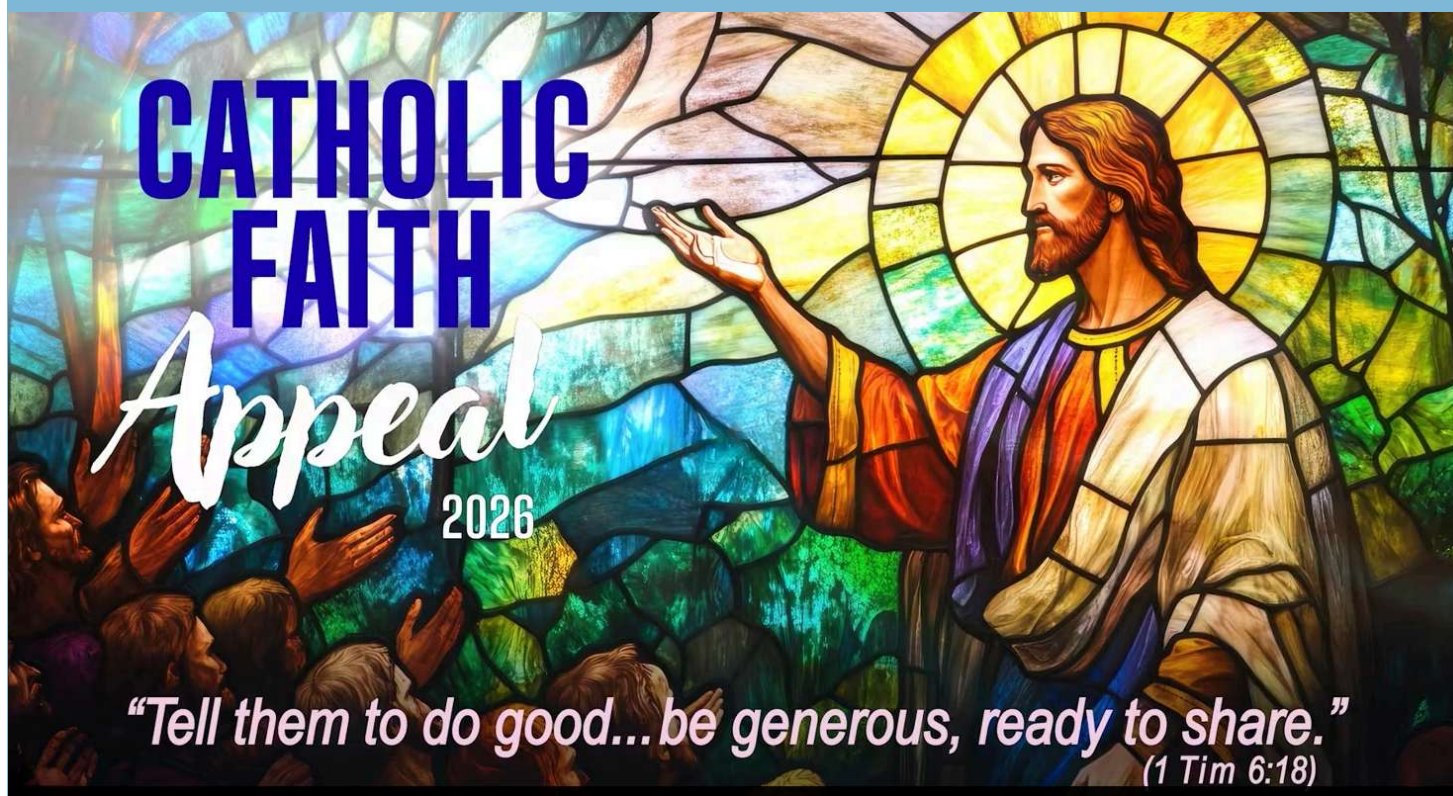

Catholic Faith Appeal

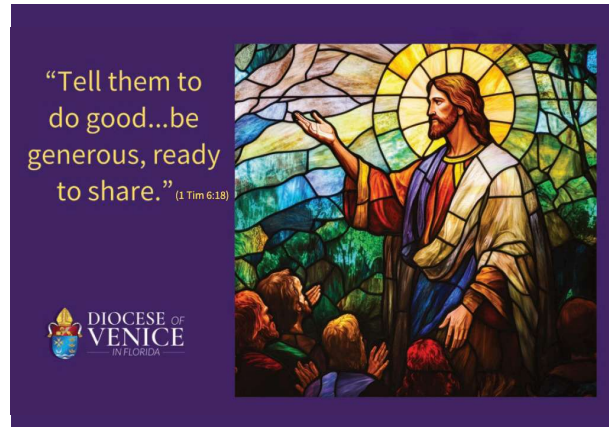
Dear Parish Family, In 2025, you contributed \$921,356 toward our Catholic Faith Appeal (CFA) goal of \$603,000! We can't thank you enough for your generosity and support. And, because we surpassed our goal, \$234,552 will come back to the parish to further support our programs and ministries. Additionally, \$79,598 will be donated to a charitable cause of our choice within our Diocese.

Now, once again, we have been called to work together toward our 2026 goal. The needs in our communities are more pressing than ever, and your support will directly help those in Southwest Florida. St. John the Evangelist has been assigned a goal of \$650,000 for 2026.

This year, we hope to also raise our household participation. In 2025, 15.52% of St. John the Evangelist households participated in our Catholic Faith Appeal, as compared to 17.23%-23.4% at our neighboring churches. With greater participation, we have the ability to do even more good works.

Programs supported by CFA include:

- **Religious Education:** Through our Religious Education Programs, children, youth, and adults are lovingly guided to deepen their knowledge of Our Lord. This may be in preparation to receive a Sacrament or to respond to Christ to be evermore faithful. Our dedicated catechists provide a nurturing environment where participants grow in their understanding of Scripture, Church Teachings, and Tradition. These programs are spiritual milestones that strengthen families, build communities, and deepen lifelong Discipleship. In Religious Education, this past year alone, the Diocese enrolled 9,935 K – 8 students to encounter Christ and His teachings at various levels. [The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults \(OCIA\)](#) is the official process for welcoming individuals and families into full communion with the Catholic Church. Last year alone, 552 individuals received this opportunity. This year, the numbers in OCIA in our Diocese has more than doubled, with over 1000 enrolled! OCIA is a faith-filled journey of conversion and formation. Participants come from diverse backgrounds and find a new spiritual home in the Catholic Church. Your support helps to provide resources for formation, training of catechists, opportunities for retreats, and programming that reaches those seeking to grow ever closer to Jesus Christ.
- **Vocations:** The Office of Vocations nurtures and guides individuals discerning a call to the priesthood or religious life. Through retreats, theological formation, and spiritual direction, the Office helps men and women explore their vocation with clarity and faith. By fostering a culture of vocations within Parishes and Schools, the next generation of servant leaders is inspired. [Seminarians](#) embark on a journey of spiritual, academic, personal, and pastoral formation. This path is not only rigorous but costs in excess of \$75,000 annually per seminarian. Your gift helps to ensure that financial burdens do not stand in the way of a vocation. The Diocese has 15 seminarians who are enrolled in their respective levels of academic formation. During the summer, the seminarians assist in parishes, instruct the young, pray with the community of the faithful and gain valuable pastoral experience. The Diocese is blessed to have [Religious Sisters](#) who willingly devote their lives to prayer, service and compassion as they quietly transform communities through faith education, healthcare where necessary, and spiritual assistance. Your support helps sustain the mission of the Sisters and honors their lifelong commitment to share the witness to the presence of Christ among those whom they assist. The [Permanent Diaconate](#), a vocation in the Catholic Church which allows men, including those who are married, to be ordained as Deacons to serve both at the altar and in the community. They proclaim the Gospel and assist in the Sacraments, where permitted. Deacons are called primarily to serve the Community of the Faithful.

- **Evangelization:** The Department of Evangelization serves as a vital resource for Parishes by fostering outreach programs across the Diocese. Through endeavors like Theology on Tap for young adults, Totus Tuus summer catechetical program for children and teens, and Diocesan-wide events such as Youth Adoration Nights, the Annual Rosary Congress, and the Annual Youth Rally, the Department helps thousands encounter Christ and grow in Discipleship. These initiatives strengthen Catholic identity, build community, and inspire missionary action among all ages. This Department spreads the Gospel by drawing hundreds of participants to initiatives that support personal, parochial, and Diocesan challenges. The most recent Annual Rosary Congress involved parishioners from every Parish within the Diocese of Venice. Blessed with growing involvement of youth within the Diocese, your support empowers this growing teen population to deepen their faith and become strong, committed Catholics. This past year, over 2,000 young adults took part in the Annual Youth Rally.
- **Catholic Schools:** Rooted in Gospel values, our bold Christ-centered mission of educating the whole child nurtures the mind, body, and soul. Diocese of Venice Schools have enjoyed impressive growth over the past five years; a 49% increase in enrollment makes us the fastest growing Diocesan School System in the country. Formed in Faith and educated for excellence, our students have Catholic virtues integrated into every subject and every school activity from preschool to high school. This rigorous, virtue-based curriculum is called “The Gifts of Christ: Truth, Beauty, Goodness, Affability, Fortitude, Humility, and Prudence.” Our Schools, Pastors, principals, and teachers provide the outstanding Catholic Education expected by parents and parishioners. The result is that our Schools produce compassionate leaders who live out their faith for the Church and the world. STREAM is an acronym for Science, Technology, Religion, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics. Every student in every school is trained in engineering and robotic concepts through access to cutting-edge technology and hands-on learning. The emphasis on Faith is matched by academic success with many of our students reading two-grade levels above the National Average. Each year, our graduates are accepted into the finest educational institutions in the country.

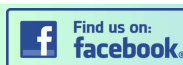

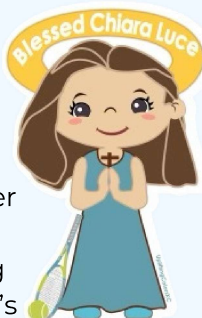

SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY



The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprints):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist





To maintain the dignity of our Memorial Garden, permanent plants, artificial flowers, statues, balloons, pinwheels, vigil lights, breakable objects, rocks, food, and alcohol are not permitted on the memorial markers. Additionally, we do not permit adornments that are considered hazardous to personnel caring for the area. We welcome fresh-cut flowers throughout the year. Once flowers have withered, we will remove them. Flowers may also be removed for routine mowing or maintenance, if needed. Thank you for helping to maintain the dignity of our Memorial Garden.

Best Practices for email Security

There has been an increase in email impersonation and phishing attempts that are targeting many organizations around the world. These activities aim to trick people into giving away their personal and sensitive information or engaging in harmful actions. SJECC has recently been a target of these kinds of attacks. To keep your organization and its parishioners safe, it is essential that we all take some precautions when reviewing emails. Here are best practices when it comes to email security:

1. **Verify the Sender:** Do not click on links or attachments from senders that you do not recognize. Be especially wary of .zip or other compressed or executable file types.
2. **Do Not Provide Sensitive Information:** Do not provide sensitive personal information (like usernames and passwords) over email.
3. **Avoid Opening Suspicious Emails:** Be wary of emails from unknown senders, especially those with suspicious subject lines, grammar, or requests for personal information. Do not click on links or download attachments from untrusted sources.
4. **Inspect URLs carefully:** Inspect URLs carefully to make sure they're legitimate and not imposter sites. You can hover over or right click a hyperlink to preview the link address before clicking.
5. **Do Not Open Unexpected Documents:** Do not try to open any shared document that you're not expecting to receive.
6. **Read the Warnings:** Be especially cautious when opening attachments or clicking links if you receive an email containing a warning banner indicating that it originated from an external source.
7. **Report Suspicious Emails:** Report any suspicious emails to our IT security team right away (help@myryc.com). If you are using Outlook from the Desktop, you can do this quickly and easily by selecting the message and choosing "Report message" from the top menu. From there, you can select "Phishing" or "Junk" as appropriate.
8. **Do not respond to requests to purchase gift cards:** "Fr. Tom" will never request that you purchase gift cards on his behalf, especially via email. These emails always originate from an email address that is not Fr. Tom's (his actual email is frtom@sjecc.com)



Security Procedure Update

For the safety, comfort, and peace of mind of all who gather for Mass, we want to inform you of an important update to our Parish security procedures. All Church doors will be locked once Mass begins. This step is being taken as part of our ongoing commitment to providing a safe and prayerful environment for everyone in our community.

If you happen to arrive after the doors have been secured, please do not worry — an usher will be stationed at the main entrance of the Church to assist you and allow you to enter quietly so that you can join the celebration of the Eucharist without disruption.

We understand that this is a change from our usual practice, and we appreciate your patience and cooperation as we implement this measure. Our goal is not to create barriers, but to ensure that all who come to worship can do so with a sense of security and peace.

Thank you for your understanding, your support, and your continued prayers for the safety and well-being of our parish family. Together, we can keep our Church a place of welcome, reverence, and protection.

THE CATECHETICAL COLUMN

Question: Who determines the order of the Mass?

Answer: The Mass has two main parts: the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. From the very beginning, the basic shape of the Mass comes from Jesus Himself and was handed on by the Apostles. The Mass is not something the Church makes up or changes at will. Rather, the Church receives it, protects it, and hands it on. Over time, some details of how the Mass is celebrated have developed, but its heart and structure remain the same. The responsibility for guarding and regulating the Mass belongs to the Pope, together with the bishops, so that Catholics throughout the world are celebrating the same sacred liturgy.

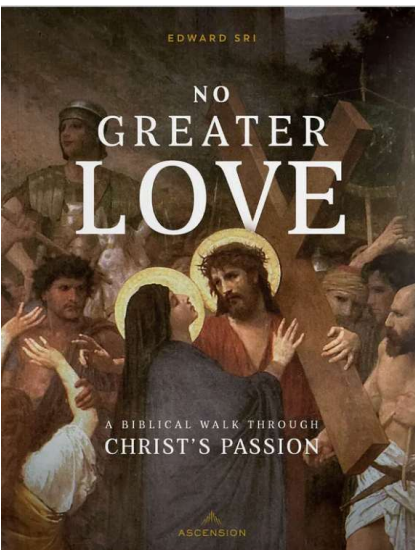

Her work emphasizes the role of spirituality as a protective factor in wellness and human development.

Dr. Danilo started her own consulting business, Life Courses, LLC, in 2010 after arriving at the conclusion that compelling research needed to be disseminated and presented to laypersons in an engaging and useful format. Mariette has presented educational experiences and retreats for the Council of Southeast Pennsylvania as well as Church seminarians, newly ordained priests, men and women Religious, diocesan priests, deacons and their wives, and the United States Air Force chaplains. These programs include topics in health compromising behaviors, stress management, setting boundaries with forgiveness, resilience, conflict transformation, and more. She has completed a series of twenty-eight podcasts called, The Wellness Journey that are aimed at keeping listeners healthy in mind, body and spirit. These include topics such as resilience, gratitude, humor, and navigating through the covid-19 pandemic and its fallout. These can be found at sjvcenter.org/resources. Dr. Danilo presents current research on healthy marriages and family life, speaks to parents about raising children in a challenging world and implements programs that educate teenagers about navigating the college environment and young adulthood. Mariette conducts programs and workshops on topics in Grace-filled Aging, as well as facilitates focus groups and training workshops for teachers, staff members, and those in leadership roles.

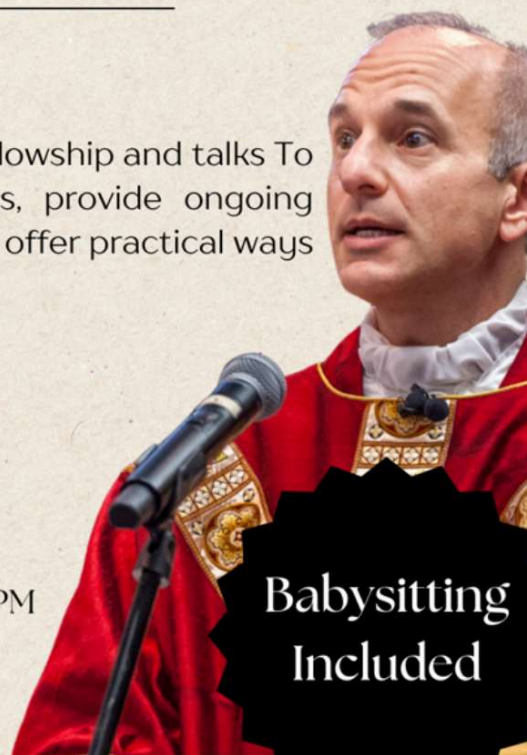
