Gospel Reflections

Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

There come times in the lives of all believers when things get very dark, and they have to believe what they cannot prove, and to accept even though they cannot understand or make sense of what's happening. It's at such times that we really need strong faith, but it's precisely at such times that our faith can fail us.

It's easy to convince ourselves that we have a strong faith when things are going well. When a crisis arises, we discover what kind of faith we have, or if we have any faith at all. By faith here, I mean trust in God.

Of course, there are people who think that if God was with them, and if He really loved them, then no storm would ever hit them. Life should be all smooth sailing. So when a storm does hit them, they experience a deep crisis of faith, thinking that God has abandoned them.

During the Last Supper, the apostles were thrown into crisis when Jesus started to talk about His death. On hearing this, their hearts were troubled and filled with fear. Knowing that their faith would be severely tested, Jesus tried to prepare them for the ordeal. He said to them, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, and believe also in me." Since the apostles already believed, in effect what He was saying to them was, "You must go on believing in God and in me."

At a time of crisis people feel that God has abandoned them. But Jesus assured the apostles that, even though He was leaving them, He was not abandoning them. Rather, he was going to prepare a home for them, and would return to take them to that home. Hence, no matter what happened, no matter how difficult things might get (and they would get very difficult), they must go on believing, go on trusting in Him and in the Father. That's all they would have to do. Go on believing, go on trusting. Easier said than done.

But at a time of crisis, that is the only thing we can do – go on stubbornly trusting in God. Trust is the greatest thing we can give to another person. At that hour, we must believe that somehow there is a purpose to it all, and that good will come of it. Then the unbearable becomes bearable, and in the darkness, a glimmer of light appears.

What real faith does is assure us that God is with us in the midst of the crisis. It is that feeling, that conviction, that we are not alone, that we are not abandoned, which enables us to get through the crisis.

Life is unintelligible and unendurable without God. That's why faith is so important. When the English singer Charlie Lansboro became a Catholic he said, "I believe completely. I can't imagine my life without my faith. But it took me a long time to get there."



Those who have faith have a source of comfort and inspiration, especially when trouble strikes. They know that God will be good to them in the end, both in this world and in the next. It is not we who keep the faith; it is the faith that keeps us.

A person with a grain of faith in God never loses hope; because he believes in the ultimate triumph of truth (Gandhi).

So when things are bad, may we hear the gentle words of Jesus: "Believe in God, and believe also in me."

Hours of Visitation

- Monday Friday: 9:30 a.m to 1:30 p.m
- Saturday and Sunday: 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

It has been a challenging time for all of us in meeting the needs of safety of our community, so we will be taking measured and incremental steps to ensure the continued health of all who come to our campus. We will be following the <u>Florida Plan for Recovery</u>, the <u>White House Phased Recovery Guidance</u>, and Directives from the Diocese in order to recover from the COVID-19 Pandemic. We ask that you respect the below policies and procedures if you wish to pray at Saint John as a "Visitor" during this Phase 1 of the Recovery. If you do not, you may be asked to leave the campus by our "Monitor," who will be present at all times to ensure the policies are being followed to keep everyone healthy and safe.

Visitation Policies and Procedures

- If you have any illness of any kind, or are exhibiting any symptoms, please stay home.
- If you are "at risk," including over the age of 65, have an underlying health condition, or are taking care of a loved one that is at risk, please stay home.
- By entering our church, you are acknowledging the potential risk for you to be in a public location. You will be praying at your own risk and accept that you will not be able to hold Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church, the Diocese of Venice, or any party within those organizations accountable for any illness or injury that may befall you.
- Access to and from the church will only be allowed through the main front doors. Do
 not use the side doors, even to exit.
- You must bring your own Personal Protective Equipment to church. You must minimally wear a mask at all times while inside the building.
- You must utilize our hand sanitizer stations in the Narthex prior to entering the Sanctuary.
- You will be greeted by our Monitor. This staff member will be wearing their name badge and a Saint John shirt. You must respect any and all directions provided by the Monitor.
- Any questions you may have about the church, the processes, or any other topic should be directed to the Front Office of the Church and the Business Manager or Pastor, not the Monitor. They will refer you to the Front Office.
- Only nine visitors will be allowed within the church at any one time. If there are nine visitors within the building, other visitors will be asked to wait in line with the six-foot social distancing on the taped/decal locations.
- Please use the central aisle only for accessing the Sanctuary.
- The front 10 central pews will be the only locations where you can pray. Specific pews and locations within the pews will be marked for appropriate social distancing. Please respect the personal space of other faithful visitors. Do not attempt to walk, sit, stand, or kneel in any other location.
- Please be respectful of other visitors who may be waiting to pray by keeping your time within the church to 30 minutes
 or less.

Bay Colony Bands Together to Feed Those in Need

It's no secret that everything we are able to do for our disadvantaged and needy neighbors begins with you. For example, starting with our Annual Thanksgiving Food Drive up until today, the parish has provided over three full truckloads of food along with substantial cash donations to The St. Vincent de Paul of Naples Food Bank.

Via your generosity, the St. John's SVDP Conference has also been able to contribute thousands of dollars to the Naples SVDP Council-operated Meals on Wheels Program that serves those in need of this vital service.

Visitation at SJE Questions

While we are so blessed to be able to again pray in our church, we want to do so in as healthy a way as possible. Our Policies and Procedures for "Visitation," or quiet, individual prayer and adoration, help to ensure our Parish Family can enjoy a wonderful spiritual moment within our church in a safe environment. Some questions have arisen since we opened our church for Visitation, so we wanted to inform our entire Parish Family about the answers:

When Will In-Person Mass Start Again?

Unfortunately, we do not have a specific time frame for the availability of Mass to be held in person. We will communicate this opportunity as soon as it becomes available.

When Can I Pray?

You can come to Saint John to pray Monday through Friday, from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. each day. On the weekend, you can come on Saturday and Sunday from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Can I Hold a Funeral or Other Sacramental Activity at Saint John?

Yes, we are scheduling funerals, weddings, and other Sacramental Activities within our church. The hours of Visitation will be modified on those days to allow for 10 people total to attend those activities. There can only be a maximum of 10 people within the church building, so we will prioritize its use for a Sacramental Activity.

If We Have a Funeral in the Church, Can We Stream It?

Yes, we are ready to provide our streaming service free of charge for any funeral or other Sacramental Activity that takes place in our church. However, there is an individual who must run the cameras, so it would mean you would have to reduce your attendees by one person to allow for the camera person,



Is the Adoration Chapel Open?

Unfortunately, no. The Adoration Chapel will remain closed until further notice, as it is not a safe location where proper social distancing can be maintained.

Where is Confession?

You can continue to receive Reconciliation here at Saint John via your vehicle by driving to the Middle Parking Lot and stopping in front of our Homeless Jesus statue. We have Confessions

on Mondays and Wednesdays at 9:30 a.m. and Saturdays at 4:00 p.m., to match our Visitation schedule.

Seriously, When is Mass Starting Again?

We are still awaiting approval and guidance to begin Mass as soon as it is appropriate and safe to do so. We all are excited for that day to come!



Adult Faith Formation

On This Fifth Sunday of Easter, the Formation of the Disciple's Faith Continues!

"If you know me, then you will also know my Father." John 14:7

The Easter season is the 50 days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday. Just as we are invited to do something special during Advent and Lent, you are invited to do something special this Easter season.



While you are "sheltering in place" and binge watching your favorite movie or show, take just 30 minutes each week and watch one lesson in Bishop Robert Barron's program, The Mass. In only six lessons, you will discover the answer to the question, Why do I go to Mass?

Through these engaging videos from Bishop Barron, you will come away with a deeper understanding of what the Mass is and why it matters; why it's the most important thing you can do on Earth.

This week view Lesson Four, Responding to God.

After we have listened to our story, we respond to God with the homily that links Scripture with our daily lives, the Creed that is our statement of belief in what God has revealed, and the Prayer of the Faithful, where we ask God to do something specific for us because we trust his promises.

This week:

Consider following the advice of Matthew Kelly, the founder of Dynamic Catholic. Actively listen to the homily, and when there is a thought that strikes home, write it down, and try to implement it.

Read the Nicene Creed carefully, reflect on each phrase and research any that you don't understand. Start with "who is the 'I' in I believe?"



You can view these episodes, in English or Spanish, on your TV, computer, tablet, or phone. You can receive access with just a few simple steps.

St. Vincent de Paul Society Update

During these difficult times, we want to thank all of you for your ongoing support of the mission and programs of St. Vincent de Paul Society. Our parish SVdP Conferences and the SVdP Naples Council continue to provide help and assistance to low-income Collier County families, seniors, and disabled citizens through the COVID-19 pandemic.

As we plan for an unprecedented wave of requests for financial help and the re-opening of our Thrift Stores, we ask that you prayerfully consider a financial, food, or furniture donation to St. Vincent de Paul Society to fund our programs: Financial Assistance to Low-Income Families; (SJECC conference and Parish boundaries) Meals on Wheels, Choice Food Pantry, & Thrift Stores (SVdP Naples Council).

SVdP Thrift Stores to Re-Open May 4

On May 4, SVdP Naples Council is re-opening our SVdP Thrift Stores in Naples (3810 Tamiami Trail E, Naples 34112) and Bonita Springs (3725 Bonita Springs Rd, Bonita Springs 34134)! Customers, volunteers, and staff will be required to follow accepted "social distancing" practices in order to safeguard everyone's health and safety. We need your help with household donations as well as volunteers for both stores. Please call 239-775-2907 to schedule your donation pick up.

COVID-19 Update

St. Vincent de Paul Society moved seamlessly from normal operations to "safe mode" upon the onset of the COVID-19 crisis. Despite having to close our thrift stores, SVdP Naples Council has not furloughed any staff member. Instead, dedicated volunteers and SVdP Naples staff remain on the job, filling operational gaps in order to ensure that our most vulnerable volunteers could shelter-in-place and safeguard their family's health.

Financial Assistance: St. John the Evangelist Conference, in partnership with SVdP Naples Council, shifted our Financial Assistance program from 'face-to-face' to fully-remote meetings; interviewing families in need and providing assistance remotely in order to protect the health and safety of our dedicated volunteers and neighbor families.

Meals on Wheels: SVdP Naples Council, working with dedicated volunteer drivers from eight Naples-area parishes, continued uninterrupted Meals on Wheels (MOW) deliveries throughout COVID-19. MOW drivers, clad in gloves and masks, delivered a week's supply of meals to 150 low-income, homebound seniors and disabled citizens in two days rather than five days, in order to protect the health and safety of both volunteers and MOW recipients. SVdP has seen an increase in requests for MOW due to COVID-19, and expects requests to spike over the coming months.


Choice Food Pantry: SVdP Choice Food Pantry, stocked through pre-COVID-19 parish food drives and generous financial donations from your Parish, distributed pre-assembled shopping bags of food to families in need throughout the COVID-19 crisis. Precautions (gloves, masks, social distancing) were taken to protect our dedicated pantry volunteers and neighbor families. Until church services and food drives can be reinstituted, SVdP Naples Council is asking for financial donations to keep food assistance available to low-income families in need.


