Our Lenten Journey: Pope Francis' Reflection of Lent to Pause, See, and Return

I have always loved Lent as a time for reflection, contemplation, and renewal in my faith. It is not just an opportunity to look inward and take stock of your own life, but to take time to look around. Edmund Burke reminds us that "[a]ll that is necessary for the triumph of evil is that good men do nothing." There is so much hate and anger in the world today, we need to take stock of ourselves and truly search for the beauty of life around us. Our Holy Father has given us all a set of instructions for how to journey through Lent for this purpose: to Pause, See, and Return:

The season of Lent is a favorable time to remedy the dissonant chords of our Christian life and to receive the ever new, joyful, and hope-filled proclamation of the Lord's Passover. The Church in her maternal wisdom invites us to pay special attention to anything that could dampen or even corrode our believing heart.

We are subject to numerous temptations. Each of us knows the difficulties we have to face. And it is sad to note that, when faced with the ever-varying circumstances of our daily lives, there are voices raised that take advantage of pain and uncertainty; the only thing they aim to do is sow distrust. If the fruit of faith is charity – as Mother Teresa often used to say - then the fruit of distrust is apathy and resignation. Distrust, apathy, and resignation: these are demons that deaden and paralyze the soul of a believing people.

Lent is the ideal time to unmask these and other temptations, to allow our hearts to beat once more in tune with the vibrant heart of Jesus. The whole of the Lenten season is imbued with this conviction, which we could say is echoed by three words offered to us in order to rekindle the heart of the believer: pause, see, and return.

Pause a little, leave behind the unrest and commotion that fill the soul with bitter feelings which never get us anywhere. Pause from this compulsion to a fast-paced life that scatters, divides and ultimately destroys time with family, with friends, with children, with grandparents, and time as a gift... time with God.

Pause for a little while, refrain from the need to show off and be seen by all, to continually appear on the

"noticeboard" that makes us forget the value of intimacy and recollection.

Pause for a little while, refrain from haughty looks, from fleeting and pejorative comments that arise from forgetting tenderness, compassion, and reverence for the encounter with others, particularly those who are vulnerable, hurt, and even immersed in sin and error.

See the gestures that prevent the extinguishing of charity, that keep the flame of faith and hope alive. Look at faces alive with God's tenderness and goodness working in our midst.

See the face of our families who continue striving, day by day, with great effort, in order to move forward in life, and who, despite many concerns and much hardship, are committed to making their homes a school of love.

See the faces of our children and young people filled with yearning for the future and hope, filled with "tomorrows" and opportunities that demand dedication and protection. Living shoots of love and life that always open up a path in the midst of our selfish and meagre calculations.

See our elderly whose faces are marked by the passage of time, faces that reveal the living memory of our people. Faces that reflect God's wisdom at work.

See the faces of our sick people and the many who take care of them; faces which, in their vulnerability and service, remind us that the value of each person can never be reduced to a question of calculation or utility.

Return without fear to experience the healing and reconciling tenderness of God. Let the Lord heal the wounds of sin and fulfill the prophecy made to our fathers: "A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you; and I will take out of your flesh the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh" (Ezek 36: 26).

Pause, see, and return!



SPOTLIGHT ON WoW

After Hurricane Irma swirled through Naples, members of WoW (Women of the Word) ventured from our powerless homes to gather together at the damaged St John Parish. We were blessed to be able to meet in the Cry Room of the church as the staff vacated the temporary office space for their weekly meeting. There were tears and laughter, support and commiseration, hugs and relief, and many prayers of gratitude. We shared our stories and found solace in our community. We also messed up the bulletin because we did not get to the planned lesson! (Sorry Jack K!)

WoW is a group of women who meet 51 Thursdays a year (all except Thanksgiving!) to study our Catholic faith. We alternate from a study on the Bible and then onto a Catholic book. We've learned from Genesis, Exodus, and the Prophets. We 'Rediscovered Jesus,' guided by Matthew Kelly's book. Sonja Corbitt 'Unleashed' us to experience new ways of listening to the nudges of the Holy Spirit.

There are many reasons why we meet every week. Here are just a few:

"I keep coming back to continue my education about the Lord and my faith. Our classes are educational and social. It is an opportunity to see scripture and our faith-lives from different perspectives."

"I keep returning because I am learning things I never knew before. I get a better understanding of the Old Testament. The WoW team is an asset to each other and the whole group."

"From going to mass weekly and on Sunday, I wanted to read and know more about the whole Bible, the Old and the New Testaments. The group and leader interact, and everyone gives her interpretation of what the author of 'Unleashed' means to teach us."

"At my parish, we had Bible Studies during "season" but not year-round. My friend, Deb, invited me to join her group at St. John's. I keep coming back because of the women of this group. Getting to know these ladies has been a joy to me. The variety of scriptures and books have been very interesting, and it seems I'm always learning!"

And my personal favorite reason comes from Dolores:

"We aren't required to do the homework every week!!"

WoW welcomes any woman of any age to study our faith in a non-judgmental, supportive community. We meet on Thursday mornings at 9:30. Ballroom Repairs and Renovations Begin



Alteration and Transformation

n the gospel today, we recall that Jesus led Peter, James, and John to a place where they would encounter his transfiguration. This was a moment in time when heaven was wedded to earth and humanity was opened to the glory of God. Could you imagine what went through these three men's minds? The encounter gave Peter, James, and John a new insight into Jesus because they glimpsed his divinity. Peter announces, "Rabbi, it is good that we are here!" He is overjoyed with this experience of God. As a Jew, Peter would have held great reverence to the Law and Prophets. On the day of the transfiguration, he witnesses with his very eyes the fulfillment of the Law and the Prophets. Peter wanted to capture the moment by erecting three tents; one for Jesus, one for Moses,

- 6. Where do you feel that Christ is present in the world?
- 7. What does that mean for you?

and one for Elijah. It is obvious to us all that Peter did not want this experience to go away! Mark the Evangelist also recounts that the Father's voice can be heard, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." The three disciples had listened to the dictates of the Law and the promptings of the prophets, now they must listen to the wisdom of God's beloved – Jesus of Nazareth.

The Transfiguration is an important event in salvation history. It reminds the Church of the true identity of Jesus, both human and divine. We are called to the Truth of Jesus through listening to his Word and being doers of his Word. We are urged to "Listen to him." In every aspect of life and in all of our relationships, whether they are familial, social, or political, we are asked to listen to the wisdom of Jesus and apply it. During this season of Lent, we should commit ourselves to discerning the truths of the gospel and undergo conversion. Each of us is asked to transform our lives by what we know of God's message. Peter, James, and John had a life-changing experience on the day of Transfiguration. Jesus' appearance was altered that day as the apostles witnessed his glory. But the faith of these simple men must have been transformed, as well. The words of the gospel are the words of everlasting life. If we listen to these words, take them to heart, and act upon them, we open ourselves to this promise of salvation. Sometimes the gospel requires that we alter the way in which we conduct our lives and choose the road

less traveled.

As we go through life, we experience the highs and the lows in our relationship with God. There are times when we have profound experiences, and we are convinced of God's presence. During these times, most of us wish we could dwell in that moment forever. Many of us have times when we doubt our faith and sometimes feel we are totally alone. During these moments of doubt, we need to recall the moments in which we were totally convinced of the presence of God. The gospel reminds us elsewhere that we are not left alone as orphans. Jesus tells us that he will be with us until the end of the age. The experiences of transcendence within our lives make up our own particular histories — they bring us to the sacrament of the present moment.

Life has a habit of teaching us the truths about God. The Church in Her wisdom gives us the liturgical seasons in which we experience life, death, and resurrection. All of us have to

experience death in order to come to resurrection. The different events of life can bring us to a deeper reality of God's presence. Our lives change when we encounter forgiveness and healing. We all become aware of the other side of life when we encounter the death of a loved one. When parents experience the newness of life, they encounter the God of Creation and the innocence of humanity. When we witness great acts of charity and heroism, we are made aware that we belong to a larger family of the world and recognize that we are People of God. These experiences transform us and remind us that God is forever with us working through, in and with us.

at Epiphany Cathedral, Venice, Florida – First Sunday of Lent, February 18, 2018




These men and women were recognized for progress in their spiritual formation in the RCIA program and sent by our parish community to the cathedral last Sunday for the rite of election or recognition by Bishop Frank Dewane.

Catechumen expressed their desire to enter fully into the life of the Church through the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist at the Easter Vigil. Their names were placed in the Book of the Elect.

The Candidates, who have been previously baptized in another Christian tradition, asked to participate fully in the sacramental life of the Catholic Church. As a reminder of their Baptism and as a sign of their continuing conversion, the bishop invited them to come forward, take the holy water, and sign themselves with the cross of our Lord, Jesus Christ.
