

Gospel Reflections

Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

In today's Gospel passage, we have part of the farewell discourse of Jesus during the last supper. In these last hours with His apostles, He spoke about essentials. Many of the things He said were naturally directed towards the future – at how He wanted them to live when He was gone. One of the things He said to them was: If you love me, keep my commandments.

We are not talking about keeping a specific set of commandments but rather about following His way of life. What is involved here is Christian discipleship. We can't truly call ourselves disciples of Jesus if we don't listen to His words and make an effort to live by them. One wouldn't be much of a Christian if one didn't try to live as Jesus taught.

But we must be clear about one thing. We don't keep His commandments so that He will love us; we keep his commandments because He loves us. During that same supper, Jesus said, "Love one another as I have loved you." It was He who first loved the apostles, and loved them unconditionally.

The greatest need each one of us has is for real, unconditional love. Yet we find it hard to believe that this is how God loves us. We tend to believe that God will love us only if we are good. God loves us, not because we are good, but because He is good. Our very existence is a sign of God's love. God's unconditional love for us is the Good News. Our response is to try to return that love.

There are those who proclaim their love for Jesus in words, but who deny Him in their deeds or by their way of life. Real love is shown in deeds. People know us by our acts, more than by what we say with our lips.

It's not easy to live as a disciple of Jesus in the modern world. It never was an easy thing. But for that reason Jesus has given us the Holy Spirit. When we are weak, we must pray to the Spirit. The Spirit comforts us in times of sorrow, enlightens us in times of darkness, and makes us brave and strong in times of weakness.

The word Jesus used for the Spirit is the word Advocate, a legal term for one who supports a defendant at a trial. The Spirit will be the great defender of the disciples in time of trial. And the follower of Jesus can expect to suffer. But, as St. Peter says (Second Reading), it is better to suffer for doing the right thing



than for doing the wrong thing. Knowing that our cause is right gives us great strength. Besides, we have the example of Christ who, though innocent, suffered and died for our sins.

The apostles knew that Jesus loved them. And we know that Jesus loves us, too. There is no mistaking love. You feel it in your heart. It is like a flame that warms your soul, energizes your spirit, and supplies passion to your life. Love is our connection to God and to each other. Love is the climate in which the Christian lives.

Love one another as I have loved you. That sums it all up.

When we return to public worship we will need to respect the restrictions and guidelines that the health professionals have provided, as well as our state and Diocesan directives. Choices will need to be made on the part of each individual. The obligation to attend Mass on Sunday has been lifted until June 28, 2020, so please do not feel like you are "required" to attend in person. We will continue to stream our Daily and Weekend Masses for our Parish Family and all our Friends around the world.

We will be returning to our normal schedule of Masses beginning May 18, 2020, so please check our website for the specific days and times. If an Overflow Mass is needed, that Mass will be in our Ballroom, and it will

begin 15 minutes after the Church Mass. Confessions will continue to be heard on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays, now immediately after Daily Mass is concluded. Visitation in the church will continue on weekdays after the Daily Mass until 1:00 p.m.

If you do feel called to attend Mass in person, please be aware of the the following policies and procedures for Saint John the Evangelist:

- If you have any illness of any kind, or are exhibiting any symptoms, please stay home.
- If you are "at risk," including over the age of 65, have an underlying health condition, or are taking care of a loved one that is at risk, please consider staying home.
- By entering our church, you are acknowledging the potential risk for you to be in a public location. You will be **praying at your own risk** and accept that you will not be able to hold Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church, the Diocese of Venice, or any party within those organizations accountable for any illness or injury that may befall you.
- Access to and from the church will only be allowed through the main Front Doors. Do not use the side doors, even to exit, except in an emergency.
- Please park in the Front Lot if possible. Allow for those who are handicapped to use the closest spots.
- You must bring your own Personal Protective Equipment to church. You must **minimally wear a mask at all times** while inside the building.
- We encourage you to bring your own gloves and hand sanitizer to church. Our hand sanitizer stations are available in the Narthex.
- You will be greeted by our Ushers. You must respect any and all directions provided by the Usher.
- Any questions you may have about the church, the processes, or any other topic should be directed to the Front Office of the Church and the Business Manager or Pastor, not the Ushers. They will refer you to the Front Office.
- **25% of Capacity of Parishioners** will be allowed within the church at any one time. If there are more Parishioners than appropriate in the church, other individuals will be asked to wait in line with the 6-foot social distancing on the decal locations or an Overflow Mass will be provided in the Ballroom.
- **Specific pews and locations within the church** will be marked for appropriate social distancing. Please respect the personal space of other faithful visitors. Do not attempt to walk, sit, stand, or kneel in any other location than what has been identified.

What to Expect When Returning to Mass

Prayerfully Returning to the Parish

When we return to public worship we will need to respect the restrictions and guidelines that the health professionals have provided. Christ suffers with those who cannot come to Mass during the pandemic. However, as Jesus taught us, suffering can lead to redemption. You read on pages 1 and 4 the basic guidelines set out by Saint John the Evangelist in welcoming parishioners back to Mass. It may not all be the same, but it's a positive start.



Holy Water

Upon entering the Church, we have been used to approaching the baptismal font or holy water stoup, dipping our fingers into the water and blessing ourselves as a remembrance of our Baptism. Health safety restrictions will not allow us to use the Sacramental of Holy Water in this way. We encourage you to continue the gesture of making the sign of the Cross when entering the church remembering that we are baptized in Christ Jesus in the name of the Father, the Son, and Holy Spirit.

Shorter Homilies

The homily offered as part of Mass may be shorter than usual, but its purpose, to share the meaning of the Sacred Scripture, will be given no matter the length. This will allow more time between dismissing one Mass and preparing to welcome those to the next Mass.



Holy Exchange

The procession with the gifts is a powerful expression of the participation of all present in the Eucharist and in the social mission of the Church. It is an expression of the humble and contrite heart, the emptying of self that is necessary for making the true offering, which the Lord Jesus gave his people to make with him. During this period there will be no collection by way of passing a basket and no procession with the gifts. Offerings may be made electronically or through the mail.



Spiritual Fasting

We must be mindful of those who will be absent during this time of limited capacity to gather, social distancing and high-risk health conditions. Our solidarity with those who cannot be physically present is essential during this time. Those who are unable to come to worship and experience the Sacrament offer their experience as a type of fast. Times when we are separated from Christ's Sacraments can be opportunities for unnumbered graces.



Sign of Peace

The exchange of Peace before the reception of Holy Communion expresses the Gospel truth that communion with God in Christ is enjoyed in communion with our brothers and sisters in Christ. When the deacon or priest invites us to offer each other a Sign of Peace it will be appropriate to offer a reverent bow and or verbal greeting "the Peace of Christ be with you."

Bread of Heaven

During this time of pandemic it is most reasonable and prudent for the safety of all that Holy Communion be distributed to the congregation in the form of the Sacred Host. We receive Christ the Lord himself, His Body and Blood, sacrificed on Calvary for the forgiveness of our sins and raised from the dead and ascended to the right hand of the Father.

When we receive the Sacred Host, we will receive on the hand. The Bishops have instructed us when receiving the Eucharist on

the hand, the communicant approaches the minister with one hand resting on the palm of the other. After responding, "Amen," the communicant steps to the side and reverently places the Eucharist in his or her mouth. Let us remember and take to heart the words of St Cyril of Jerusalem—they should make a throne of their hands, laying the right upon the left to form a throne for the King, forming at the same time a Cross.



Receiving Communion on the Hand

Prayerfully Returning to the Parish

Out of care for those who offer us Communion, it is important to know that Holy Communion on the tongue creates several health hazards during this time of pandemic, therefore it is recommended that communicants receive the Sacred Host on the hand. We do this out of a sense of care and concern for both ministers and communicants.



Worship Aids

Worship aids are provided in many forms such as hymnals, printed song sheets with the Order of Mass, and projection of the worship aid on video screens. Some of these aids will not be available because of restrictions and will need to be accessed electronically. As "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a redeemed people" (1 Pet. 2:9; cf. 2:4-5), we are led to full, conscious and active participation in the celebration of Mass.

Sing to the Lord Joyfully

Music is important to the celebration of Mass, particularly on Sundays. A cantor and accompanist will lead you in song. Choirs and members of instrumental ensembles will not be immediately available. We are always blessed with the privilege to join our voices in song to the praise, honor and glory of God.



Stewards of the Earth

We are called to care for God's creation. While we are experiencing the pandemic, we have come to understand that caring for God's creation also means preservation of our natural resources. To praise God in this way, Saint John the Evangelist will not be printing bulletins for distribution at Church and will continue to offer them on our website.



A Time to Gather

We are joyful to see those neighbors at Church whom we have not seen for some time. However, because of social distancing we ask that you wave from afar and leave the church property to share in fellowship. Likewise coffee or donut stations after Mass or resources to view will not be available.



Other Parish Ministries

While we rejoice that our parish churches are reopening for prayer, other parish ministries are still placed on hold. Social activities, ministry group meetings, CAO/CYO events, classes on the church campus or outreach ministries, such as thrift shops, etc. will not be offered or open until further notice.

Act of Spiritual Communion



This week view Lesson Five, Preparing for Sacrifice.






LIVE THE LITURGY
