

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## Annual Undy Sunday August 14 and August 21

It is back to school time for Lee County public schools Monday, August 8, while Collier County students will return to school Monday, August 22. With this in mind, Catholic Charities of Collier County is once again sponsoring Undy Sunday the weekends of August 14 and August 21.

“We have been informed by school staff sources that a surprising number of children lack decent, or sometimes any, underwear. Therefore, we ask you to please bring new underwear (and socks) sizes 6 through 12 to church, the weekends of August 14 and August 21 to give youngsters a decent start in their school year,” John Fitzgerald, Catholic Charities co-chair, said.

This is the 15th annual event. Since the initial Undy Sunday in 1997, the number of participating churches has more than doubled. Approximately 650,000 undergarments have been given to

disadvantaged children in Collier County during the past 14 years. As mentioned in Scott’s Corner last week, “It is hard to imagine these children doing without such basic necessities as clean underwear and socks; however, the fact is that this situation is all too prevalent throughout Collier County. The good news is that this is a program in which everyone can participate.”

For example, a little girls combo pack (9 pairs of underwear and 6 pairs of socks) costs as little as \$10.50 at Wal-Mart (at the corner of US-41 and 111th Avenue North).

Please look for the Undy Sunday boxes in the narthex of the church on the weekends of August 14 and August 21. Catholic Charities volunteers will pick up from all churches and see that the items get to the schools for proper distribution to needy children of Collier County.

Cash donations will also be

accepted to purchase additional underwear and socks or to meet other needs of children, such as backpacks and school supplies. For

cash donations, please make checks payable to Catholic Charities – Undy Sunday.

“Last year more than 40 churches and synagogues took part, with wonderful results for needy children,” Fitzgerald said. “It may be difficult for some in Collier County to believe that hundreds of children here are in need of underwear and socks. To be convinced, speak with school personnel, staff at Youth Haven, the Shelter for Abused Women & Children or the like. Your eyes will be opened.”

# Bridging Gap Goal of Alienated Grandparents Anonymous

*Our Mission is to provide information and support to grandparents that feel alienated and/or estranged from access to their grandchildren.*

Too many grandparents are walking around our community needing help to cope with grandparent alienation issues. Too many parents deny access or severely limit access to the grandchildren. This occurs even when a meaningful relationship between the grandparent and grandchild has already been formed. It is like being amputated from their grandparents. There is no socio-economic group unprotected from such devastation.

The dynamics of a family can be torn apart by selfish choices made by adult children. This can cause a separation in the family that separates grandchildren from grandparents. Some damage can take years to repair; sometimes it never gets repaired. Now there is finally a group where a discussion can happen about family dynamics, support and direction shared. The group, Alienated Grandparents Anonymous (AGA), will have its first meeting at St. John the Evangelist September 15 at 7:00 p.m.

This alienation is a very serious problem of the baby boom generation which needs to be addressed. These grandparents need to know they are not suffering alone. AGA will bring awareness to this issue which faces our grandchildren and is tormenting our grandparents.

If death takes a grandparent from a grandchild that is a tragedy. But if family's bickering and vindictiveness deny a child the love of a grandparent, that's a shame.

Grandparents are an intricate part of raising and loving our young ones unconditionally and preparing them for society. They can

serve as outstanding role models, especially if there is chaos in their home. Unhealthy minds in a family create chaos. How many thousands of grandchildren are entangled in inter-family disputes?

Grandparents provide a balance in grandchildren's lives that no one else can replicate. Studies have shown that multi-generational contact between children and their grandparents provides a special unconditional love and nurturing which is healthy for children.

Alienation often begins with the undermining daughter-in-law. These children are being withheld with little or no provocation. Grandparents are made to feel uncomfortable when they attempt to visit. Withholders make the visiting difficult or embarrassing for the grandparents. The deliberate misunderstandings about timing of the grandparents' visits are common. During visits, the parents often exert some kind of negative pressure on the situation, making the children feel strange about being friendly toward their grandparents.

So many grandchildren are not allowed to reveal their true feelings about their grandparents to their parents. They are forced to go emotionally underground.

AGA will focus on the struggle so many grandparents have in being part of their grandchildren's lives. Grandparents who attend will remain anonymous so that everyone will feel free to openly share their feelings and perceptions. Each meeting will be led by one of our Board of Consultants who form our Steering Committee. We intend to offer support, understanding and help to validate the feelings of those dealing with this issue. There will be discussions on ways to diffuse the situation with

the parents. AGA will provide an exchange of information, a sharing of experiences, and work toward bringing alienated grandparents and grandchildren together.





### *Sacrament of Baptism*

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.



Have you visited our memorial garden recently? Surrounded by a beautiful and very thick Ficus hedge on the Southwest side of the church, many would not even know this garden exists. Our landscapers have done a magnificent job of creating a delightful environment as the final resting place

for our parishioners and their immediate family. Just this past week, four different parish couples chose to purchase space in our memorial garden. One of these four couples was hesitant about purchasing space in our Catholic Memorial Garden and suggested they might like to look elsewhere. After comparing prices at other cemeteries, they quickly returned to St. John the Evangelist and took advantage of a truly great deal. It costs only \$1,200.00 to purchase a space in our memorial garden. This is an all inclusive price meaning it includes the opening, closing, granite headstone and bronze nameplate. I can assure you that this is an incredibly competitive price. As a reminder, space is very limited and sale of space in the garden may be terminated without notice. I took over the management of the memorial garden several years ago and have learned plenty since that time. The most important thing I have learned is that pre-planning is essential. Those couples who plan ahead and purchase space in our memorial garden have one less thing to worry about when a loved one passes away. Conversely, when you pass away, you will leave your family one less thing to worry about.

As much as I find my affiliation with the memorial garden slightly morbid, I have actually enjoyed the opportunity to sit down with our parishioners and get to know them better. It has also allowed me to ask them candidly “how are we doing?” I have been pleasantly surprised at the answers to this question as many of you are quite pleased with our progress. I also use this opportunity to set the record straight on any

number of concerns our parishioners may have. The rumor mill has an odd way of spinning the truth and I am always available to clear up any misconceptions. So I will hope that my feeble attempt at a sales pitch in the prior paragraph will entice more of our parishioners to come on down and see me.

Work continues on the Paniccia Prayer Garden. This past week, crews from Driftwood Garden Center began installation of the water feature which will be the centerpiece of the garden. St. Francis of Assisi will be perched atop the water feature with water cascading below him. Technicians from Best Buy began installation of the sound system last week which will feature

eight speakers randomly placed in the shrubs within the garden. We will then have the option of playing spiritual music, chants or whatever is deemed appropriate at any time of the day or night. We are also installing a wireless microphone system so that programs may be hosted in the garden such as the Seven Last Words.

Please pray for our pastor and the youth while they are on mission in the Caribbean. On July 29, Fr. John escorted a sizable group of missionaries from around the Diocese of Venice to St. Lucia. While on mission, the youth will distribute the backpacks and supplies that you (our parishioners) so generously donated through our “Mission Backpack” Lenten program. I eagerly anticipate the pictures of the children of St. Lucia receiving their backpacks and

supplies. As a parish, we collected nearly \$23,000.00 towards this Lenten backpack project. The missionaries will return on August 13, hopefully with a better understanding of how blessed we are to live in the United States of America.

We have reached another milestone with regards to the Catholic Faith Appeal. We have (just barely) broken the 60% threshold with approximately five months remaining in the 2011 appeal. Thank you once again to those who have given so generously to the CFA. Remember, that my wish is to



# The Word & Life

## *A Gentle God*

### **Wisdom of the Fathers**

**“In our times a special obligation binds us to make ourselves the neighbor of every person without exception and of actively helping him when he comes across our path, whether he be an old person abandoned by all, a foreign laborer unjustly looked down upon, a refugee, a child born of an unlawful union and wrongly suffering for a sin he did not commit, or a hungry person who disturbs our conscience by recalling the voice of the Lord, ‘As long as you did it for one of these the least of my brethren, you did it for me’ (Matt. 25:40).”**

*Gaudium et Spes (Church in the Modern World) paragraph 27.*

The world of faith contains endless possibilities. For thousands of years, humanity has grappled with faith’s complexity. Even today, countless millions continue to fill our churches, synagogues, temples, shrines, and assembly halls, desiring to be transformed by the world of transcendence. People sometimes go to extraordinary means to find God or meaning for their lives. The answer is not always what we think — sometimes it is staring us in the face. In order to find God and the purpose for our lives, we must listen to the teachings of scripture and the wisdom of the Church, and then look deep within ourselves.

In our first reading from the Book of Kings, Elijah was told by the Lord to go outside the cave because the Lord would be passing by. Elijah was probably expecting the Lord’s presence to be part of a mighty encounter. On the contrary, Elijah experienced the Lord in an unexpected way — in the whispering of the wind. God came to Elijah in a gentle way. Likewise, Jesus comes to the disciples in the midst of a stormy sea offering them gentle reassurance. In the gospel, Jesus comes to his followers in an unexpected way. He defies science and its laws of gravity and physics by walking on the water. Not only were these people frightened because of the storm, they were also frightened by the sight of Jesus walking on the water. Jesus tells them not to be afraid. Caught up in this transcendental moment, we find Peter wanting to be one with Jesus in the whole experience, but he does

not have the faith or the power within him to walk on the water. Why? Peter is distracted by the strong wind and the dangerous waters around him and lacks faith. Jesus recognizes Peter's weakness and stretches out his hand to save Peter, bringing him to safety.

God makes himself known to each of us in unexpected ways. He is very much a God of surprises. We do not necessarily have to go to places of pilgrimage, holy shrines, churches, mountain tops or beaches to find him present (even though God is always in those places). God is present in the vulnerability of love that exists between spouses and is found in the struggles of family life. Wherever people actively engage in works of charity and mercy, God is also there. God can be found in the midst of the poor, the sick, imprisoned,



and the lonely. The Lord is always present to us in the "storms" of our lives always with an outstretched arm, ready to save us. Even though we may lack faith when we are faced with hardships, God is always ready to redeem and save us. Jesus' words to the disciples are words that should resonate with us when we struggle: "Take courage, it is I, do not be afraid." In short, the Lord is a God of all seasons who can be found in every time and place. It is up to each one of us to discern His presence and follow His will.

### **We pray:**

Lord, you are present to us in the whispers of the wind, calling us forth to follow your will. When the storm clouds of life cast their shadow upon us, we humbly ask that you protect us with an outstretched arm. O Lord, be in all things, through all things and above all things. May you transform our world with your tender love and mercy.

Amen.



# Liturgical Participation



**T**he celebration of Mass is an act of the whole assembly gathered for worship. In the Mass, the Church is joined to the action of Christ. We are joined to this divine action through Baptism, which incorporates us into the risen Christ. This action, which lies at “the center of the whole of Christian life” (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal* [GIRM], no. 16), is initiated not by us but by God acting in and through the Church as the Body of the risen Christ. The Liturgy is designed to bring about in all those who make up the worshipping assembly a “participation of the faithful, namely in body and in mind, a participation fervent with faith, hope, and charity” (GIRM, no. 18). To the extent that we are able to participate in this way, the work of redemption becomes personally effective for each of us. By such participation we make the actions and prayers of the Liturgy our own; we enter more fully into our personal communion with Christ’s redeeming act and perfect worship.

“In the celebration of Mass the faithful form a holy people, a people of God’s own possession and a royal priesthood, so that they may give thanks to God and offer the unblemished sacrificial Victim not only by means of the hands of the priest but also together with him, and so that they may learn to offer their very selves. They should, moreover, take care to show this by their deep religious sense and their charity toward brothers and sisters who participate with them in the same celebration. . . . Moreover, they are to form one body, whether in hearing the word of God, or in taking part in the prayers and in the singing, or above all by the common offering of the Sacrifice and by a participating together at the Lord’s table” (GIRM, nos. 95, 96).

The participation of each person in the Liturgy is important. Each person needs to do his or her part.

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## ORDAINED MINISTRIES IN THE LITURGY

Bishops and priests are called to act in the Liturgy in the very person of Christ, on behalf of his people, pronouncing the most sacred prayers of our faith, presiding over the celebration of the sacred mysteries, explaining God’s

Word and feeding God’s People on the Body and Blood of Christ. A bishop has the added responsibility of being the chief shepherd, the principal liturgist of his diocese in his role as the successor of the Apostles. By God’s grace others are ordained to the ministry of deacon. In the celebration of the Mass deacons proclaim the Gospel, occasionally preach the homily, and assist the bishop and priest in exercising their sacred duties.

## OTHER LITURGICAL MINISTRIES

In addition to the ordained ministries, some roles in the Liturgy are exercised by lay people who place their time and talent at the service of the liturgical assembly as acolytes (altar servers), lectors, extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion, cantors, choir members, instrumentalists, leaders of song, and ushers. Others contribute their time and talent to planning and organizing the Liturgy; to keeping the church and the vestments, vessels, and appointments clean and well ordered; or to providing decorations that reflect the spirit of the liturgical feast or season.

This variety of offices and roles is desirable and should be maintained. It is desirable that individuals function in roles of service at Mass. For example, if a deacon is present, the priest celebrant or a concelebrant should not read the Gospel. The lector should not take on the role of a server or an extraordinary minister of Holy Communion. A wide variety of services needs to be performed, and it is preferable that different individuals exercise those services so that the talents and gifts God has placed within the Christian community are fully used and that these roles of service are not monopolized by a few.

Those engaged in liturgical roles need to be well prepared for those roles and to know how to carry them out with reverence, dignity, and understanding. Receiving the proper preparation requires a further gift of time on the part of the person being prepared as well as on the part of those in the parish responsible for the training of liturgical ministers. Finally, the practical task of assigning individuals to particular Masses and organizing the distribution of roles is another indispensable element in the fabric of well-ordered liturgical ministry in a parish.

All the baptized need to understand that part of their duty regarding the Liturgy is to accept some responsibility for the Liturgy, to place themselves and

their God-given talents at the service of the liturgical community whenever possible. Whether one brings up the gifts at the Presentation; reads the Word of God; assists with the distribution of Communion and brings the Eucharist to those unable to be present at Mass; serves at the altar; provides music that augments the joy, solemnity, and festivity of the celebration; or serves the assembled community as an usher, he or she is contributing to the worship of the community and fulfilling the responsibility that comes with Baptism.

Not all members of the parish community will have the time, energy, strength, or ability to serve in these roles. However, individuals must be careful not to excuse themselves too easily. What is important is that all understand that the celebration of Liturgy is not just the responsibility of the pastor, although he is delegated by the bishop to oversee the liturgical life of the parish. Pastors need the help of people who are serious about living out their baptismal right and responsibility to worship.

## THE ROLE OF THE BAPTIZED

This catalog of specialized roles might give the impression that those who are not exercising one of these roles are free to sit back passively and simply let the Liturgy happen around them. Nothing could be further from the truth. Those who come together for Liturgy do not have the luxury of acting as spectators, waiting for all to be done for them. “Full, conscious, and active participation” in the Liturgy (as commended by the Second Vatican Council) is not only their right but also their duty and their responsibility. That responsibility includes full engagement throughout the liturgical celebration. The baptized faithful who form the congregation are called to join in praise and thanksgiving in song and spoken word, to listen attentively to God’s Word, and to exercise their baptismal priesthood in prayer for the Church, the world, and all in need during the General Intercessions.

In the Liturgy of the Eucharist the baptized faithful join their prayer to that of the priest celebrant, offering Christ the Victim, “not only by means of the hands of the priest but also together with him,” and offer themselves as well (GIRM, no. 95). Their participation culminates

in the reception of the Body and Blood of the Lord, the sacrament that unites them more fully with Christ their Head and with one another. We need to be aware, therefore, that “participation” does not refer primarily to external activity or function during the celebration of Mass; rather, it refers to a deeply spiritual, interior participation of mind and heart, filled with devotion and penetrating the very depths of the mysteries we celebrate.

In their sincere efforts to participate, those present minister to the priest celebrant, to others who serve in liturgical roles, and to one another. Their attention and active engagement in the celebration can draw from the priest celebrant and the other ministers the best they have to offer. Their enthusiastic song and verbal responses made with conviction can encourage others to sing and respond; their very presence at the celebration of Mass when so many other enticing options might have been chosen instead supports and reinforces others who have made the same choice.

The Liturgy, then, is about the action of God’s own people, each with different offices and roles. When we play our roles in the Liturgy with our bodies, minds, and hearts fully engaged, we make to God a perfect sacrifice of praise.
