Gospel Reflections

Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

In the Gospel story, Jesus gives the gift of sight to a blind man. But since we are not blind, we might think that the Gospel story has no relevance for us. It is precisely because we can see that it has relevance for us. The question is: how well do we see?

The blind man in the Gospel story saw more than the religious leaders, in the sense that he had more faith in Jesus than they had. The Pharisees had perfect eyesight, yet they had no faith in Jesus.


To see well, good eyesight alone is not sufficient. We must not think that blindness is an illness that affects the eyes only. There are many forms of blindness besides physical blindness. In some ways, these are just as crippling. Some examples:

- Selfishness blinds us to the needs of others.
- Insensitivity blinds us to the hurt we're causing to others.
- Snobbery blinds us to the equal dignity of others.
- Pride blinds us to our own faults.
- Prejudice blinds us to the truth.
- Hurry blinds us to the beauty of the world around.
- Materialism blinds us to spiritual values.
- Superficiality blinds us to a person's true worth and causes us to judge by appearances.

It is not with the eyes only that we see. We also “see” with the mind, the heart, and the imagination. A narrow mind, a small heart, an impoverished imagination – all of these lead to loss of vision, darken our lives, and shrink our world.

It has been said that the greatest tragedy is not to be born blind, but to have eyes and yet fail to see. But there is an even worse situation: to have eyes and refuse to see. The latter was the situation of the Pharisees. The most important eyes of all are the eyes of faith. The smallest child with faith sees more than the smartest scientist who had no faith. The Gospel story is essentially a faith story – the story of a man who came to faith in Jesus. The climax of the story is where the man makes a profession of faith: “Lord, I believe.”

While the blind man opened more and more to the light of faith, the Pharisees, though physically sighted, became progressively more spiritually blind. Their blindness was caused by sin. Theirs was a willful blindness – the refusal to see.



The man's journey from blindness to sight symbolizes the journey from unbelief to faith, which is a journey from darkness to light. Physical sight is a wonderful gift which we should never take for granted. But faith is a deeper and more wonderful kind of seeing.

Paul says to the Ephesians, “Once you were in darkness, but now you are light in the Lord.” Without faith we are in deep night and do not know where we are going.

Those who have been enlightened by Christ can never again see themselves and their lives in the same light as before. Everything is lit up with an inner radiance. Faith helps us to find our way through the chaos, confusion, darkness, illness, and grief of the world we live in.

Finishing the Church: Available Memorial Opportunities

We are blessed to be back in our church, again whole with our enlivening faith environment. It has taken tremendous effort to renew our church and our Parish Family. We are now nearing the completion of our church and the financial obligation that came along with this work. So, we have developed: **Finish the Church**, our final push of the Capital Campaign, to complete the transformation of the entire campus and ensure our success for the next 30 years. While we have come far already, we will all need to work together to complete our vision of the new Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church. Last week, we discussed the impact our Parish Family has already had on our **Finish the Church** campaign, with the tremendous gifts that have already been received from many of you. We continue to drive toward our goal of fulfilling our obligation to the Diocese. The loan began as slightly over \$2 million. Finishing the Church: Available Memorial Opportunities

Here are some details of the remaining opportunities:

- **Altar Crucifix:** This massive wood-carved statue was created in Florence, Italy. The artist spent months planning and creating this unique piece just to fit the exact dimensions of our new church Altar wall. It is so impressive and speaks to the Christ crucified, not dead, still very much human and yet suffering for all of us.
- **Altar:** Our brand-new Altar is honed out of the same Florentine quarry marble as the rest of our Liturgical environment and houses an actual first-class relic of Saint Thomas (Doubting Thomas). The beauty of this Altar is in both its simplicity and its powerful presence.
- **Video Screens and Projection System:** When we were planning the new Sanctuary, we knew that the integration of technology would be a necessary component for years to come. As such, we deployed all the cabling needed to have video displays for the back wings of the church, as well as for large-scale powerful projectors, capable of placing easily read and viewed information on the walls on either side of the Altar. The cost of the projectors and screens were not in the current budget, however, so we have reserved this capability for this opportunity.
- **Gift Boutique/Shop:** We have completely renovated the Gift Boutique to make it more capable and open for the various religious items and Sacramentals that tie us personally to our faith.
- **Brick Memorials:** As you can see outside the main entrance of the church, we have begun to install the first set of memorial bricks that were from the gifts of the Parish Family. If you are so called, you can choose the small brick for \$1,000 and have two lines of 25 characters each, or for \$5,000, you can have the larger brick, which includes four lines of 25 characters each.



Letter from Bishop Dewane

Letter from Bishop Dewane Regarding Coronavirus

Dear Brothers and Sister in Christ,

My prayer for you and your family is that you will be kept safe from all harm. With the strength that comes from God, I encourage you to support your neighbors and friends with the Hope that is ours in Jesus Christ. Together, we face the threat posed by the COVID-19 outbreak - a crisis that is unprecedented in our lifetime. Still, there is a need to remain flexible and adapt to circumstances, following, as best we can, the guidance of public health officials.

Guidelines have been established that call for further limiting of public gatherings. Therefore, out of pastoral concern for all, and after prayer and discernment, as well as hearing from the priests and the Faithful, I announce that the regularly scheduled Masses and other Liturgical events in Parish Churches in the Diocese of Venice will be suspended from March 20, 2020 until after Easter, when the situation can be re-evaluated. Visitation to Churches to pray is also suspended. Therefore, the Faithful and visitors to the Diocese are dispensed from any obligation to attend Mass during this period.

This is acknowledged as a sacrifice for the Catholic Faithful, who have a great love for the Holy Eucharist and depend on the Most Blessed Sacrament for their spiritual lives. Do recall that Faithful Catholics, throughout the history of the Church, have kept the faith alive through trying times. By prayer and devotion, as well as spiritual solidarity with each other, the life of faith continued to be a source of strength and perseverance during persecutions and other times of public crisis. Tomorrow, on the Feast of St. Joseph, I will dedicate the Diocese of Venice to the care of the Foster Father of Jesus. Let us be united in prayer to St. Joseph for his intercession and protection.

Our Priests have been asked to draw upon the Church's rich tradition of prayer and devotion to ensure that the spiritual life of parishioners is nourished and remains vibrant through means which are prudently adapted to the current circumstances. Our Diocesan website has a list of opportunities to view the celebration of the Holy Mass. Parish websites will also provide other helpful suggestions for how to promote prayerfulness and spiritual communion.

Priests, together with the Catholic Faithful, are asked to make prudent decisions about Weddings and Funerals while observing guidance to limit gatherings. Baptisms will only be celebrated in cases of emergency. The Anointing of the Sick ought to be requested only in genuine need for the dying. Priests are to take the necessary precautions to protect themselves and the Faithful when administering the Sacraments to the Sick (i.e. the use of isolation gowns, masks and gloves, as well as following the guidelines of medical professionals). All Confirmations prior to Easter have been postponed, along with penance services. Parish and social events, as well as ministry gatherings, are also suspended. Parishioners, in the event of emergency situations, are invited to communicate with a Priest, Deacon or available staff by phone, or by email.

As your Bishop, I am always edified and grateful for the generosity of the Faithful, particularly at difficult times. Of course, you must consider your own circumstances and how the Coronavirus outbreak has impacted your family. However, it is also necessary to provide for the ministry of the Church, as well as continue to serve the poor and the vulnerable through Catholic Charities. The Catholic Faithful are humbly asked to continue their generous support for our Parishes, Schools, Catholic Charities and the Diocese.

My dear Faithful, be confident that Christ is with us always and that the Blessed Virgin Mary and Saint Joseph are interceding for us. Take courage and trust in God during this time of many challenges.



Saint John the Evangelist Clergy, Staff, and Ministers care about your health and safety, especially at times like now, with the spike in Flu cases and the spread of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) around the world. We keep in constant communication with the Diocese of Venice and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to ensure we understand the potential and true risks and preventative measures needed for our Parish Family. As such, we have instituted several proactive procedures for the well-being of our community:

- **Refraining from providing the Precious Blood as part of Communion:** We believe as the Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that Jesus is fully present in the form of the host, and so we have been providing only the Eucharist during Communion.
- **Provide a Sign of Peace Through a Form Most Comfortable to You:** That can be as a bow or hand gesture instead of a handshake or hug. Holding hands during the recitation of the Our Father should also be a personal decision on whom you would touch.
- **Communion on the Tongue Available via Priests:** In order to reduce the potential spread of any pathogen, if you wish to receive the Eucharist on the Tongue, please line up for Communion with a priest, rather than our Eucharistic Ministers.
- **Clergy and Liturgical Ministers New Hygiene Procedures:** We have instituted new procedures that include hand-washing and sanitizing stations as part of their efforts to ensure the health of all our Parish Family and Friends that attend Mass. You will notice sanitizer locations around the Altar as well as in the Sacristy.
- **Offertory Gifts to be Provided at the End of Mass:** Ushers will be posted at the exit doors of the church for you to drop your envelopes or gifts into the baskets, rather than passing them through the pews.
- **Removal of Holy Water Fonts from Doors:** We have removed the Holy Water Fonts from the doors as a precaution from spreading various contaminants.
- **Hand Sanitizer Stations Around Campus:** You will notice hand sanitizer stations located around campus, especially in high traffic locations. Everyone is encouraged to use these, as long as they do not impact your own health (for example, Eczema patients cannot use alcohol-based gels)
- **Take Your Bulletin with You:** As we have removed the Missal books from the pews, the bulletin will be your primary text for the Mass. Please remember to take it with you after Mass, as we are no longer recycling them for the next Mass.
- **Exercise Your Own Judgement:** If you are concerned that you have a health risk for congregating in large groups (compromised immune system, age, etc.), please do not feel obligated to attend Mass. In fact, the Bishop has provided a dispensation from attending for all the Faithful until further notice. You are not going to be in a state of mortal sin for not attending Mass. Instead, we recommend you watch our Mass online, as we have our streaming service available and will stream all weekend Masses.
- **If You Feel Ill, Please Stay Home:** If you feel like you are sick, please stay home and take care of yourself (or your loved one, if they are ill). Again, you will not be considered to be in a state of mortal sin for missing Mass, and you will be ensuring the health of your fellow Parish Family members.
- **All Events and Activities Suspended on Campus:** All meetings, events, programs, and activities have been suspended until further notice for all age groups. All Masses, Services, and Sacraments will continue to be provided both virtually and in person during their normal schedule.

3. "Our Father,"

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name; Thy kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. Amen.

"Hail Mary,"

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

"The Apostles' Creed."

I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; He descended into hell; on the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there He will come to judge the living and the dead....
