Gospel Reflections

Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

St. Paul urges the Philippians not to be anxious. He tells them, "There is no need to worry." This may seem an unreal piece of advice. There is no way to avoid all worry. Good and sincere people are naturally worried about many things. It is part of the burden they carry precisely because they are people who care, who care about loved ones, and many other things.


But Paul is not talking about normal concerns. He is talking about anxiety. Nothing is more debilitating or fruitless than anxiety. Of itself, it does nothing to solve our problems. Rather, the opposite is the case. By dissipating our energy, anxiety weakens us and makes it more difficult for us to find a solution to our problems.

The root of anxiety is lack of trust – lack of trust in oneself, in others, and especially in God. Hence, the first piece of advice Paul gives the Philippians is to pray. They must learn to commit their cares to the Lord: "If there is anything you need, pray for it." He is not suggesting that prayer should take the place of action. Nor is he implying that their prayers will always be answered. What, then, does prayer do? Prayer implies a willingness to do what we can, and then to leave things in the hands of God – to accept what happens then as His will, even though we may not understand it.

Then Paul tells his readers to think positively. People who are over-anxious tend to think very negatively. They imagine the worst scenario. This is disastrous. We must concentrate on the good, not on the bad. Many people devour the newspapers every day or watch news on TV all day long. It's hard to read the newspapers or watch TV these days without coming away depressed, so full are they of bad news. Instead of filling our minds with all kinds of trash, Paul says, "Fill your minds with everything that is true, everything that is noble, everything that is good and pure, everything that we love and honor, everything that can be thought virtuous and worthy of praise." The power of positive thinking is well known.

However, it is not just a question of thinking nice thoughts. We must try to do these things. Thoughts alone will not suffice. We must pursue goodness in our actions. Paul says, "Keep doing the things you have learned from me."

In Jesus' parable of the vineyard, a lot of ugly things happen. But evil does not have the last say. In the end, good triumphs. This shows us that there is only one way to overcome evil, and that is with



If we do what we can, and put our trust in God, then Paul assures us that "the peace of God, which is so much greater than we can understand will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

Peace comes, not from having an easy and tranquil life. We can have peace even in the midst of struggle and turmoil provided we are on the side of right. Then the God of peace will be with us.


Keeping Each Other Safe and Healthy


Keeping Each Other Safe and Healthy

Our Parish Family is focused on your health and safety, and we take precautions that take time and funds in order to accomplish, but are considered essential. We wipe down the pews of the church between Masses. We use an extremely powerful (but EPA-approved safe for the environment) airborne spray to kill all biologics (bacteria and viral agents) in the air and on all surfaces every single night. Bathrooms are disinfected constantly during Masses. Our Faith Formation program, with its socially-distanced environment, also has sanitization occurring in between sessions, both adult and youth classes.











This tremendous effort is all for you and your family to feel safe and comfortable if you choose to come to Mass or classes in-person.

Wearing Masks to Save Others

The requirement to wear masks while in our facilities, including while in the Church, is based on the guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, as well as the directive from the Diocese. You wear your mask to protect all the other people around you, especially when you are in an enclosed space. Some proper ways to wear your mask are:

The Knights of Columbus are Advocates of the Divine Mercy Message As It is Related Through the Writings in the Diary of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska



Pope Francis recently decreed that Saint Faustina Kowlska's feast day be added to the Roman Calendar as an optional memorial to be celebrated by all on October 5, the anniversary date of her death in 1938.

Her mission on earth was to act as Our Lord's "Secretary" by recording in a diary all Jesus' wishes regarding His Divine Mercy and this message:

"In the Old Covenant I sent prophets wielding thunderbolts to My people. Today I am sending you with my mercy to the people of the whole world."

Pope John Paul II declared the sanctity of Maria Faustina Kowalska on April 30, 2000. Pope Francis has taken this step in response to petitions from pastors, religious men and women, and associations of the faithful. She became the inspiration for a movement dedicated to proclaiming and imploring God's

Divine Mercy throughout the world.

In addition to the Image of Divine Mercy located in the narthex of the church, another Image of Divine Mercy is available for veneration in our Adoration Chapel, formerly known as the Rome Room, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. This space requires a fob for admittance and, given social distancing restrictions, is limited to 10 people.

The Chaplet of Divine Mercy is streamed daily at 3:00 p.m. from the Saint Paul II National Shrine in Washington D.C. (The Shrine's website is ... JP2shrine.org)

The Saint John Paul II National Shrine is a major pastoral initiative of the Knights of Columbus.


