The Joy of Love: Our Faith in Action for the Young and Young at Heart

Our Holy Father has championed the dynamic action of our Catholic Church since his first steps as Pontiff. We are proud to proclaim the Joy of Love as a core precept of how Saint John the Evangelist engages our Parish Family and the community around us with joy in our hearts, open arms, a loving gaze, and service to others with a smile. This cannot be done with doctrinal dissertations, closing in on ourselves, or shushing in church. It must be done with genuine accompaniment, constant mercy, and persistent hospitality and love. His next step is to face the significant challenge of youth and young adult engagement for a religion that is, in many areas of the world, and especially here in the U.S., losing touch and relevance to these generations. There are so many reasons behind this situation that we have discussed in the past, but with all the churches closing up North, it is an objective truth that we all must face together. He will be holding a Synod of Bishops to focus on this challenge.

Father John has given our Parish Family a clear vision to stem this tide here in Naples. The Life Center, Catholic Youth Organization, and Catholic Adult Organization programs will clearly achieve the goals of loving engagement he has laid out for us. Pope Francis helps us see the we have to be open to the youthful (young and young at heart) connection with his message from Palm Sunday:

Jesus enters Jerusalem. The liturgy invites us to share in the joy and celebration of the people who cry out in praise of their Lord; a joy that will fade and leaves a bitter and sorrowful taste by the end of the account of the Passion. This celebration seems to combine stories of joy and suffering, mistakes and successes, which are part of our daily lives as disciples. It somehow expresses the contradictory feelings that we, too, the men and women of today, experience: the capacity for great love but also for great hatred; the capacity for courageous self-sacrifice but also the ability to "wash our hands" at the right moment; the capacity for loyalty but also for great abandonment and betrayal.

We also see clearly throughout the Gospel account that the joy Jesus awakens is, for some, a source of anger and irritation.

Jesus enters the city surrounded by his people and by a cacophony of singing and shouting. We can imagine that amid the outcry we hear, all at the same time, the voice of the forgiven son, the healed leper, or the bleating of the lost sheep. Then, too, the song of the publican and the unclean man;

the cry of those living on the edges of the city. And the cry of those men and women who had followed Jesus because they felt his compassion for their pain and misery... That outcry is the song and the spontaneous joy of all those left behind and overlooked, who, having been touched by Jesus, can now shout: "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord." How could they not praise the one who had restored their dignity and hope? Theirs is the joy of so many forgiven sinners who are able to trust and hope once again. And they cry out. They rejoice. This is joy.

All this joy and praise is a source of unease, scandal, and upset for those who consider themselves righteous and "faithful" to the law and its ritual precepts. A joy unbearable for those hardened against pain, suffering, and misery. Many of these think to themselves: "Such ill-mannered people!" A joy intolerable for those who have forgotten the many chances they themselves had been given. How hard it is for the comfortable and the self-righteous to understand the joy and the celebration of God's mercy! How hard it is for those who trust only in themselves, and look down on others, to share in this joy.

And so here is where another kind of shouting comes from, the fierce cry of those who shout out: "Crucify him!" It is not spontaneous but already armed with disparagement, slander, and false witness. It is a cry that emerges in moving from the facts to an account of the facts; it comes from this "story." It is the voice of those who twist reality and invent stories for their own benefit, without concern for the good name of others. This is a false account. The cry of those who have no problem in seeking ways to gain power and to silence dissonant voices. The cry that comes from "spinning" facts and painting them such that they disfigure the face of Jesus and turn him into a "criminal." It is the voice of those who want to defend their own position, especially by discrediting the defenseless. It is the cry born of the show of self-sufficiency, pride, and arrogance, which sees no problem in shouting: "Crucify him, crucify him."

And so the celebration of the people ends up being stifled. Hope is demolished, dreams are killed, joy is suppressed; the heart is shielded, and charity grows cold. It is a cry of "save yourself," which would dull our sense of solidarity, dampen our ideals, and blur our vision... the cry that wants to erase compassion, that "suffering with" that is compassion, that is the weakness of God.

Faced with such people, the best remedy is to look at Christ's cross and let ourselves be challenged by his final cry. He died crying out his love for each of us: young and old, saints and sinners, the people of his times and of our own. We have been saved by his cross, and no one can repress the joy of the Gospel; no one, in any situation whatsoever, is far from the Father's merciful gaze. Looking at the cross means allowing our priorities, choices, and actions to be challenged. It means questioning ourselves about our sensitivity to those experiencing difficulty. Brothers and sisters, where is our heart focused? Does Jesus Christ continue to be a source of joy and praise in our heart, or do its priorities and concerns make us ashamed to look at sinners, the least and forgotten?

And you, dear young people, the joy that Jesus awakens in you is a source of anger and even irritation to some, since a joyful young person is hard to manipulate. A joyful young person is hard to manipulate!

But today, a third kind of shouting is possible: "And some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples.' He replied, 'I tell you, if these were silent, the very stones would cry out."" (Lk 19: 39-40).

The temptation to silence young people has always existed. The Pharisees, themselves, rebuke Jesus and ask him to silence them.

There are many ways to silence young people and make them invisible. Many ways to anesthetize them, to make them keep quiet, ask nothing, question nothing. "Keep quiet, you!" There are many ways to sedate them, to keep them from getting involved, to make their dreams flat and dreary, petty and plaintive.

On this Palm Sunday, as we celebrate World Youth Day, we do well to hear Jesus' answer to all those Pharisees past and present, even the ones of today: "If these were silent, the very stones would cry out." (Lk 19:40).

Dear young people, you have it in you to shout. It is up to you to opt for Sunday's "Hosanna!", so as not to fall into Friday's "Crucify him!"... It is up to you not to keep quiet. Even if others keep quiet, if we older people and leaders – so often corrupt – keep quiet, if the whole world keeps quiet and loses its joy, I ask you: Will you cry out?

Please, make that choice, before the stones themselves cry out.





Unlocking the Doors of Fear (John 20: 19-31)

t is hard to imagine what must have been going through the disciples' minds after the death of Jesus and the discovery of the empty tomb. All we know is that the disciples had returned to a house after they witnessed the empty tomb and locked the doors. Their fear was legitimate. Any association with Jesus could have brought destruction upon themselves. To fear for one's life is

a powerful and crippling emotion. The followers of Christ were trapped and uncertain about what the future held for them. In the midst of this, Jesus becomes present to them and offers his gift of peace. Jesus' words, "Peace be with you," spoke to their fears and offered them hope. At last they knew that Jesus' words had been fulfilled and their leaving everything to follow him was not in vain. As he showed them his hands and his side, they must have been overwhelmingly aware that they were part of a divine drama that was continually unfolding. Jesus carries the authority to forgive sins along with his great imparting of peace. Thomas, the practical man, cannot believe without seeing this reality for himself. He sees a week later and believes as he affirms, "My Lord and my God!"

When Christ appeared after his resurrection, he appeared as a wounded healer. He unlocks the doors of fear and disbelief in the fragile faith of his disciples. Those men and women were blessed to catch a glimpse of the wounds that carried with them salvation. Those wounds bore witness to the sin of the world – they also revealed God's glory and our hope. After Jesus' death comes resurrection and the ongoing reality of his presence as he imparts

authority upon the disciples. We might well say that the early witnesses of the resurrection certainly had it easy. Afterall, they had seen the realities of the resurrection with their very eyes. For them, especially Thomas, belief flowed from their eyewitness account. However, the reality was that their lives did not become easy after they had witnessed resurrection. The early Church experienced fear when Jesus ascended to the Father and when the Church became persecuted. To be a follower of Christ meant the disciple had to confront the fear of being rejected. Their proclamation of the risen Christ ultimately led them to imprisonment and death. Such martyrdom became, as the early Church father, Tertullian, wrote, "The seed of the Church."

Jesus affirms the future generation of disciples by saying: "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." The very fact that we believe

today is a divine blessing. Sometimes it is hard to believe when we experience the pain of separation and loss. It takes a great leap of faith to have belief when we cannot see the reality of resurrection with the naked eye. However, it is within the gift of faith that we find true peace – a peace that the world cannot give. The only way that we can experience peace after we lose someone we love is by having the hope and security that God offers in the gift of resurrection and eternal life. Our faith enables us to face our fears and know that no matter what, God continues to journey with us.

Wisdom of the Fathers

Do not look forward in fear to the changes in life; rather, look to them with full hope that as they arise, God, whose very own you are, will lead you safely through all things; and when you cannot stand it, God will carry you in His arms.

Do not fear what may happen tomorrow; the same understanding Father who cares for you today will take care of you then and every day.

He will either shield you from suffering or will give you unfailing strength to bear it.

Be at peace, and put aside all anxious thoughts and imaginations.



Newman was many things – controversialist, apologist, theologian, educator, poet – but through it all, he was a lover of the truth. Seeking the truth, especially the truth about God, was the principle passion of his life, and it remained so until his dying day. He ordered that on his gravestone be written, 'From shadows and images, into the Truth."

John Henry Newman came into the Church as a convert and used his prodigious intellectual gifts to help the Church better understand its identity and mission, and engage the challenges of a secular age.

Newman has been characterized as the greatest theologian since St. Thomas Aquinas. He was one of the most eloquent stylists in the English language. When James Joyce was told that he was the most accomplished writer of English, the great Irish novelist responded, 'Nobody has ever written English prose that can be compared with that of a prince of the only true Church.' He was, of course, referring to Newman himself.
