Celebrate the Birthday of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, Saint of Divine Mercy, This Week



Sister Faustina was born in Glogowiec, Poland, on August 25, 1905. She was the third of 10 children in a devout but poor family. Her given name at baptism was Helena Kowalska. As early as age seven, she experienced callings to a religious life. Helena began working as a domestic at age 14, after completing three years of elementary school. At 15, she notified her parents of a desire to join a convent. They discouraged her from doing so. While working, she unsuccessfully applied to numerous orders. She was finally accepted into the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in 1925. After entering the congregation, she received the name Sister Maria Faustina. It was not until May 1933 that she took her perpetual vows.

From an early age, she felt a spiritual communion with Jesus. After entering religious life, her interactions with the Lord became more frequent. Outwardly she revealed nothing of her mystical life. She started writing down her interactions with the Lord as a personal diary. She did not share its contents until instructed by the Lord to inform people of His infinite mercy through her diary.

After entering convent life her health deteriorated. It was discovered that she had tuberculosis and was also experiencing severe asthma attacks. She required months of hospitalization prior to her

death in 1938.

Through her diary, Saint Faustina became the Secretary and Apostle of God's Mercy.

"Divine Mercy in My Soul," or the Diary of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, is a record of her life experiences with Jesus. Since the 1940s, the Marians of the Immaculate Conception have undertaken the evangelization of God's mercy throughout the world, as proclaimed by Saint Faustina. Her diary has been translated into 20 languages with 16 printings through 2019. Pope John Paul II canonized Saint Faustina on Divine Mercy Sunday, April 30, 2000.

"Sister Faustina was a young, uneducated nun in a convent of the Congregation of Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in Poland during the 1930s. She came from a poor family that struggled during the years of World War I. She had only three years of simple education, so hers were the humblest tasks in the convent, usually in the kitchen or garden. However, she received extraordinary revelations — or messages — from our Lord Jesus. Jesus asked Sr. Faustina to record these experiences, which she compiled into notebooks. These

notebooks are known today as the Diary of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, and the words contained within are God's loving message of Divine Mercy." – *Excerpt from thedivinemercy.org.*

Gospel Reflections

Gospel Reflections with Father Tom


In today's liturgy, we learn that not only is life unpredictable and full of surprises, but that our God is full of surprises. In the First Reading, we hear the prophet Isaiah speaking to those who are privileged to hold the position of God's chosen people. They have been trusted with a deposit of faith and the lineage of the promised messiah. But Isaiah upsets the predictability of their privileged position by suggesting that even foreigners will be welcomed into the kingdom of God.

The Second Reading contains the same message of surprise and unpredictability. Paul is struggling with Israel's rejection of Jesus as the messiah. He turns to the gentiles to preach the good news, hoping to "make his own people jealous" so that they would return to their privileged place as God's chosen ones and wholeheartedly accept Jesus as their messiah. They had predicted that the messiah would be a mighty king who would slay their enemy and restore their power, but this gentle peacemaker who associated with sinners was totally beyond their expectations.

The gospel moves away from these general expectations to witness Jesus on a one-on-one encounter. As always, Jesus realizes salvation in His actions. A Canaanite woman approaches Him and persistently shouts at Him to cure her daughter who is "tormented by a devil." Jesus at first ignores her and insists that He has been sent to save only the chosen ones. The disciples urge Him to send her away. But when she perseveres, Jesus praises her for her faith and heals her daughter. The disciples must have been surprised by this apparently unpredictable response.

To complicate the situation, a person in those times who had a serious illness was often perceived of as being possessed by demons because either they or their parents were guilty of sin. And furthermore, the Canaanites were regarded as a real threat to the religious and political values of the chosen people. For Jesus to step outside these rigid boundaries was shocking. But Jesus wanted to convey to them that all who have faith in God are subject to His healing power.

As Isaiah proclaimed in the First Reading, "my house shall be called a house of prayer for all people." Even though the Canaanite woman was not a predictable candidate for healing, Jesus' compliance to her persistent demand was a total contradiction of popular religious sentiment. God, too, is full

The Assumption of Mary: A Belief Since Apostolic Times

The Assumption is the oldest feast day of Our Lady, but we don't know how it first came to be celebrated.

Its origin is lost in those days when Jerusalem was restored as a sacred city, at the time of the Roman Emperor Constantine (c. 285-337). By then it had been a pagan city for two centuries, ever since Emperor Hadrian (76-138) had leveled it around the year 135 and rebuilt it as <Aelia Capitolina> in honor of Jupiter.

For 200 years, every memory of Jesus was obliterated from the city, and the sites made holy by His life, death and Resurrection became pagan temples.

After the building of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in 336, the sacred sites began to be restored and memories of the life of Our Lord began to be celebrated by the people of Jerusalem. One of the memories about his mother centered around the "Tomb of Mary," close to Mount Zion, where the early Christian community had lived.

On the hill itself was the "Place of Dormition," the spot of Mary's "falling asleep," where she had died. The "Tomb of Mary" was where she was buried.

At this time, the "Memory of Mary" was being celebrated. Later it was to become our feast of the Assumption.

For a time, the "Memory of Mary" was marked only in Palestine, but then it was extended by the emperor to all the churches of the East. In the seventh century, it began to be celebrated in Rome under the title of the "Falling Asleep" ("Dormitio") of the Mother of God.

Soon the name was changed to the "Assumption of Mary," since there was more to the feast than her dying. It also proclaimed that she had been taken up, body and soul, into heaven.

That belief was ancient, dating back to the apostles themselves. What was clear from the beginning was that there were no relics of Mary to be venerated, and that an empty tomb stood on the edge of Jerusalem near the site of her death. That location also soon became a place of pilgrimage. (Today, the Benedictine Abbey of the Dormition of Mary stands on the spot.)

At the Council of Chalcedon in 451, when bishops from throughout the Mediterranean world gathered in Constantinople, Emperor Marcian asked the Patriarch of Jerusalem to bring the relics of Mary to Constantinople to be enshrined in the

capitol. The patriarch explained to the emperor that there were no relics of Mary in Jerusalem, that "Mary had died in the presence of the apostles; but her tomb, when opened later . . . was found empty and so the apostles concluded that the body was taken up into heaven."

In the eighth century, St. John Damascene was known for giving sermons at the holy places in Jerusalem. At the Tomb of Mary, he expressed the belief of the Church on the meaning of the feast: "Although the body was duly buried, it did not remain in the state of death, neither was it dissolved by decay. . . . You were transferred to your heavenly home, O Lady, Oueen and Mother of God in truth."

All the feast days of Mary mark the great mysteries of her life and her part in the work of redemption. The central mystery of her life and person is her divine motherhood, celebrated both at Christmas and a week later (Jan. 1) on the feast of the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. The Immaculate Conception (Dec. 8) marks the preparation for that motherhood, so that she had the fullness of grace from the first moment of her existence, completely untouched by sin. Her whole being throbbed with divine life from the very beginning, readying her for the exalted role of mother of the Savior.

The Assumption completes God's work in her since it was not fitting that the flesh that had given life to God himself should ever undergo corruption. The Assumption is God's crowning of His work as Mary ends her earthly life and enters eternity. The feast turns our eyes in that direction, where we will follow when our earthly life is over.

The feast days of the Church are not just the commemoration of historical events; they do not look only to the past. They look to the present and to the future and give us an insight into our own relationship with God. The Assumption looks to eternity and gives us hope that we, too, will follow Our Lady when our life is ended.

The prayer for the feast reads: "All-powerful and ever-living God: You raised the sinless Virgin Mary, mother of your Son, body and soul, to the glory of heaven. May we see heaven as our final goal and come to share her glory."

In 1950, in the Apostolic Constitution <Munificentissimus Deus>, Pope Pius XII proclaimed the Assumption of Mary a dogma of the Catholic Church in these words: "The Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heaven."

With that, an ancient belief became Catholic doctrine and the Assumption was declared a truth revealed by God.

Registration Now Open for Faith Formation 2020-2021

Registration is now open for Faith Formation at St. John in the Fall. This is our first attempt at Online Registration, so please bear with us. In summary, online registration is in four parts.

- REGISTER with My Own Church Wait for confirmation email that includes a temporary password
- 2. REGISTER for Class Preferences
- 3. PAYMENT
- 4. DIOCESAN FORMS SIGNED ONLINE Separate Email Sent to You

1. REGISTER with My Own Church

When you register with MY OWN CHURCH, you can update your contact information.

Please note: After initial registration of MY OWN CHURCH you will receive an email with a temporary password before you can register for classes.

2. REGISTER for Classes

Click on the Religious Education tab and then the Online Registration button. From here, the member can verify details in their family record and register for religious education classes.

When registering for classes, you will **+Add** each student one at a time. You have the option to print your registration sheet for your records.

3. PAYMENT - Click "PAY NOW" Button to proceed

After you register for classes, you will be able to pay for the sessions. The option to pay at this website is with a credit card OR Apple Pay only. Cash payments would have to be made in person in our Parish Office. Payments by check may

be mailed in or dropped off in person as well.

Please keep in mind when you pay for Faith Formation, you will be "adding each child's registration" to your shopping cart one at a time. After each child is added, you will then hit "continue shopping," and then click on Faith Formation Registration to return to the previous page where you will add your next child's registration to the cart, until you have added all of your children. Then you can check out and make payment. Each time you choose a purchase option for your child, you will choose either STANDARD REGISTRATION or SACRAMENTAL YEAR. The shopping cart will total up the registrations for you. There is a discount for registering additional children within the same family. Sacrament fees apply for the child's second year of First Communion or Confirmation preparation.

4. Completing and Signing Diocesan Forms

The Final step in this process is completing the required online Diocesan Forms. You will receive these forms via email from our Assistant in Faith Formation, Miss Luz Lozano. In that email, she will also confirm your class sessions.

Please email us a copy of your child's baptism certificate if your child is entering kindergarten or is new to our program. Baptism Certificates may be sent to luz@sjecc.com. New Confirmation candidates will need to send a copy of their First Communion record as well.



Amen.




