SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY



The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

Weekly Divine Mercy Reflection

"Reflections on Divine Mercy" provides an awakening to the abundant Mercy of God. It offers reflections and prayers to assist us in understanding the Mercy poured forth from the Heart of Jesus as it is revealed in the writings of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska. These gems are selected from the book titled "Daily Reflections on Divine Mercy, 365 Days with Saint Faustina" John Paul Thomas (Stockbridge, MA)

Reflection 32: The Mercy of Forgiveness

Throughout life you will be hurt by the sins of others. This is inevitable. The real question to ponder is what you do with this hurt. Will you hold onto it and brew over it? Or will you forgive? But forgiveness is not enough. You must let the Divine Mercy so enter your soul that you not only forgive, but also allow this Mercy to fill your heart with compassion. You must let God's Mercy inspire you to love deeply. You must come to pray for those who have hurt you and, in doing so, dispense the grace of God to them. You are a dispenser of God's Mercy when you allow forgiveness to flow from your heart to the hearts of those who have hurt you (See Diary #31).

Humbly ponder your calling to be a dispenser of the compassion of the Heart of Jesus to those who have sinned against you. This is a

high calling and requires deep surrender and love. But it is the only way to freedom and is the only way God's Mercy will fill your own soul.





CANONIZATION:

Steps to Becoming a Saint Being named a saint in the Catholic Church is a very high hono

Being named a saint in the Catholic Church is a very high honor. It means the saint's name is added to the official catalogue of saints, and that Masses and feast days can be celebrated in his or her honor. Churches can then be dedicated in the saint's memory, and his or her name can be used in public prayers, such as litanies. What does it take for someone to be named a saint? The process is called *canonization* and it involves 4 major steps.

At least five years after a person's death (unless a special exception is made by the pope), a formal request is made to consider him or her for sainthood. The people making the request are usually from the candidate's church or religious community. They submit their request to the bishop of the diocese where the person died. The request tells how the person lived a life of holiness and lists reasons for considering the candidate for sainthood. If the bishop believes there is enough evidence to consider the person for sainthood, he asks the Vatican for permission to open a special tribunal. Witnesses are then called to attest to the candidate's goodness, holiness, devotion to God, and other virtues. If a person passes this step, he



or she is named a "Servant of God."

The bishop sends a formal report and request to Rome where it is reviewed by the Congregation for the Causes of the Saints. Nine theologians read the material and determine whether there is enough cause to pass it to the entire Congregation. If so, the candidate's writings and other aspects of his or her life are studied to make sure there is nothing that goes against the teachings and practices of the Church. As part of this investigation a person called a "devil's advocate" raises questions and objections to the candidate's sainthood. This is to make sure the final decision is complete and fair, and all evidence of the candidate's saintliness is assured. Once a candidate has been determined to be virtuous and heroic in his or her faith, he or she is declared "Venerable."



BEATIFICATION

The next step is beatification. If the candidate was a martyr, someone who died for their faith, he or she may be beatified and named "Blessed." Otherwise, a miracle brought about by the intercession of the saint must occur and be verified by the Congregation. Once the person is beatified and named "Blessed," he or she can be venerated, or officially honored, in his or her city, diocese, region, or religious community.

After being beatified, another miracle is required for the person to be canonized and officially declared a saint. Once again, the miracle must have occurred as a result of the person's intercession. The Prefect of the Congregation then sends the cause for canonization to the pope who makes the final decision. Once a person is canonized, he or she is officially declared a "Saint." The pope declares this in an official way at a special Mass in honor of the new saint.

The Holy Mass for the canonization of Blessed Carlo Acutis and Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati will be held on 7 September 2025 at 10:00 a.m. in St. Peter's Square. (4:00AM Florida time). The canonization of Acutis will be streamed live on EWTN. You also can find a livestream link on Saint-of-the-Month.com when it becomes available. Blessed Carlo Acutis



Carlo Acutis wasn't a saint from the past, he was a teenager of our time. He played video games, wore hoodies and jeans, loved animals, and knew how to build websites. But what made him stand out wasn't his tech skills or style, it was his radical love for Jesus in the Eucharist.

From the day he received his First Communion at age 7, Carlo didn't want to miss daily Mass. He said the Eucharist was his "highway to heaven", and he truly believed that Jesus was present in the consecrated Host and Wine. His faith wasn't theory, it was fire. And he lived it with joy, depth, and purpose.

Instead of using his digital talents to go viral or build a following, Carlo made a bold decision: he created a website to document and explain

Eucharistic miracles from around the world. While other teens were posting selfies, Carlo was posting stories of hosts that bled, turned into human flesh, and transformed hearts. His mission? To help people believe that Jesus is alive, truly present, and giving Himself to us in every Mass.

Carlo once said: "When we stand in front of the sun, we get tanned. But when we stand in front of Jesus in the Eucharist, we become saints."

His website became a digital exhibition that has now been translated into many languages and turned into a traveling exhibit that reaches millions across the globe. And it all started with a 15-year-old who lived like God was real, not just an idea.

Carlo died of leukemia in 2006, offering his suffering for the Pope and for the Church. He never complained. He wasn't afraid. He was ready for Heaven because he had lived close to Jesus.

Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati



Pier Giorgio Frassati was a young Italian layman whose short but radiant life continues to inspire the Church, especially the youth. He was born in Turin, Italy, on April 6, 1901, the son of Alfredo Frassati, founder and director of the newspaper La Stampa and a political leader, and Adelaide Ametis, a talented painter. He grew up with his sister Luciana in a home that was culturally rich but not particularly supportive of his deep spiritual fervor.

From an early age, Pier Giorgio showed a simple and steadfast piety. He joined Marian groups, obtained permission to receive daily Communion, still rare at the time, and centered his life on the Eucharist, the Virgin Mary, and works of charity. As a student of mining engineering at the Polytechnic of Turin, he deliberately chose this field to be close to workers and to serve Christ among the poor. He became a member of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and of Catholic Action, dedicating his free time and resources to helping

those in need. Pier Giorgio's life was not only prayer and study; he was full of joy, energy, and friendship. He loved the outdoors, particularly mountain climbing, which for him became a path of contemplation and evangelization. During one of his last climbs in June 1925, he wrote the words "Verso l'alto" ("to the heights") on the back of a photograph, a phrase that later became the motto of his life and spirituality, symbolizing his pursuit of holiness.

His spiritual journey deepened when he entered the Third Order of St. Dominic as a lay Dominican in 1922, taking the religious name Fra Girolamo, after Girolamo Savonarola. The Dominican charism of study, prayer, and preaching harmonized with his devotion to the Eucharist and the Rosary, and his passion for justice and service.

Pier Giorgio was also active in public life. He opposed the rise of fascism, defended human dignity, and engaged in student and civic movements. Known for his contagious humor, nicknames, and practical jokes, he combined an intense spiritual life with an approachable, cheerful personality that drew many friends closer to Christ.

In late June 1925, Pier Giorgio contracted polio, likely from his visits to the sick in poor neighborhoods. The disease advanced quickly. After a week of great suffering borne with serenity and faith, he died on July 4, 1925, at the age of 24. His funeral astonished the city of Turin: thousands of poor people whom he had helped secretly came to honor him, revealing to his family the extent of his hidden charity.

The cause for his canonization began in 1932. On May 20, 1990, Pope St. John Paul II beatified him, calling him the "Man of the Eight Beatitudes." His incorrupt body rests in the Cathedral of Turin, and he has become a patron and model for young people, students, and mountaineers. In the Holy Year 2025, he will be canonized together with Blessed Carlo Acutis on September 7, 2025.

More than his accomplishments, Pier Giorgio's legacy lies in the unity of prayer and action. He kept detailed notes of those he helped, reminded his friends that charity admits no delay, and lived every friendship as a path to holiness. His motto "Verso l'alto" was not just about mountain peaks, it was a call to live every day climbing toward God, bringing others along. Today, Pier Giorgio Frassati continues to inspire young Catholics worldwide to love the Eucharist, serve the poor, live friendship deeply, and seek holiness in everyday life. His joyful witness proves that sanctity is not reserved for long or extraordinary lives, but is possible through a daily, courageous, and joyful "yes" to Christ.






