Saint John Financial Dashboard

It has been some time since we provided some specific details on our financial environment here at Saint John. To be sure, the challenging times we are facing together as a Parish Family have impacted both our attendance and our standard giving. There are so many personal and operational priorities that impact how we can continue to achieve our Mission together. We are extremely grateful for every gift we have and continue to receive, especially with our online giving, which has increased five-fold on a weekly basis. We continue to refine our church's environment to eliminate non-essential activities and cut costs in every way possible. There have been some difficult decisions we have had to make to ensure we are serving the Parish and the Community effectively. Our Mission is paramount: To Know, To Love, and To Serve God in His Church and Our Community.

In order to understand some of our decisions, we wanted to provide the details on the current status of some of our financial responsibilities, namely the Catholic Faith Appeal (CFA) and our Finish the Church loan. While our CFA Goal for 2020 was reduced slightly from 2019's, we are actually further along this year, with 64% of our \$572,000.00 goal already achieved. Our car raffle for the Audi Q3 provided a significant boost. Thank you to all who assisted with the raffle. Our Finish the Church loan has been solidified with the Diocese and our insurance credits, leaving us with a balance (as of May 31, 2020) of: \$1,119,290.08. Going forward, Saint John will pay \$13,000.00 a month towards this loan, ensuring we pay more than just the minimum payment required. This will assist us in finishing the loan earlier than our 10 year term. It is a new expense, however, that we must account for in our monthly planning, and may take resources away from other activities.

FOCUS ON THE GOOD

When I was a child, my mother had a set of sculptures resembling three human heads. One head had hands over the ears, one had hands over the eyes, and one had hands over the mouth. Of course, they depicted the phrase, "Hear no evil; see no evil; speak no evil." I have seen these images repeated many times since then, usually as the monkey heads from a Japanese proverb, which would have probably seemed a little less creepy to me when I was a small child. Apparently, there is no consensus about the full meaning or certain origin of these three images nor the phrase. At the very least, it causes us to reflect on the need to avoid evil and look for the good in things.

As I have lived my life, I have come to believe there are more people who lives their lives in a contrary manner to these images. It is not that they seek evil, but it is as if they "see no good, hear no good, and speak no good." Gossiping is the way they pass the time, and they always seem to find the negative in people and situations. Being a good steward certainly means that we do not seek evil, but more than that, it means that we see the abundance of good things all around us. These gifts of God are big and little, profound and ordinary. By seeing the world in this way, we begin to change our personalities and our overall disposition. We always need to follow a new proverb: see all the good, hear all the good, and speak about the good. Amen.

Bishop Barron's Word on Fire websites have hundreds of programs, all free to you. And with such a broad selection, it is frequently hard to choose one. So, here is a suggestion.

SEVEN DEADLY SINS, SEVEN LIVELY VIRTUES, a practical, modern-day look at sin and virtue!

This came to mind when preparing our Candidates for their first Sacrament of Reconciliation, but it is just as relevant when preparing for your hundredth Confession.

This enlightening study of sin and virtue is based on Dante Alighieri's great poem *The Divine Comedy* which explores the great truths concerning human nature, our relationship with God, and the soul's journey to happiness told in a great story of a journey through Hell, up Mount Purgatory, and into Heaven. You may know them by their original Italian names, Inferno, Purgatorio, and Paradiso.

The seven sins are each presented as patterns of dysfunction within us that lead to unhappiness. However, Bishop Barron shows us how to counteract these seven sinful patterns through a conscious process of opposition – the seven lively virtues, which offer antidotes to each sin and help set us on the right path to healing and happiness.

This journey will promote reflection, increase understanding, and encourage practical action. Here is a preview:

***Envy**, the daughter of pride, is described as pleasure in the sorrow of another and resentment over their happiness or success.*

*Scripture tells us "Be angry but do not sin." This surprising advice from St. Paul points to the truth about **anger**: namely that it is a normal part of human existence and that it is only sinful when taken to excess.*

***Avarice**, St. Thomas tells us, is the immoderate or unreasonable desire for riches. It is not wrong to own property or make a profit. Sin only enters into the situation when we love these created things more than we love God or our neighbor.*

*Our culture has long taught us to believe **Lust** is the very worst sin; Dante regards it as the lightest and least serious of the deadly sins. Find out why!*






