

This Sunday We Celebrate Good Shepherd Sunday with Special Focus on All Vocations

It has become clear across the country that there is a significant decline in the desire of young people to choose a vocation in the Church. With the aging population of the priests, brothers, sisters, and deacons, this decline is even more perilous for us as Catholics. The time is now to find new avenues and opportunities to showcase and shepherd vocations as a valuable and powerful option for youth. You may not know it, but this is one of the reasons behind the Life Center, CYO, the NET Missionaries, and the other initiatives St. John has put in place to engage youth and the young community here in Naples. We understand that by making the Catholic Church their community, the fellowship of the young people, they will have a positive engagement with their faith and

That relationship can blossom into a vocational call.

Additionally, St. John has created a ministry for our Parish Family, under the direction of the Diocese of Venice. The Vocations Ministry will connect with the various groups, ranging from the Youth Group to the Altar Servers, the Boy Scouts to the Knights of Columbus, the Choir to the Lectors in search of young people that have illustrated the spark of vocation already in their soul. The Vocations Ministry will include a Prayer Group, whose members will dedicate time for prayers to support all the vocations. It will also determine how to illustrate that we all have a vocation, from marriage to community service, and that through these vocations, we can illustrate the love, joy, and healing power of the Catholic Church.

Vocation: Married Life. Many of us have chosen that vocation, but may not have realized just what a vocation it is. In his Apostolic Exhortation, **The Joy of Love**, Our Holy Father illustrates just how important marriage is to our faith and our future:

72. The sacrament of marriage is not a social convention, an empty ritual or merely the outward sign of a commitment. The sacrament is a gift given for the sanctification and salvation of the spouses, since "their mutual belonging is a real representation, through the sacramental sign, of the same relationship between Christ and the Church. The married couple are therefore a permanent reminder for the Church of what took place on the cross; they are for one another and for their children witnesses of the salvation in which they share through the sacrament". Marriage is a vocation, inasmuch as it is a response to a specific call to experience conjugal love as an imperfect sign of the love between Christ and the Church. Consequently, the decision to marry and to have a family ought to be the fruit of a process of vocational discernment.


We have finalized all the physical signage changes we have described, so from now on, we will using the below names for rooms here at St. John for all events:

- **Parish Activity Center (PAC):** Replaces the Parish Life Center, as that name would be confusing due to our upcoming Pulte Family Life Center (PLC). This is the building where the Ballroom, our Parish Offices, and ten classrooms reside.
- **Rome:** Our first renovation task was to renew a heavily used small reception and meeting room, that used to be called the Library. The PAC will be our Europe, so the focal point of Catholicism in Rome made sense to use that name as our first room of the new environment.

Of course, signage does not have to be boring. Our new bathroom signs are a perfect example, illustrating that same connection to our faith, but is a whimsical way, with sisters for the ladies' rooms and priests for the men's rooms.

#ToKnow, #ToLove – Pope Francis, Vocations, and a Trip to Egypt

Our Holy Father took a trip last weekend to a dangerous place for Christians right now, Egypt. With the same safety procedures he uses whenever he travels, and his same missionary spirit that will not be silenced by threats, Pope Francis spoke out on the effects of violence and hatred in some of his most impassioned speeches to date. If you have not seen them or read them in their entirety, I highly recommend taking the time to do so. Here are a few essential snippets:

Pope Francis Speaking of Peace and Interreligious Dialog at the International Peace Conference:

As religious leaders, we are called, therefore, to unmask the violence that masquerades as purported sanctity and is based more on the "absolutizing" of selfishness than on authentic openness to the Absolute. We have an obligation to denounce violations of human dignity and human rights, to expose attempts to justify every form of hatred in the name of religion, and to condemn these attempts as idolatrous caricatures of God: Holy is his name, he is the God of peace, God salaam. Peace alone, therefore, is holy and no act of violence can be perpetrated in the name of God, for it would profane his Name. – Pope Francis 4/28/2017 http://www.news.va/en/news/pope-at-al-azhar-religious-leaders-must-unmask-vio

Speech to Egyptian Parliament and Leaders:

All of us have the duty to teach coming generations that God, the Creator of heaven and earth, does not need to be protected by men; indeed, it is he who protects them. He never desires the death of his children, but rather their life and happiness. He can neither demand nor justify violence; indeed, he detests and rejects violence ("God... hates the lover of violence": Ps 11:5). The true God calls to unconditional love, gratuitous pardon, mercy, absolute respect for every life, and fraternity among his children, believers and nonbelievers alike.

It is our duty to proclaim together that history does not forgive those who preach justice, but then practice injustice. History does not forgive those who talk about equality, but then discard those who are different. It is our duty to unmask the peddlers of illusions about the afterlife, those who preach hatred in order to rob the simple of their present life and their right to live with dignity, and who exploit others by taking away their ability to choose freely and to believe responsibly. It is our duty to dismantle deadly ideas and extremist ideologies, while upholding the incompatibility of true faith and violence, of God and acts of murder. – Pope Francis 4/28/2017 http://www. romereports.com/2017/04/28/pope-francis-full-speech-toegyptian-authorities

True faith is one that makes us more charitable, more merciful, more honest and more humane. It moves our hearts to love everyone without counting the cost, without distinction and without preference. It makes us see the other not as an enemy to be overcome, but a brother or sister to be loved, served and helped. It spurs us on to spread, defend and live out the culture of encounter, dialogue, respect and fraternity. It gives us the courage to forgive those who have wronged us, to extend a hand

to the fallen, to clothe the naked, to feed the hungry, to visit the imprisoned, to help orphans, to give drink to those who thirst, and to come to the aid of the elderly and those in need (cf. Mt 25). True faith leads us to protect the rights of others with the same zeal and enthusiasm with which we defend our own. Indeed, the more we grow in faith and knowledge, the more we grow in humility and in the awareness of our littleness.

God is pleased only by a faith that is proclaimed by our lives, for the only fanaticism believers can have is that of charity! Any other fanaticism does not come from God and is not pleasing to him! – Pope Francis 4/29/2017 http://en.radiovaticana.va/ news/2017/04/29/pope_francis_in_cairo_full_text_of_homily_ at_sat_am_mass_/1308944

Most importantly for this Good Shepherd Sunday, however, was his speech to the religious and priests of Egypt. His call for those in vocations ring true for all Catholics as we live out our single life, our marriages, our religious life, or our priesthood:

Although there are many reasons to be discouraged, amid many prophets of destruction and condemnation, and so many negative and despairing voices, may you be a positive force, salt and light for this society. Like the engine of a train, may you be the driving force leading all towards their destination. May you be sowers of hope, builders of bridges and agents of dialogue and harmony.

This will be possible if consecrated men and women do not give in to the temptations they daily encounter along their way. I would like to highlight some of the greatest of these temptations.

- 1. The temptation to let ourselves be led, rather than to lead.
- 2. The temptation to complain constantly.
- 3. The temptation to gossip and envy.
- 4. The temptation to compare ourselves to others.
- 5. The temptation to become like Pharaoh, that is to harden our hearts and close them off to the Lord and our brothers and sisters.
- 6. The temptation to individualism.
- 7. The temptation to keep walking without direction or destination.

Vocation: Single Life. The opportunities to serve God and heed his call to love and support those that need it can be equally served by those who choose not to go into religious life, or get married. Single life may be lived out either from choice or from circumstance. Some people choose to remain single because they believe this is how they can best serve God and his people. They do not feel called to join a religious order or the priesthood. They may be lay missionaries, like a teacher or a doctor, who can more easily respond to need, wherever it is perceived, if they are not tied by an intimate relationship or family responsibilities. But equally they may be a carpenter, office worker, scientist, or truck driver, who has a fulfilling

personal relationship with Jesus which they feel able to live out deeply.

Other people are single because of where they are on their life's journey. This may be a temporary or permanent situation. For example, a young person who is contemplating their future is still called to live their life for God while they are single. A person who has been widowed or divorced and thus is no longer living the vocation of Marriage may now live the vocation of Single Life and find new opportunities to enrich the world around them with their faith.

Vocation: Religious Life. There are some of us that grew up with nuns and their rulers as our grade school teachers. Still others of

us had Friars or Irish Christian Brothers who played basketball with us after school and Sisters who served in the soup kitchen every weekend. Our Catholic Church would be a quiet place indeed without those that have dedicated their lives to our faith and taken vows to poverty, chastity and obedience. These individuals teach, serve, and shepherd us as a community and the world at large. It is astounding to see the breadth and depth of Religious Life opportunities, in the various communities (Jesuit, Salesian, Franciscan, Dominican, etc.), and the types of efforts that the Religious take on. From working in the slums of Calcutta to the halls of the most prestigious universities in the world, the prospects for Religious Life are as broad as those of us that are not called to that life.

Vocation: Priesthood. At last year's Vocations Dinner Fr. John and Bishop Dewane shared similar thoughts on the new Vocations Ministry. "There is no Catholic Church without vocations, there is no future church without youth engaged in

their faith and discernment of their potential vocation. Youth cannot find it on their own."

Pope Francis spoke about the need for the entire community to come together for vocations:

The call of God comes to us by means of a mediation which is communal. God calls us to become a part of the Church and, after we have reached a certain maturity within it, he bestows on us a specific vocation. The vocational journey is undertaken together with the brothers and sisters whom the Lord has given to us: it is a con-vocation. Hearing the Call of the Shepherd

uring the canonizations of St. John XXIII and St. John Paul II, it was amazing to see the Catholics across the globe contemplating the impact that they made, not only upon the Church, but upon the world. These Vicars of Christ certainly listened closely to the Shepherd and in following his call, shared in God's work leading us to Christ. The sheep gate that Jesus refers to in today's gospel is most certainly a narrow gate through which the sheep enter. St. John XXIII took the brave step of confronting the Church and its ineffectiveness in reaching people in the midst of the modern world. The work of the Second Vatican Council contemplated contemporary society and provided a framework in which the Church could adequately address its pastoral realities. Obviously, he courageously entered into undiscovered territories and enabled the Church to dialogue with culture in order to bring souls through the narrow gate that would lead to salvation. Throughout the pontificate of St. John Paul II the culture of death that pervades our society was confronted. St. John Paul II reminded us to choose life in the midst of a world that often fails to recognize the dignity of life in all of its stages. He showed us that all people were sacred to God. He

confronted world leaders who promoted the culture of death. He was clear in his message to the world to choose a road less traveled and to pursue a gate that so many are reluctant to enter. A gate that leads us into an environment in which God's will is honored and in which every individual is given equal dignity.

St. John Paul II heard the call to follow the shepherd as a young man as he struggled under the Nazi occupation of Poland. He sacrificed his worldly ambition and pleasures to answer the call. At times his life was put in danger as he confronted the evils of socialism and martial law. Pope Benedict XVI continued to give witness by his personal sacrifice and leadership as successor of Peter. His first Encyclical: "Deus Caritas Est" reminds all of us that the most basic call of Christ the Good Shepherd is one of love. Countless men and women have responded so generously to this call to spread God's love by entering the priesthood or religious life. The priests who serve you at the altar are living reminders that God calls individuals to lead His people to restful pastures and lifegiving waters through the sacraments and ministry of the Church. This is a gift that cannot be taken for granted. Most people are aware that the number of priests and religious is on the decline in the United States. Many parishes are without priests and rely on lay leadership to lead the community in prayer on the day of the Lord. These communities look forward to a traveling priest who comes to celebrate the sacraments with them. It is a simple fact that without the priest, there is no Eucharist. Now, Pope Francis is reminding all the shepherds (leaders) of the Church that joy must be the fruits of their ministry. He desires that its leaders do not look for the temples on the hill but the bruised Church that exists on the streets. True shepherding within the Church allows the poor, the broken, and the marginalized to feel they are loved and accepted, healed and transformed.

Each of us is called by our baptism to become a priestly, prophetic, and kingly people, to respond generously to Jesus' invitation to live life to its fullness, and to be faithful

stewards of the Church. We are called to follow the Shepherd who brings us to the pastures of healing and forgiveness and the waters of justice and peace. As a Church, we are responsible for making the kingdom of God a reality through our laws, economic power, and care for God's vulnerable. We are invited to enter through the narrow gate to which the Shepherd leads us. Through the vocation of marriage and family, you are asked to bring to your children an awareness of their vocation and the call of God in their lives, and to encourage them to share in the work of the Shepherd by giving their lives to the Church. The reality is God will not leave His people without shepherds. The question is: are you willing to hear the call to serve and enter the narrow gate?



Beginning Tuesday evening, May 16, and continuing for five weeks, we will begin to explore the life and works of the great 20th century Evangelist



G.K. CHESTERTON

"Chesterton is like fine wine or smooth scotch, and it is usually happier to 'drink' in good company, than to 'drink' alone."

At 6'4" and over 300 lbs. at his heaviest, G.K. himself was a heavy-weight, and his intellect even heavier-weighted. Nonetheless remembering that "angels can fly because they

take themselves lightly," this larger than life apostle of common sense also took himself lightly because he took his faith seriously. He came to know God, but he came to know himself better, which made him a better man. He was a joyfully serious thinker and wordsmith whom people loved (and love).


We will begin by viewing, or reviewing, Bishop Robert Barron's introduction to Chesterton in his recently released series, *The Pivotal Players*.

Subsequent weeks we will view and discuss episodes of the popular program, *The Apostle of Common Sense*, a television series on EWTN, in which Host Dale Ahlquist and actor Chuck Chalberg bring Chesterton's words to life. These programs are designed to help viewers discover and rediscover G.K. Chesterton, to be challenged by his ideas, to see the completeness of his thought, and to be treated to the joy and depth of his faith.

We will select episodes from this series that cover The Man, i.e., *An Introduction to G.K. Chesterton and Chesterton for Today*, Apologetics, i.e., *Orthodoxy and The Everlasting Man*, and Social Criticism, i.e., *What's Wrong with the World* and The Outline of Sanity.

For those who are interested, this can be the start of deeper study of Chesterton's writings.


