Eucharistic Ministers Need Rosaries for Hospital Visits

"A simple rosary is all the patients desire."



The rosary (from Latin rosarium, meaning "rose garden") or "garland of roses" is a traditional Catholic devotion. The term denotes the prayer beads used to count the series of prayers that make up the rosary. The prayers consist of repeated sequences of the Lord's Prayer followed by ten prayings of the Hail Mary and a single praying of "Glory Be to the Father".

Devotion to the rosary and the Blessed Mother in particular is an important tradition to Catholics and particularly to those Catholics who are ill and find themselves in the hospital.

"Hospital patients never say no to a rosary when it is offered to them," Pat Bernetich, Eucharistic Minister, said. "They are always happy to receive a rosary to pray while they are hospitalized."

The Eucharistic Ministers are in need of rosaries - new or used. According to Pat, who is in charge of scheduling Eucharistic Ministers for visitations to NCH on

Immokalee Road, they never have enough rosaries to distribute to the sick parishioners.


"A simple rosary is all the patients desire," Pat said. "If you have a spare rosary that you don't need we would love to have it to give to hospital patients. The patients appreciate anything — it doesn't have to be fancy,"

The Eucharistic Ministers also visit the birthing centers at NCH with the new moms, babies and siblings. While there they offer a rosary to the siblings of the newborn.

"It makes the siblings feel special and not forgotten while all the attention is focused on the newborn," Pat said.

Anyone wishing to donate a new or used rosary may drop off the rosaries in the altar server room adjacent to the Religious Boutique during Mass times. On weekdays the rosaries may be dropped off at the office during regular business hours.


Undy Sunday

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Assumed into Heaven

The Church celebrates the Assumption of the Virgin Mary. She was taken into heaven to share in Her Son's glory. The Church believes and teaches that the Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory (CCC966).

How can that be possible? In 1 Corinthians 15:20-23, Paul reveals God's promise that our union with Christ secures our bodily resurrection into eternity. By His resurrection, Christ is the firstfruit of those who have fallen sleep.

The Virgin Mary experienced the effect of Christ's redemption of the human race before any other follower of Jesus, with the same sanctifying grace that would normally come with baptism after birth. In her case, she was redeemed at her conception that she might fulfill her role of bearing God's Word in her womb.

Therefore, Mary had the merits of Christ applied to her in advance. She possessed the resurrected life within her, to the utmost degree, from the moment of her conception. Consequently, it was not necessary for her to await the general resurrection, as we do, to share in God's glory.

This means that God took Mary into heaven without the indigity of having to lie in a burial place. This was possible because Mary was without sin. Bodily decay upon death was decreed by God after the fall of man, when sin entered the world (Genesis 3:19).

There is no explicit biblical reference to the assumption of Mary, but the Scriptures record that Enoch and Elijah, who were born with original sin, were bodily assumed into heaven (Gen 5:24; Heb 11:5; 2 Kgs 2:11-12; 1 Mac 2:58).

How much more then, the Virgin Mary, from all eternity joined in a hidden way with Jesus Christ and immaculate in her conception, would deserve at the end of her earthly life, preservation from the corruption of the tomb and a seat in splendor at the right hand of her Son, Christ the King.

We do not know whether she was assumed alive or asleep. The Eastern Church and Byzantine iconography affirm the "dormition" of the Virgin Mary. According to tradition she fell asleep surrounded by the Apostles, as her final request.

An implicit reference in the Bible supports Mary's destiny in the next world. John teaches us, in the

Book of Revelation, as he was led to peer into heaven, that a woman clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet, crowned with twelve stars is the great sign in the sky.

John describes this to make a direct connection between Mary and the Ark of the New Covenant. The old Ark had not been seen since the prophet Jeremiah took it out of the Temple and hid it at unknown location (2 Maccabees 2:4-5). John then reports that the Ark, after six centuries since Jeremiah hid it, has been transferred to heaven in the person of Mary, the new Ark of the Covenant, and like the old Ark, the new Ark is worthy of the same veneration and honor.

The Ark of the Covenant was holy because it carried the stone version of the Word of God, and the manna that God had sent from Heaven. Likewise, the Virgin Mary carried the Word of God and the bread of life in her flesh! She is the only woman worthy of the title "full of grace". In Scripture, only Jesus has the same title (*John 1:14*).

Mary was the first Christian, the first to follow Christ. Her consent at the mystery of the Incarnation led her to dedicate her entire life to Jesus, performing an integral part in God's redemption plan. In cooperating with God's grace, Mary was obedient to God's will, without complete comprehension of the implication of her "yes", but always recognizing her child belonged more to God than to herself, a relationship with Jesus that went beyond motherhood.

The Assumption is a celebration of the grace and power of God in a human life. The reign of grace could not have been inaugurated without Mary.

Mary is the woman of the promise, the vessel of the people's dreams. Through her came the Gift of Life. Baptism makes us children of God and simultaneously children of Mary. In prayer, join Mary at the foot of the cross, thank Jesus for the gift of life, receive His lordship, accept Mary as your mother and always ask Mary to show you how to love Jesus.

The rainy season has returned in earnest. This past week, we were treated to a very tropical air mass that fed continual showers and thunderstorms from the Gulf of Mexico onshore. As of this past Wednesday, we had received several inches of much needed rainfall. We have a long way to go before water restrictions

are removed, but this is a good start. Our lake at the front of the campus is actually beginning to resemble a lake rather than the pond that we have had for the past month. Considering that *The Evangelist* is our main source of communication with the parish, it

seems only fitting that it is the best that it can be. I feel it safe to say that we have the finest bulletin that I have ever seen. When I think back to the black and white bulletins of years past, I am extremely proud of what we now distribute to our parishioners. Thank you to Kathy for creating a beautiful, informative and easy to read weekly publication.

Marty is fabricating the housing for each Station by hand. Every Station will feature a "roof" with a copper top and lighting to illuminate the statues after dark.



AUGUST 14, 2011 - TWENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Praying with Body, Mind, and Voice

n the celebration of Mass we raise our hearts and minds to God. We are creatures of body as well as spirit, so our prayer is not confined to our minds and hearts. It is expressed by our bodies as well. When our bodies are engaged in our prayer, we pray with our whole person. Using our entire being in prayer helps us to pray with greater attentiveness.

During Mass we assume different postures—standing, kneeling, sitting—and we are also invited to make a variety of gestures. These postures and gestures are not merely ceremonial. They have profound meaning and, when done with understanding, can enhance our participation in the Mass.

STANDING

Standing is a sign of respect and honor, so we stand as the celebrant who represents Christ enters and leaves the assembly. From the earliest days of the Church, this posture has been understood as the stance of those who have risen with Christ and seek the things that are above. When we stand for prayer, we assume our full stature before God, not in pride but in humble gratitude for the marvelous things God has done in creating and redeeming each one of us. By Baptism we have been given a share in the life of God, and the posture of standing is an acknowledgment of this wonderful gift. We stand for the proclamation of the Gospel, which recounts the words and deeds of the Lord. The bishops of the United States have chosen standing as the posture to be observed for the reception of Communion.

KNEELING

In the early Church, kneeling signified penance. So thoroughly was kneeling identified with penance that the early Christians were forbidden to kneel on Sundays and during the Easter season, when the prevailing spirit of the Liturgy was one of joy and thanksgiving. In the Middle Ages kneeling came to signify homage, and more recently this posture has come to signify adoration, especially before the presence of Christ in the Eucharist. It is for this reason that the bishops of this country have chosen the posture of kneeling for the entire Eucharistic Prayer.

SITTING

Sitting is the posture of listening and meditation, so the congregation sits for the pre-Gospel readings and the homily and may also sit for the period of meditation following Communion. All should strive to assume a seated posture during the Mass that is attentive rather than merely at rest.

PROCESSIONS

Every procession in the Liturgy is a sign of the pilgrim Church, the body of those who believe in Christ, on their way to the Heavenly Jerusalem. The Mass begins with the procession of the priest and ministers to the altar. The Book of the Gospels is carried in procession to the ambo. The gifts of bread and wine are brought forward to the altar. Members of the assembly come forward in procession—eagerly, attentively, and devoutly—to receive Holy Communion. We who believe in Christ are moving in time toward that moment when we will leave this world and enter into the joy of the Lord in the eternal Kingdom he has prepared for us.

MAKING THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

We begin and end Mass by marking ourselves with the Sign of the Cross. Because it was by his death on the Cross that Christ redeemed humankind, we trace the Sign of the Cross on our foreheads, lips, and hearts at the beginning of the Gospel, praying that the Word of God may be always in our minds, on our lips, and in our hearts. The cross reminds us in a physical way of the Paschal Mystery we celebrate: the death and Resurrection of our Savior Jesus Christ.

BOWING

Bowing signifies reverence, respect, and gratitude. In the Creed we bow at the words that commemorate the Incarnation. We also bow as a sign of reverence before we receive Communion. The priest and other ministers bow to the altar, a symbol of Christ, when entering or leaving the sanctuary. As a sign of respect and reverence even in our speech, we bow our heads at the name of Jesus, at the mention of the Three Persons of the Trinity, at the name of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and at the name of the saint whose particular feast or memorial is being observed (see GIRM, no. 275).

GENUFLECTING

As a sign of adoration, we genuflect by bringing our right knee to the floor. Many people also make the Sign of the Cross as they bend their knee. Traditionally, Catholics genuflect on entering and leaving church if the Blessed Sacrament is present in the sanctuary of the Church. The priest and deacon genuflect to the tabernacle on entering and leaving the sanctuary. The priest also genuflects in adoration after he shows the Body and Blood of Christ to the people after the consecration and again before inviting the people to Holy Communion.

ORANS

The priest frequently uses this ancient prayer posture, extending his hands to his sides, slightly elevated. *Orans* means "praying." Early Christian art frequently depicts the saints and others standing in this posture, offering their prayers and surrendering themselves, with hands uplifted to the Lord, in a gesture that echoes Christ's outstretched arms as he offered himself on the Cross.

PROSTRATING

In this rarely used posture, an individual lies full-length on the floor, face to the ground. A posture of deep humility, it signifies our willingness to share in Christ's death so as to share in his Resurrection (see Rom 6). It is used at the beginning of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday and also during the Litany of the Saints in the Rite of Ordination, when those to be ordained deacons, priests, and bishops prostrate themselves in humble prayer and submission to Christ.

SINGING

"By its very nature song has both an individual and a communal dimension. Thus, it is no wonder that singing together in church expresses so well the sacramental presence of God to his people" (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, *Sing to the Lord*, no. 2). As we raise our voices as one in the prayers, dialogues, and chants of the Mass, most especially in the Eucharistic

Prayer, as well as the other hymns and songs, we each lend our individual voices to the great hymn of praise and thanksgiving to the Triune God.

PRAYING IN UNISON

In the Mass, the worshiping assembly prays in one voice, speaking or singing together the words of the prayers. By saying the same words at the same time, we act as what we truly are—one Body united in Christ through the Sacrament of Baptism.

BEING SILENT

"Silence in the Liturgy allows the community to reflect on what it has heard and experienced, and to open its heart to the mystery celebrated" (*Sing to the Lord*, no. 118). We gather in silence, taking time to separate ourselves from the concerns of the world and enter into the sacred action. We reflect on the readings in silence. We may take time for silent reflection and prayer after Holy Communion. These times of silence are not merely times when nothing happens; rather, they are opportunities for us to enter more deeply in what God is doing in the Mass, and, like Mary, to keep "all these things, reflecting on them" in our hearts (Lk 2:19).

CONCLUSION

The Church sees in these common postures and gestures both a symbol of the unity of those who have come together to worship and also a means of fostering that unity. We are not free to change these postures to suit our own individual piety, for the Church makes it clear that our unity of posture and gesture is an expression of our participation in the one Body formed by the baptized with Christ, our head. When we stand, kneel, sit, bow, and sign ourselves in common action, we give unambiguous witness that we are indeed the Body of Christ, united in body, mind, and voice.



Wisdom of the Fathers

"Throughout history, to the present day, there is found among different peoples a certain awareness of a hidden power, which lies behind the course of nature and the events of human life. At times, there is present even a recognition of a supreme being, or still more of a Father. This awareness and recognition results in a way of life that is imbued with a deep religious sense... So, too, other religions which are found throughout the world attempt in different ways to overcome the restlessness of people's hearts by outlining a program of life covering doctrine, moral precepts and sacred rites.

The Catholic Church rejects nothing of what is true and holy in these religions..."

Nostra Aetate, paragraph 2 (Pope Paul VI)

oday's gospel presents a theology of profound significance and consequence. On the surface it appears that Jesus is having a bad day! Here we find a Canaanite woman begging Jesus to bring peace and healing to her daughter's life. Who could refuse such a request? Jesus' response is both harsh and rude. He tells the woman that he was sent to the lost sheep of the house of Israel and virtually refers to her as subservient by using an image of a dog. Why would Jesus do such a thing? Jesus was responding as a Jew to this Canaanite woman. The Canaanites had been the public enemies of the Jews for 1000 years – there was a lot of animosity between them. However, this woman's persistence and faith triumphs over this tragic estrangement. Jesus' heart is moved with compassion at the sight of this woman's faith. The gift of faith transcends the exclusive nature of Jesus' mission.

The mission of Jesus is redefined in this encounter. Jesus brings healing to the world of the non-Jew. This act opens the world to the economy of salvation. Jesus recognizes that faith can be relevant to others. The compassion that Jesus has for this troubled child and her mother moves him beyond the boundaries of an institutionalized faith and starts to tear down the walls of indifference and discrimination. Up to this moment, Jesus

brought the message of the gospel to Israel, but now he realizes that faith could exist outside of Judaism. The people of Israel had always been known in the realm of faith and monotheism as the "chosen people" or "elect" of God. It was to Israel that God revealed himself and sent the patriarchs and prophets to establish covenants and relationship with Him. Israel was promised the Messiah who would lead them out of bondage into freedom. Jesus the Christ, as Messiah, comes into the world and offers radical freedom freedom from sin and world oppression by believing in his name. Although his message is delivered to the House of Israel, in today's gospel we discover Jesus' message could not be contained to Israel any longer because the whole world had begun to cry out for Him.

The message of the gospel frees us from discrimination and encourages us to respect people from every walk of life. The event of the Canaanite woman reminds us that we

cannot box God in, but that we must recognize that God is at work in the world in many remarkable ways. Even though our Church contains within its history and tradition the fullness of truth, this in no way is meant to exclude others. Indeed, every Jew, Muslim, Hindu, Baptist, Methodist, Episcopalian, etc., is not excluded from the kingdom. Rather, all Christian denominations and other faith traditions possess something of the spirit of truth which demands a respect and dignity from all of us. As the prophet Isaiah said, "Observe what is right and do what is just... for my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples."

Reflection Questions

- 1. How is Jesus shaped by the world in which he was raised?
- 2. What does the encounter with the Canaanite woman teach you about God's initiative of salvation?
- 3. How has institutionalized faith been abused in the past?
- 4. In what way does this gospel challenge people's approach of making absolute the truths about a particular faith?
- 5. How do you allow the gospel to shape your life?
- 6. Name the ways in which the institution of the Church reflects the gospel and shapes your life?
- 7. How are you being called to reach out to those who live outside your faith experience?

We pray:

Lord, let us clearly see people of other faiths as a gift to be embraced. May we be united one day around one table, sharing the one bread and the one cup. Let us work together for the common good of humanity. May those who are estranged learn to let go of earthly pride to join hands in friendship. Encourage our Mother, the Church, to lead and show us the way so that discrimination and hatred will be no more.

"Isn't that a Protestant hymn?" The question was posed to me by a friend after Mass last week, which had just concluded with the stirring "Faith of Our Fathers". I'm only too happy to debunk this misconception—held by many Protestants themselves, as we'll see. Fr. Frederick Faber, the author of the text, was originally an Anglican priest in the 19th century who came under the influence of the Oxford Movement and Fr. John Henry Newman in particular. Like the great Blessed Cardinal Newman, Faber converted to Catholicism (a month after Newman), was ordained, and wrote theological works for the Church over the remainder of his too-short life (59 years). What has endured, however, are his hymns, including "Brightest and best of the stars of the morning", "Daily, daily sing to Mary", and "Hail, glorious St. Patrick, dear saint of our Isle!", among many others—including today's recessional, "There's a Wideness In God's Mercy"!

In the book Then Sings My Soul, Book 2: 150 of the World's Greatest Hymn Stories, Robert J. Morgan writes, "What most Protestants don't know is that Faber wrote this song to remind the Catholic Church of its martyrs during the days of the Protestant King Henry VIII and Queen Elizabeth I". (p. 79). Ironic, then, that Protestants sing it so often and so lustily that most-my friend includeddon't even know it's a Catholic hymn any more, one written and sung for "these Catholic heroes, martyred at the hands of [the] Protestant monarchs" (ibid)!
