

Pray the Rosary

"Give me an army saying the rosary and I will conquer the world," said the Blessed Mother.

For Marian Nickel, St. John parishioner, helping to conquer the world has become her personal mission. To achieve this goal, Marian began making rosaries 16 years ago.

"My husband became very sick and needed constant nursing." A registered nurse for 52 years, Marian sought an outlet that involved something other than nursing. She responded to an ad the St. Williams Rosary Makers had placed in the Naples Daily News seeking people who wanted to learn how to make rosaries.

Since then, Marian has made 91,610 rosaries, and she continues to be passionate about the ministry.

"Every pair of hands praying the rosary is a pair of hands that cannot shoot a gun," she said.

The rosary itself holds a special memory for Marian. When she married in 1967 she made three rosaries – one for her mother and father and one for her husband - out of Austrian Borealis crystal beads. Upon their deaths, her husband's rosary went to their oldest grandson; her father's rosary now belongs to her nephew; and Marian has her mother's rosary.

Today, Marian strings together the rosaries with plastic beads.

"It's the cheapest way to get a rosary made and into the hands of the missionaries who need them." she said.

It takes Marian about 10 minutes to make a rosary. It has become a nightly ritual for her to sit with her lapboard, which her father made especially for her, and string the rosaries while watching and listening to TV.

choosing. Sometimes she mixes up the beads, but generally she uses only one color.

"I think it is more pleasing to the eye when all the beads are the same color," Marian said.

Supplies for the rosaries Marian makes come from the St. Williams Rosary Makers. To make one rosary it takes: 59 beads, three feet of waxed cord, 14 plastic spacers, one metal spacer, one crucifix and one Miraculous Medal.

Some rosaries have special requirements. Rosaries for the military troops, for example, are made out of cord using no beads (called stealth rosaries).

"This allows the troops to carry the camouflaged rosary in their pockets and pray the rosary without making any noise that could give away their location to the enemy," Marian explained.

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October Is Month of the Holy Rosary

"People come to church early...It's a perfect opportunity to pray the rosary." — Marian Nickel

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Rosaries that are made for prisoners also have special requirements as they have additional spacers to make the rosaries longer in order to go around the prisoners' necks since they have no pockets in their jumpsuits. The beads are usually black or brown.

The finished rosaries are sent to The Universal Living Rosary Association in Dickinson, Texas. They are distributed from there to: Myanmar(Burma); Republic of China; Tamilnadu, India; Davado City, Philippines; Faisalabad, Pakistan; Bogota, Colombia; Mumbai, India; Hosanna, Ethiopia; and St. Petersburg, Russia; as well as Mission Fields all over the World.

In fact, a couple years ago Fr. John took 1000 of the rosaries Marian made

to the St. Lucia and St. Vincent missions. Last month Bishop Frank J. Dewane requested some rosaries and the St. Williams Rosary Makers sent him 440 rosaries Marian had just completed. "Just knowing I am getting the Lady's word out there is my reward," Marian said.

October is designated by the Catholic Church as the Month of the Holy Rosary. Marian does not think Catholics put enough emphasis on the rosary.

"People come to church early and visit, which can be distracting to those trying to pray," she said. "It's a perfect opportunity to pray the rosary."

Marian also repairs rosaries for the cost of the parts only. She also makes customized rosaries upon request.

"Making rosaries is my corner to hide and my salvation – to get away from everything else." This is important to Marian who lost her husband and parents within 22 months of each other.

With 59 beads on a rosary, 5,404,990 prayers will be said with the 91,610 rosaries Marian has made.

Marian will also accept donations of odd beads, crucifixes, or any rosary parts and use the pieces to make rosaries for the Eucaristic Ministers at St. John who donate the rosaries to hospital patients and patients at assisted living facilities. Donations can be dropped off at the parish offce.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

A Life Chain

October 2, 2011. As we have for many years, we will have a life chain. Location details and signs will be available at the Pro Life table following all the Masses October 1 and 2. When other people make demands on our freedom, we can choose to ignore or even eliminate them from our self-centered lives. Our culture gives us "permission" to turn our back on an ill-timed baby, a neglected spouse or a mother in a nursing home who pleads for a visit.

But money can't buy us love. And neither power nor freedom can bring us the one thing humans need to thrive. We were created to love and be loved. We cannot be satisfied by earthly things alone. By creating us in his own image, God has given us a nature that is partly spiritual — an intellect, the capacity to know right from wrong, the free will to choose how to act, and the capacity to know and love him. Jesus' incarnation, life, and death revealed to us that God is Love. (*I Jn 4: 8*) To love God and others fulfills our deepest needs, allowing us to have life "to the full."

Every person bears God's image and has an immortal soul. Yet many are viewed as being outside the circle of love — unborn children whose parents are tempted to eliminate them, vulnerable people with illnesses and disabilities who risk being abandoned or even killed through misguided "mercy," prisoners on death row, forgotten or despised long after they have repented of their wrongdoing.

Although it seems a paradox, the greater the sacrifices made out of love, the greater is our joy and peace. Whether it is the brave decision of a pregnant woman to reject abortion and allow a loving family to parent her child when she cannot, or the daily sacrifices of parents in raising young children, or the hard work of caring for an elderly relative with dementia, when we step up to these challenges, God can stretch our hearts and fill them to overflowing with his love, joy and peace. With hearts so transformed, we can become living witnesses to the meaning of Jesus' mission: *I came that all might have life, and have it to the full!*



We have made great strides during the past several years to enhance the buildings and grounds here at St. John the Evangelist. As I mentioned several weeks ago, the last remaining major project is the lighting in the church.

I will begin with a little history: The church is now nearly 19 years old with

the first Mass being celebrated on Christmas Eve in 1992. The original lighting is still in place and the problems are now mounting at an exponential rate. First and foremost, the original lighting was designed and installed for more of a residential application and certainly not a commercial application. In order to change any of the bulbs in the ceiling or on the clerestory windows, a lift must be rented and the front doors removed. This isn't your basic scissor lift but instead a 45' boom lift which will allow the operator to reach the 55' ceiling. The lift must be carefully navigated down the center aisle as to not damage the pews. There is a clearance of $\frac{1}{2}$ inch on either side. There is obviously very little room for error. Just to change the bulbs in the sanctuary, we spend several thousand dollars in lift rental, bulbs and labor. The bulbs in the sanctuary ceiling are a combination of metal halide and par lamp spotlights. The fixtures are controlled by an archaic Lutron dimmer pack system. Even after replacing all of the bulbs in the ceiling, many burn out in as little as six months after replacement. The lighting over the altar is mounted on a track system and consists of the same par lamp spotlights. We replaced every single light and a few of the fixtures following the renovation last September. As you can see, nearly half of these bulbs have burned out in less than a year. Many burned out after only six months. The lighting over the altar is also controlled by the dimmer packs. The dimmer packs have reached the end of their useful life. We have replaced a few and the problems still persist. Due to the malfunction of the dimmer packs, much of the lighting has been rerouted, bypassing the dimmer packs. As for the rest of the church, the lighting is very poor at best. The Narthex is very gloomy and dark. The back wings are also very dark even after removing the old wood ceiling two years ago. The lectors and the celebrant often have a very difficult time reading the word of God from the Ambo. We have made numerous patches over the years but the problem seems to worsen as time goes by.

We have met with a commercial lighting professional to address our problems. They have come up with a solution which will illuminate the church while solving the problems of maintenance. With this new proposal, we will be able to lower the lights over the altar for easy access. We will replace the fixtures in the sanctuary ceiling to new energy efficient fixtures and bulbs with a life over ten times what is currently in place. We will also illuminate the Narthex and back wings by installing very tasteful chandeliers and adding ancillary fixtures. The entire system may be controlled by an Ipad from anywhere inside the church. There are 999 different scenes which may be programmed and accessed simply by the push of a button. The stage lighting proposed above the altar may be manipulated in a plethora of different variations, even including the addition of color. Imagine being able to flood the back walls of the Altar with green or purple to coincide with the particular color of the liturgical season. The technological advances made over the past 19 years with regards to lighting have been numerous. We would like to take advantage of these advances and install a new lighting system which will bring our church into the 21st century. I am aware that many of you have a difficult time reading your missal due to the abysmal lighting in the sanctuary. I apologize for the delay in addressing the lighting, however we made a decision that temporary patches would no longer be acceptable. The church lighting needs a total overhaul.

Our parishioners have shown their extreme generosity on numerous occasions in the past. From the church renovation to the Prayer Garden, your outpouring of support has been key in allowing us to complete projects which would have otherwise not been possible. Such is the case with our lighting project. This lighting renovation obviously comes at a price and we knew that it would not be cheap. The proposal to complete the job is approximately \$70,000.00. There is an error of +/- \$5,000.00 based on the fixtures chosen for the chandeliers and ancillary fixtures. We are looking for a donor or several donors that see the extreme benefit of this much needed project to step forward and help bring us from darkness into light. By making a gift or donation to this project, you are benefitting every single parishioner that walks into the church. 

e all know the importance of making a building solid by using durable materials. If someone cuts back on the quality of the materials, it can compromise the integrity of the structure. Jesus is the cornerstone and the solid foundation for all Christians. If we remove him as the foundation of our lives, it compromises our lives causing our relationships and way of life to get out of balance.

In today's parable, Jesus talks about salvation history. He uses the image of a landowner sending servants into the vineyard at vintage time. Each time the servants are killed. He eventually sends his son thinking that his heir will be respected. The tenants also kill the son. Jesus is addressing the chief priests and the elders of the people. He is pointing out to them that God has sent many prophets who were put to death because of their message. Jesus is also pointing out that he is the heir and is predicting his own demise at their hands. He goes on to say that he is the stone rejected, only to become the cornerstone and give the kingdom to a people who will be open and willing to produce its fruit.

Jesus is the foundation of the Church and all of its traditions. The message of Jesus is the foundation of all of his teachings. The message of the gospel is the cornerstone of our lives — creating a solid foundation so that we may enjoy the mansions of heaven. If we live the message of the gospel, we set our feet firmly on the path. Once we move away from the message of the gospel, things quickly get out of balance and our relationships suffer. Messengers of God have always suffered at the hands of those who decide to wander from the path. The prophets

held humanity accountable to live justly before God. Their message was radical and transformative. People were urged to reform their lives before their God. Likewise, the heir of God's kingdom, Jesus, disturbed the complacency of the religion of his time, asking the people to reform their lives and join in the revolution of his love and compassion.

Today, we are asked to reform our lives and each day to contemplate the mysteries of our faith. By the virtue of our very baptism, we are called to be the prophetic voice of God in the modern world. We are challenged to speak out against injustices and to be made accountable for our fellow man. We may well suffer insults when we align ourselves with the message — a message that respects life in all of its stages. It is also a message that calls us to uphold the dignity of humanity by being caretakers of the poor, the needy and the vulnerable.


