Mamie Blue – LTJG, U.S. Navy – Naples, FL



Mamie Blue was born in Farrell, PA, in March 1929. She attended Farrell High School whereupon graduation she was accepted into nursing school. Mamie attended the Sharon General Hospital School of Nursing in Sharon, PA, and obtained a degree as Registered Nurse (RN). Upon completion of her degree in March 1952, she enlisted in the United States Navy, achieving the grade of Lieutenant JG (LTJG). Mamie was stationed at Portsmouth Naval Hospital in Portsmouth, Virginia. While working at the Naval Hospital, Mamie's primary responsibility was patient care for men returning from Korea who were wounded during battle. Mamie's military service was during the years 1952 to 1954. It was in Portsmouth that she met Bob Blue, a seaman on the USS Helena. She married Bob and gave birth to a daughter they named Debbi Blue. After her years serving America's wounded during the Korean War, Mamie and her family moved to the Three Rivers Michigan area, where she worked at the Three Rivers Hospital as an RN. When she retired, she relocated to Naples, FL, where she resides today. She remains active in her church, surrounding community, and with the Collier-Lee Honor Flight. Mamie has gone on to say, "None of us were really ever honored for our service until going on the Collier-Lee Honor Flight, that was amazing. Thank you!" The Arthur J. Corr Assembly 3308 is proud to salute Mamie Blue for her dedicated service to our Country.

Saverio C. (Sam) Miele – PO2 (E-5) U.S. Navy – Naples, FL



Sam Miele was born in Detroit, MI, on October 26, 1925. As a youngster he was a good athlete and particularly enjoyed playing baseball. He lived in Detroit until 1999 when he moved to Naples. He enlisted in the U.S. Navy in December 1943 at age 18 and served during WWII. He was trained in Morse Code at the University of Chicago and served as a Radioman aboard the USS Adirondack in the Mediterranean. In 1946, thinking he had served his time in the Navy, Sam returned to Detroit. In September 1950 he was called back to active duty. After stops in San Diego and Hawaii, Sam was assigned to the USS Montague in Kobe, Japan. The Montague sailed to Korea, first to Incheon and then to the mine-strewn waters off Wonsan. The vessel assumed the role of a rescue ship and sailed to Chinnampo, North Korea, where it evacuated Republic of Korea soldiers and civilian refugees, including wounded and destitute women and children. Sam was discharged from the Navy in 1952. He returned to Detroit. Sam was a graduate of the renowned Henry Ford Trade School and was employed as an industrial engineer at the Ford Motor Company for many years. Sam and his late wife, Virginia, had two sons, five grandchildren, and one great-grandson. Sam and his wife of 25 years, Diane, live in Naples. The Arthur J. Corr Assembly 3308 is proud to salute Sam Miele for his dedicated service to our Country.



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This is a critical moment in our nation, a land of immigrants. We hear the cries of the children who are being torn away from their parents and family. As the political debate rages, action must be taken, and families need to remain together!

At its core, this is a moral issue, not merely a political debate. This is about the sanctity of the family, a bond that cannot be duplicated or replaced. While we may differ in our views on how to fix the immigration crisis, we can all agree that returning children to their parents must be of utmost priority.

Unlike many of you, I am not a parent, therefore I can only imagine the horror and suffering that takes place when children are torn from their parents' arms. I can recall, as we all can, as a child, the times when separated from our mother and/or father for any length of time – the anguish, the uncertainty, and the deep hurt.

Children are being taken from their parents and detained on our border. They have no parent to comfort them as they are exposed to irreparable harm and trauma facing an uncertain future. Is this how we really want to treat children? Does this address basic human dignity? I hear this deep concern shared with me as I travel throughout the Diocese.

The family is the basic unit of society. When families are forcibly pulled apart, society is severely wounded. While every country has the right to secure and safe borders, it is the moral duty of us all to protect children. The government should not tear apart the family.

As brothers and sisters in Christ, pray for the children, parents, and families who are suffering separation at our border. Pray that our country, the administration, and the lawmakers find a solution to the immigration debate that makes sense and keeps families together.

I stand with my brother Bishops in asking you all to urge lawmakers to put aside politics and act for the moral good – reunite children with their parents!

Annual Independence Celebration Continued

Larry Tomaielly – Private First Class (PFC) U.S. Army – Bonita Springs, FL



Larry Tomaielly was born in Chelsea, MA, on October 1, 1932. He spent his youth in Acushnet, MA. He was drafted into the U. S. Army in October 1952, and served in active duty until January 1955, and in the Army Reserves until 1960. In June 1953, he was deployed to Pohang, South Korea, and then transported via landing craft to Incheon. From there he traveled by train and then by truck to Hill 604 as a member of the 187th Airborne RCT. Larry recalls that as the trucks approached their destination the men saw flashes which appeared to be lightning in the distant sky. Later they realized it was enemy artillery fire. The following month he was injured while attempting to assist a fellow soldier in distress. Larry received shrapnel wounds to his forehead and leg along with a severe concussion. After receiving treatment in a battalion aide station, he was offered the Purple Heart but refused. Having seen many horrible injuries to fellow soldiers, Larry felt his wounds unworthy of it. A short time later he resumed his duties. On July 27, 1953, the Korean Armistice Agreement was signed. On December 27, 1953, he sailed back to San Francisco and then to the Oakland Army Base. Donald H. Payton was born in New Albany, IN, on December 20, 1950. He grew up in Southern Indiana. He joined the U.S. Marine Corps on June 8, 1968, at age 17. Don completed his Recruit Training in San Diego and served four years attaining the rank of Corporal. Don was deployed to Vietnam on January 10, 1969. As a Lance Corporal and later Corporal (E-4), he was a Rifleman and Team Leader, and then served as Acting Platoon Leader. Don spent eight months in Vietnam in the 2nd Battalion 9th Marine 3rd Division. In February 1970, Don returned to the United States and was stationed at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. Courage & Faith

The ministry of Jesus is constantly associated with God's willingness to make humanity whole. Countless people whose names we will never know came to seek the help of Jesus Christ and prayed for the healing they believed that He alone could give. The woman afflicted with hemorrhages had the courage to reach out and touch Jesus' clothes. Something within this woman told her that she would be healed by touching the hem of His garment. She took a tremendous risk venturing out to experience

the healing Lord. She was taught through her Jewish faith that hemorrhages defiled her as a person and made her unclean. If she was found walking around the community in this unclean state, she faced the danger of being stoned to death. This unnamed woman has the courage to reach out for healing, which defines her as a woman of faith. Her courage and faith become her saving grace. Jairus' faith similarly leads to his daughter's healing. Jesus disregards the news of the little girl's death, telling Jairus, "Do not be afraid; just have faith." Jesus shows Jairus that He sees this situation in a different way. Jesus does not see the twelve year old as dead, but asleep – waiting for the power of God to awaken her from sleep. Jesus' power gives her new life – her destiny is in His hands. Jesus then instructs those around her to take care of her temporal needs.


The same healing remains with the Church today. Sometimes we have to have the courage to ask for healing, for what we ask in faith, we will receive. The alcoholic cannot be healed unless he realizes he has a problem with alcohol. The diabetic cannot be healed unless he admits the need for help to regulate his sugar. The one who is depressed cannot be helped without reaching out and admitting his

difficulty. Many things create disease in our lives. The lack of forgiveness, holding onto resentment, and the wounds of past experiences cannot be healed by Christ unless we want them to. Jesus always brings those who ask in faith to full stature of humanity and makes them whole. He offers humanity a second chance to experience the newness of life. Jesus says, "I say to you, arise," offering us a way out of the burdens that come our way. The words of Jesus still echo in the human heart as the Church proclaims His eternal Truth – Do not be afraid; just have faith! We are not to be afraid when confronting the realities of our lives. If we have done something wrong by sinning against God or another, we have to be contrite and ask for that forgiveness. It is at such a sacramental moment, that we can rise above our sin. When we commit ourselves to our Christian story, we are given the courage to rise above resentment and revenge and embrace the language of love that God really intended. We are reminded that we are also intercessors for others. Our faith and prayers can bring about miraculous events in our world. It is through us that Christ speaks and peace becomes a reality.



Conceived in Liberty; Still the Bright Light of Freedom



Every generation of Americans needs to know that freedom consists not in doing what we like, but in having the right to do what we ought.
- Pope St. John Paul II

On Sunday, October 8, 1995, Pope Saint John Paul II concluded a five-day American tour with a mass in Oriole Park at Camden Yards, Baltimore. In his homily he said:

“One hundred thirty years ago, President Abraham Lincoln asked whether a nation ‘conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal’ could ‘long endure.’ President Lincoln’s question is no less a question for the present generation of Americans. Democracy cannot be sustained without a shared commitment to certain moral truths about the human person and human community. The basic question before a democratic society is: ‘How ought we to live together?’ In seeking an answer to this question, can society exclude moral truth and moral reasoning? Can the Biblical wisdom which played such a formative part in the very founding of your country be excluded from that debate?”

As we celebrate our nation’s independence, let us not take for granted the freedoms we enjoy and give thanks to God for the gifts He has given us and our country.

Sometimes it is good to hear from others how they view what we sometimes take for granted:

I BELIEVE THAT FREEDOM IS CONTAGIOUS.

My parents were born in South Korea and came here more than fifty years ago. They came for the education and for the freedom... My father savored freedom like he savored fresh air. He loved the freedom to follow his passions... Driving down the road, he would turn and exclaim: “This is a great, great country. Here, we can do what we want.”

... I studied law, became a law professor and dean, and eventually a human rights official for the State Department. I traveled to scores of countries. Everywhere I went – Haiti, Indonesia, China, Sierra Leone, Kosovo – I saw in the eyes of thousands the same fire for freedom I had first seen in my father’s eyes. Once an Asian dictator told us to stop imposing our Western values on his people. He said, “We Asians don’t feel the same way as Americans do about human rights.” I pointed to my own face and told him he was wrong.

As my time in government ended, I traveled to North Korea. In the eyes of everyone – children, workers, government officials – I saw the lifeless, unfocused stares I had first read about in Orwell’s 1984. I saw people whose aspirations had been crushed by a government that would not provide for their most basic needs. As we flew out of a darkened Pyongyang, I looked down to see where my mother had crossed the border so many years ago. As we approached Seoul, suddenly the landscape glowed with millions of lights. I realized that the only differences between the bright futures to the South and the dark futures of the North were the governments that ruled them.

That is why I believe in the bright lights of freedom.






