

SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY



The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

The steward said to himself, 'What shall I do, now that my master is taking the position of steward away from me? I am not strong enough to dig and I am ashamed to beg. I know what I shall do so that, when I am removed from the stewardship, they may welcome me into their homes.' He called in his master's debtors one by one. To the first he said, 'How much do you owe my master?'

He replied, 'One hundred measures of olive oil.'
He said to him, 'Here is your promissory note.
Sit down and quickly write one for fifty.'
Then to another the steward said, 'And you, how much do you owe?'

He replied, 'One hundred kors of wheat.'
The steward said to him, 'Here is your promissory note; write one for eighty.'

And the master commended that dishonest steward for acting prudently.

"For the children of this world are more prudent in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. I tell you, make friends for yourselves with dishonest wealth, so that when it fails, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings. The person who is trustworthy in very small matters is also trustworthy in great ones; and the person who is dishonest in very small matters is also dishonest in great ones. If, therefore, you are not trustworthy with dishonest wealth, who will trust you with true wealth? If you are not trustworthy with what belongs to another, who will give you what is yours? No servant can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and mammon."

Fr. Tom's Gospel Reflection



The steward in Jesus' story was unreliable and dishonest. It's obvious that he had been so for quite some time. It probably started off in little ways, but eventually become a way of life. He must have known all along that he was living dangerously. But he got away with it for a long time, thus evading public judgment and even self-examination. However, in spite of his craftiness, he was eventually found out, and his master confronted him with his misconduct.

It must have been a very humbling and painful moment for the steward. He was about to lose not only his job but also his reputation. He had brought shame and disgrace on himself and on his family, if he had a family. Yet it was also a moment of truth and

revelation, because it showed him the dishonest reality in which he had been living. It provided him with an opportunity to leave behind illusions and lies. It could have been a turning point in his life.

But what happened? He learned nothing from it. Even after being sacked from his job he continued on in his old dishonest ways. There wasn't the slightest change in his character. Not the least dent in his armor. He refused to take responsibility for the kind of person he had become.

It's very difficult to change the habits of a lifetime. Dostoevsky says, "The second half of a person's life is usually made up of the habits acquired during the first half." That's a pretty frightening thought. It seems that there comes a moment in our lives when the precious clay of which we are made hardens and sets, so that from that point on we can assume no new shape. The dishonest person will remain dishonest to the end. The greedy person will remain that way to the end.

Once a holy man was instructing his disciples as they walked through a wood. He pointed to a small oak sapling, and asked one of his disciples to pull it up. The disciple did so with one hand. Then the master pointed to another oak, a little bigger than the first, and asked the disciple to pull that one up. He did so but had to use both hands. The master pointed to a third and bigger oak, and asked the disciple to pull it up. He could do so only with the help of one of his companions. Finally he pointed to a still larger oak and asked the disciple to pull that one up. Even with the help of all of his companions he was unable to do so. And the master concluded, "That's how it is with passions and habits. In the beginning, before they have sunk deep roots, it is easy to eradicate them. But if we allow them to sink deep roots, it becomes virtually impossible to rid ourselves of them." This, presumably, is what happened to the servant in Jesus' story. He had become so used to a dishonest way of life that he couldn't change. However, what is impossible to us can become possible with the aid of God's grace.

While the story shows the danger of bad habits it also shows the importance of forming good habits. Just as dishonesty can become a way of life so can honesty. Honesty can become habitual, spontaneous, second nature.

How does one arrive at this happy state? It cannot be achieved overnight. It has to be learned by long practice. It is not achieved by a few great deeds but by a lot of little ones. The real reward for a good deed is that it makes the next good deed easier. Every little action of the common day makes or unmakes character.

In FY 2025, Parishioners provided a generous outpouring of financial support that will allow St. John the Evangelist to grow in all aspects of our Mission – To Know, To Love and To Serve God in Our Parish and in This Community.

Our successful Rectory fundraising campaign allowed us to aggressively pursue construction. At the time of this publication we are 80% complete, on time and on budget.

We had another great year in our CFA campaign, exceeding our goal in May.

Important notes about our financial statements:

- FY 2025 brought increased offerings, accompanied by expense growth commensurate with Parish growth. Our Rectory campaign wound down and cash outflows focused on construction.
- By the end of the calendar year we expect to open the new Rectory to all 4 of our priests and begin the sale process on the house and condo we currently own.
- We had Net Income of \$1,019,415 in FY 2025 driven by the Rectory campaign and bequests compared to Net Income of \$3,832,963 in FY 2024. We exited FY 2025 in strong financial position, prepared to continue delivering on our Mission.
- Our Income Statement has been adjusted to reflect only Church operations. CFA accounts are tracked separately.
- As of September 13, 2025 we have raised \$733,812 toward our 2025 CFA goal of \$603,000, representing participation from 13.21% of our parishioners.

A Review of FY25 Goals

Focus on Our Youth and Young Adults—In FY25, we sent our youth to Covecrest Camp in Georgia. The Youth were able to fundraise to support this trip, providing more opportunities for them to engage with our Parishioners. This year, our Youth also participated in a Confirmation retreat and volunteer project, packaging 13,000 meals for Meals For Hope. Our Music Director, Edward Persin, continued to work with and develop the Children's Choir, which performed at Masses and other Parish programs. We continued our partnership with Children For the Arts, who performed Seussical Kids, Peter Pan, and the Wizard of Oz for parishioners and guests. We also had youth summer camps for basketball, volleyball, and pickleball. The Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts remained active, with weekly meetings, a Pinewood Derby, and numerous pancake breakfasts. St. John the Evangelist provided a home for the Naples Catholic Young Adult evenings as well as our own Young Adults Group. This goal will continue in FY26. We will increase participation in our 5:00pm Sunday Mass, develop a Youth choir, provide programs and activities for Youth in our Pulte Family Life Center, and find new partnerships in the Arts community. We will partner with our Scouts, engaging them in parish activities and programs. We will continue to provide opportunities for young adults to gather, serve, and socialize, becoming more involved in their parish and Faith.

Support Our Families – In FY25, we supported our families through increased programs and resources. We held programs such as movie nights, paint nights, seasonal parties, and family game nights. We also had our first post-pandemic Parish Picnic, with games, activities, and treats. Our Faith Formation team, led by Natalie Campbell, our Director of Religious Education, produced Adult Faith Formation programs such as Bible Studies, Well Read Mom, OCIA, and The Chosen discussion group. Youth Faith Formation programs included weekly classes for 400 children, retreats, and Vacation Bible School. Families also received support through Parent Prayer Night, a welcome back gathering, and tuition assistance provided to our students attending local Catholic schools. *In addition to continuing these programs, in FY26, we will provide more opportunities for youth to serve at Masses, welcome families to our Pulte Family Life Center for athletic and spiritual engagement, and host special programs such as Night in Bethlehem and a Parish Festival.*

Coordinate Catholic Connections - In FY25, St. John the Evangelist worked with the Diocese of Venice to create significant opportunities for Parishioners to engage in coordinated Catholic experiences. This included sending Youth to Covecrest Camp, Evangelization training, That Man Is You, a Young Women's Prayer group, a Men's Bible in a year group, Praise and Worship, 24-hour Adoration, a Legion of Mary group and a monthly Novena to our Sorrowful Mother. Our clergy continued to say Mass at Royal Palm Academy, visit the sick at NCH, and support Diocesan needs. St. John the Evangelist was selected by the Bishop to host this year's Chrism Mass, and we were one of five parishes chosen as a Jubilee Site. *In FY26*, we will continue to provide opportunities for all parishioners to connect deeper with their Catholic faith.

Complete Facilities Improvements – In FY 25, there was a focus on continued landscaping work and campus beautification. We landscaped the front of the property along 111th Ave; completed work in the Memorial Garden, including a new fountain and beautiful statue of our Blessed Mother; improved landscaping in front of the Pulte Family Life Center; completed renovation work to our Parish Office; and painted many of our interior spaces. We also broke ground on, and are nearing completion of the new rectory. *In FY26, we will replace our current exterior signage, install organ pipe facades in the Church, continue to improve security and safety measures throughout the campus, replace carpeting in our Nazareth room, and move our clergy into the rectory.*

Eucharistic Revival

The four pillars for St. John the Evangelist Year of Parish Revival are: Reinvigorate Worship, Personal Encounter, Robust Faith Formation, and Missionary Sending.

Reinvigorate Worship

Attentiveness to full preparation, reverent celebration, and offering many opportunities for parishioners to experience the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist more profoundly.

Personal Encounter



A stable life is difficult and a struggle. We help.



Interview with Carol Hollander, Executive Director of Providence House By Rosemary Erickson, Respect Life of St John the Evangelist

RE: Carol, can you give us an overview of Providence House?

Our mission statement best sums up what we are about: Providence House provides a faith-based transitional housing and self-sufficiency program for motivated women with young children who are

homeless or at risk of being homeless. I emphasize the importance of the mother being motivated and also that we can take only young (10 and under) children.

RE: Please give us examples of how you have helped the residents.

We refer to other organizations that are able to help our mothers with mental health issues stemming from abuse and other stress related issues. We have in-house parenting and financial classes (teaching even the basics such as writing a check and keeping track of their bank account). Residents work one-on-one with a Case Manager to develop a plan for success. We offer spiritual classes – Bible studies. Please know that we accept residents, regardless of their faith backgrounds.

RE: I'm sure you have seen an impact on the lives of your residents. Can you share some success stories?

Two mothers come to mind: A young Mexican mother, with a tiny baby who was sleeping on the floor, came and through the help that was offered to her, she was able to get a good job and receive her U.S.Citizenship.She also was approved for a "Habitat" home. Within the last six months, three residents of Providence House have received approval for Habitat for Humanity homes. We had a married mother, with a 2 yr old and 6 yr old, who was in an abusive situation, living out in Golden Gate Estates and without a vehicle to even get food for her family. She was holding down two minimum wage jobs when she came to us. Her children received scholarships to attend catholic schools and she presently has a career in banking as a personal banker.

RE: What is Providence House's great need at this time and how can we help?

All of our resident's units and the Community Center facility were greatly affected by the flooding during Hurricane Ian. We are still working on some of the units, but especially our Community Center. When the renovations are complete we will need desks, tables, computers, etc, but presently we need supplies for each unit (linens, kitchen supplies, even paper products) and gifts cards (from Walmart, Target, Dollar Stores, Amazon, Publix, etc.) Our website will provide more information on our needs.

RE: How is Providence House supported?

We receive no government funding. All of our donations come from individuals, grants, churches, family foundations and other non-profit organizations.

RE: What are some of your greatest challenges?

We are anxiously waiting to have all the renovations completed so we can get back to utilizing the community center for the resident's needs.


RE: Is there anything that you would like to share with us that hasn't been covered?

We are so thankful for the tremendous generosity of the people in our community who have given to us throughout our 20 years. We have been a recipient of "Ask and you shall receive" in every way imaginable.

Representatives from our Respect Life Ministry with Fr Mark recently visited the Providence House. We saw beautiful fully furnished duplex apartments surrounded by massive shade trees. There was a playground for the children and also a lovely Prayer Garden. We found Providence House to be most welcoming.
