-lane roadway for traffic. Additionally, a brand-new sidewalk will be built between the parking lots, between the tennis courts and the baseball field. This sidewalk will make it easier for our Parish Family to park in the school lot and walk directly to the church, rather than competing with the vehicle traffic on the road. It will be so much safer for everyone.

The front lot construction we have described before will begin this week as well. Our new front lot will not only be easier to use, but it will increase the total parking available by an additional 40 spots. There will be periods over the next month where we will not be able to park in the very front of the church, but the side lots will continue to be accessible during this construction.


We appreciate everyone's patience as we make these important changes to our campus.

#ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe – Convocation of Catholic Leaders Day 1: Mass that Showcases Universalism of Church

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops held one of its largest meetings, called the Convocation of Catholic Leaders in Orlando over the Independence Day Weekend. We are very blessed as a Parish Family that Fr. John made it a priority for our church to attend to contribute our voice and listen intently to learn from other experts in our faith. Natalie Campbell, our DRE, was requested to attend by Bishop Dewane, Fr. John, Rick Beebe, our Pastoral Stewardship Council, and myself all attended for our Parish Family.

Inspired by Evangelii Gaudium, the Convocation will form leaders who will be equipped and re-energized to share the Gospel as missionary disciples, while offering fresh insights informed by new research, communications strategies, and successful models. We arrived just in time to witness the opening Mass of the Convocation of Catholic Leaders in Orlando, FL. However, out of respect, our team from St. John did not go into the Hall. Instead, we had a unique opportunity to witness how the Mass was experienced by the other participants. It was a wonderful illustration of several themes:

- Universality There were both Gospel Choirs and Gregorian Chants as the Liturgical Music, which engaged the congregation differently
- Theme of Joy and Inclusion Cardinal Dolan gave a light-hearted and engaging Homily.

A core insight came to light in our discussions with all the different people we met after the Mass. They thought that this beautiful Mass illustrated exactly what the theme

was all about, joy. But, we all noticed that there was a feeling of "gloom" when some of the chanting made it difficult for full participation. Some of the participants did not seem to enjoy Cardinal Dolan's quips during the Mass, where he commented on how "things are done in NYC". Others laughed out loud.

It invigorated us to make this Convocation a special moment of the Catholic Church here in the U.S. But more importantly, to declare we are in permanent state of Missionary action as a Catholic Church, focusing on embracing and accompanying all, especially those who identify as "Nones" (no religious affiliation) and those on the peripheries of our parish and our society.

Several of us met with nationally recognized experts in Youth and Young Adult programs after the Mass. In those conversations, it was actually these experts who were taken back

at just how much we are doing to engage, shepherd, and enliven the younger groups in our area. From the Life Center to starting CYO to involving adults in arts programs, they believe we are not only on the right track, but that we are thought to be leaders for the rest of the parishes should look towards.

Sister Pat, Principal of Saint John Neumann High School, also attended the Convocation.







Knowing God Through Child-like Wonder

ost of us have spent time with children, and when observing them we sometimes find that their little minds are off in another world. Babies look at the world with wonder and gaze intently on the realities before them. We often hear parents say, "I wonder what is going through their little mind!" To watch children play is to recognize that life is such a wonderful adventure waiting to be explored and celebrated. Children do not build up walls — they simply trust. When a child has a disagreement with another child, you will find them playing with that same child five minutes later. Children simply accept that God has created the world and is there to watch over them.

As a child progresses through adolescence and grows into adulthood, this idyllic

view of life slowly begins to erode and walls are erected. We teach our young that the world is not such a safe place at times and rightly so. However, we also teach the young, through example, that love can be conditional and forgiveness is not so easy. Human beings often transmit their hurts and resist the risk of letting go. No matter how hard we try, children pick up this way of life and slowly build up the walls that block them from one another and from God.

In today's gospel, Jesus is pointing out that we cannot rely on our own reason alone. When we concentrate on our needs and attitudes exclusively, we miss the signs of God's presence in our lives. Feelings of hurt, anger, resentment, and rejection hold onto us if we do not learn to let them go. Jesus praises God for the fact that the little ones are more inclined to the experience of God than are the wise and the learned. What does he mean? Jesus is pointing out through unconditional trust, like that of a child, that God can be present to them offering them comfort and strength. Jesus goes on to invite those who are hurting and burdened by the hardship that the world imposes, to find rest in him. He urges those of us who find his gospel challenging, to let go of the unnecessary

things and to embrace what is necessary to find true happiness and peace. Jesus is inviting us to look at the world with wonder once again and to view the world through the eyes of a child. The child does not complicate forgiveness and is willing to let go and move on with conflict. A child surrenders to the mystery and says yes to the God they cannot see.

As we gather for the mass each Sunday, we come with our own stories. Many of us come with much to celebrate. Yet, there are many who come with tremendous burdens. Life can throw so much at us at times in terms of problems with relationships, health, family, and work. Bad things can happen to good people — things that are out of their control. When we find ourselves in this situation, we are invited to become "childlike" in our faith and fully trust that God is there for us. This involves an act of surrender — abandoning ourselves and our lives to the God who brings us hope. May we always be mindful of such surrender each time we place ourselves before the altar of God.

Wisdom of the Fathers

"A saying of Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew speaks to us: "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." (Mt 11:28). Life is often wearisome, and many times tragically so. We have heard this recently... Work is tiring; looking for work is exhausting. And finding work today requires much effort. But what is most burdensome in life is not this: what weighs more than all of these things is a lack of love. It weighs upon us never to receive a smile, not to be welcomed. Certain silences are oppressive, even at times within families, between husbands and wives, between parents and children, among siblings. Without love, the burden becomes even heavier, intolerable. I think of elderly people living alone, and families who receive no help in caring for someone at home with special needs. "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden," Jesus says.

Dear families, the Lord knows our struggles: he knows them. He knows the burdens we have in our lives. But the Lord also knows our great desire to find joy and rest! Do you remember? Jesus said, "... that your joy may be complete" (cf. Jn 15:11). Jesus wants our


