The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

"When you hold a lunch or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or your wealthy neighbors, in case

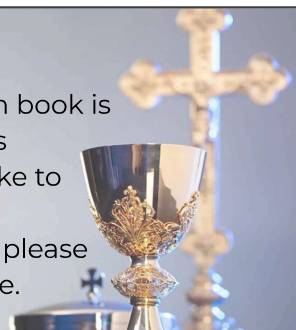



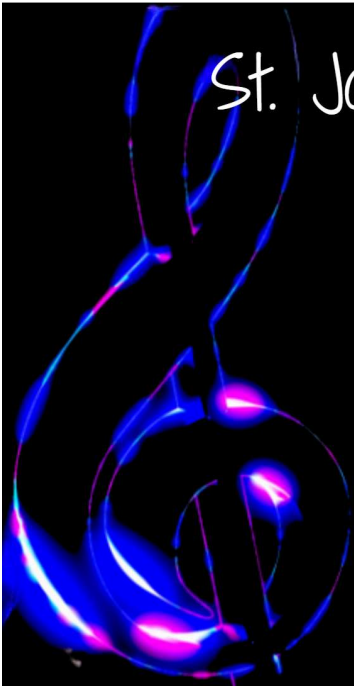

Fr. Tom's Gospel Reflection

Jesus was invited to the house of a leading Pharisee for a meal. When he arrived, he felt that he was being spied upon by the Pharisees. So he decided to do a little spying on them in return. The sight that met his eyes was not an edifying one. The Pharisees were very religious people, and set themselves up as models. Yet here they were scrambling for the places of honor, showing just how proud, vain and selfish they really were. They were there not to honor their host, but to honor themselves. There can be no true spirituality without humility. Jesus says, "Those who humble themselves will be exalted."

When we enter a great cathedral we are immediately humbled. We feel small and insignificant. We realize how flimsy and false are the things that we depend on. But in a strange way we are also exalted. Because when we humble ourselves, and let go of those things that give us a false sense of importance and superiority, and which separate us from others, we find that we are exalted. We begin to realize our true greatness, which lies, not in ourselves, but in the fact that we are children of God.

Each Sunday we are invited to a banquet - the banquet of the Eucharist. Here Jesus is the host, and we are his guests. Here there are no special places - you can sit where you wish. Here privilege, status, rank have no meaning. Differences don't count. This is because before God all of us are equal.

It's not that we are reduced to the same common denominator. Rather, it is that all of us are raised up. We are like people on a mountain top. On a mountain top, to speak of first and last places, or higher and lower places, would be silly. The same applies to the house of God. Here every place is a place of honor. Entering here makes everyone equal. When we cross this threshold, privilege blows away like smoke, and we are all humbled, yet elevated too. We have first of all to be humbled in order to be elevated. We should carry this spirit out into life with us afterwards.

Once the mayor of a town invited all the people of the town to a banquet. Among those who showed up was a man of great distinction by the name of Daniel. Daniel was a great scholar and a wise man. Yet he was very humble and didn't like being honored. When he arrived the mayor naturally invited him to sit at the top table. Daniel thanked him but said he would prefer to sit among the poor at the table nearest the door. And that he did.

When other distinguished guests arrived, the mayor invited them to sit wherever they liked. Naturally they chose to sit at the top table. The banquet hall filled up, and eventually the only place left was one at the bottom table. Then at the last minute this distinguished man arrived. The mayor had no option but to take him to the vacant seat.

"But this is the bottom table," the man protested.

"No, this is the top table," the mayor replied.

"I don't understand," the man said.

"Wherever Daniel sits is the top table," the mayor answered.

The moral of the story: it's not the place that honors the guest, but the guest that honors the place. We don't know in what place Jesus sat during that meal, but wherever it was, that was the place of honor.

The banquet is a symbol of the Kingdom. We shouldn't be concerned about seeking a place of honor in the Kingdom. We should regard it as a privilege to be invited at all. In any case, in the Kingdom every place is a place of honor.

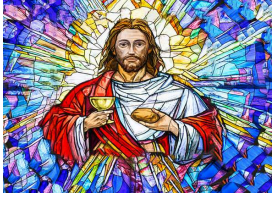

MEMORIAL GARDEN

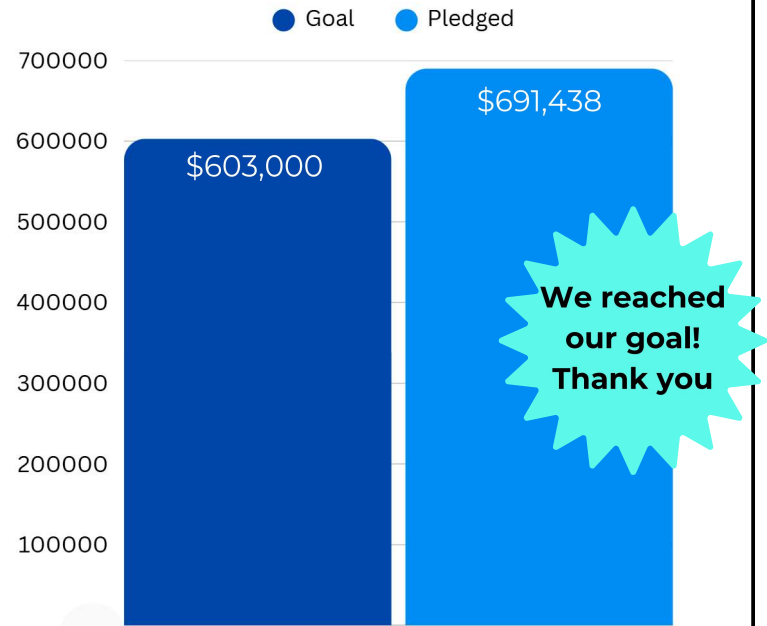

Weekly Divine Mercy Reflection

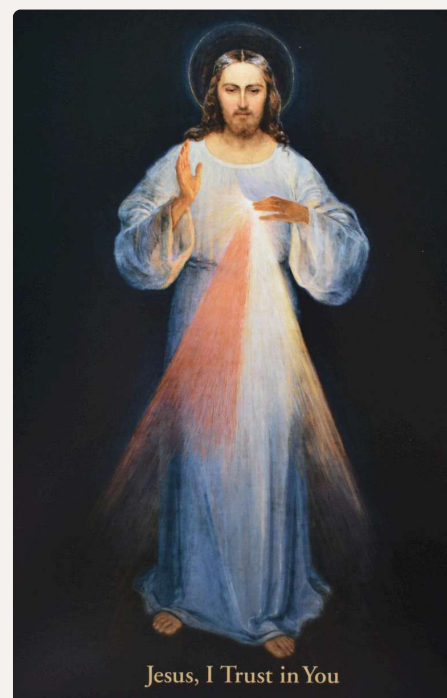

Pope sets Sept. 7 for Joint Canonization of Blesseds Acutis and Frassati

The two young Italian laymen will be the first saints canonized by the new pope.

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Pope Leo XIV will canonize Blesseds Carlo Acutis and Pier Giorgio Frassati together Sept. 7, the Vatican announced. Meeting with cardinals living in and visiting Rome for an ordinary public consistory June 13, the pope approved the new canonization date for the two young blesseds and set Oct. 19 as the date for the canonization of seven others. He announced the dates in Latin. The two Italian laymen will be the first saints proclaimed by the new pope, who was elected May 8.

The canonization of **Blessed Carlo Acutis**, a teenager known for his devotion to the Eucharist and creating an online exhibition of Eucharistic miracles, had originally been scheduled for April 27 during the Jubilee of Teenagers. It was postponed following the death of Pope Francis April 21. Born in 1991 and raised in Milan, Blessed Carlo Acutis used his tech skills to evangelize and was noted for his joyful faith and compassion for others before dying of leukemia in 2006 at age 15.

Prayer for the Canonization of Blessed Carlo Acutis

Oh God, Our Father, thank you for giving us Carlo, a life example for the young and a message of love for everyone. You made him become enamoured with Your Son Jesus, Making of the Eucharist his "Highway to Heaven". You gave him Mary, as a most loving Mother, and, with the Rosary, you made him a poet of her tenderness. Receive his prayer for us. Above all, gaze upon the poor, whom he loved and helped. Grant for me too, by his intercession, the grace that I need ... And make our joy fulfilled, placing Carlo among the Saints of your Church, so that his smile may shine again for us in the glory of your name.

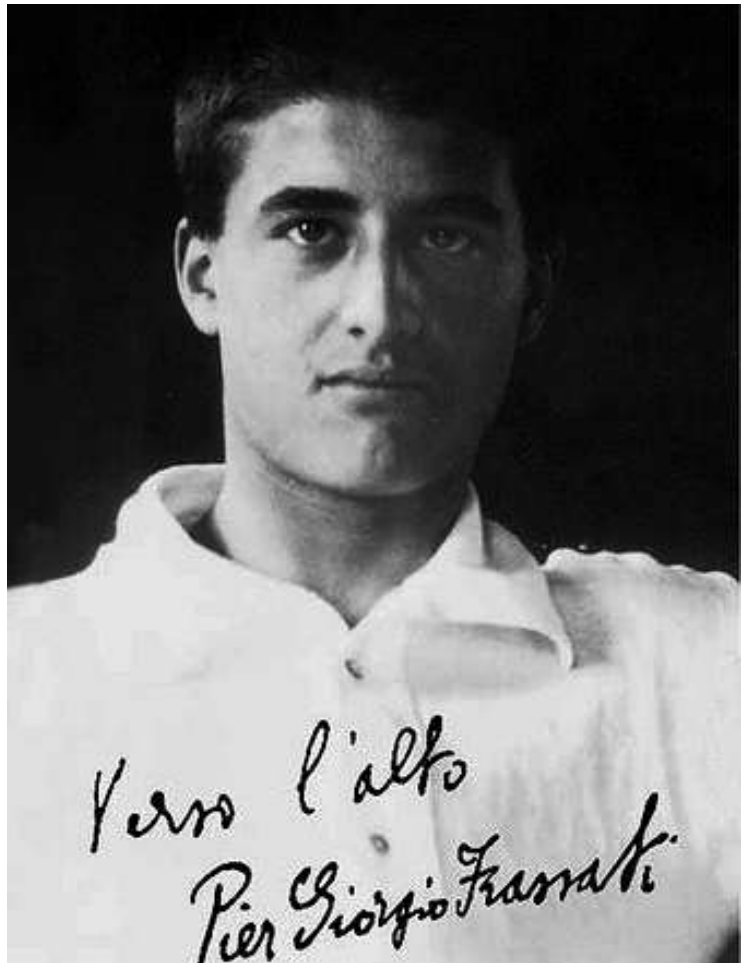
Faith Formation

Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati, born in 1901 into a prominent family in Turin, Italy, was admired for his deep spirituality, love for the poor and enthusiasm for life. A member of the Dominican Third Order, he served the sick through the St. Vincent de Paul Society. He died at age 24 after contracting polio, possibly from one of the people he assisted. Italian Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati was a struggling student who excelled in mountain climbing. He had complete faith in God and persevered through college, dedicating himself to helping the poor and supporting church social teaching. He died at age 24 and was beatified by St. John Paul II in 1990. For years, Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati (1901-1925) has been a significant global patron for youth, young adults, athletes, and “ordinary people” – and has a special place in the hearts of many young people across the United States and around the world. After what would become his final climb he wrote a simple note on a photograph: “Verso L’Alto”, which means “to the heights.”

Prayer for the Canonization of Blessed Frassati

"O merciful God, Who through the perils of the world deigned to preserve by Your grace Your servant Pier Giorgio Frassati pure of heart and ardent of charity, listen, we ask You, to our prayers and, if it is in Your designs that he be glorified by the Church, show us Your will, granting us the graces we ask of You, through his intercession, by the merits of Jesus Christ, Our Lord, Amen."

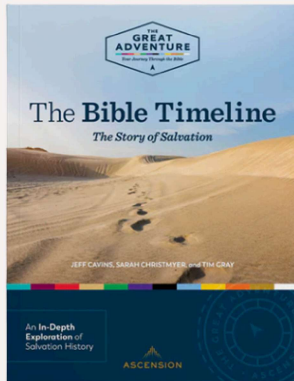
