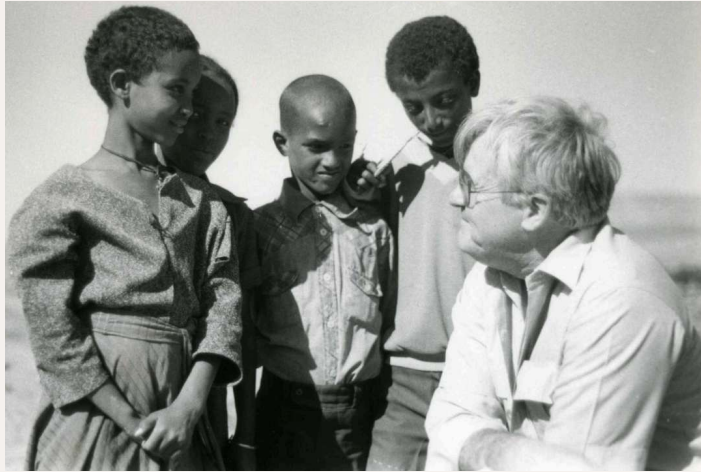

Monsignor Robert Coll

August 13, 1930 - April 20, 2026

The priest who created Rice Bowl — which became Catholic Relief Services' annual Lenten program of prayer, fasting and almsgiving for humanitarian aid — has died at age 95.

Msgr. Robert J. Coll, a retired priest of the Diocese of Allentown, Pennsylvania, died April 20 in Naples, Florida.

He had relocated to the Diocese of Venice in 1999, and had for the past 25 years assisted at St. John the Evangelist Parish and St. Agnes Parish, both in Naples.

Nearly \$350 million raised over 5 decades

Over the past five decades, Rice Bowl has raised “nearly \$350 million for poverty and hunger alleviation programs around the world and here at home,” said CRS president and CEO Sean Callahan in an April 27 statement on Msgr. Coll’s death.

Callahan expressed “deep sorrow” over the loss of Msgr. Coll, describing him as “a visionary priest whose legacy of faith and service will endure for generations through CRS Rice Bowl.”

“We give thanks for a priest whose life was a gift poured out in service,” Bishop Alfred A. Schlert of Allentown told OSV News in an April 28 statement, noting the priest’s “legacy in the Diocese of Allentown will endure through the countless lives touched by his compassion, leadership, and unwavering faith.”

Rice Bowl — to which participants contribute from funds saved through fasting or preparing meatless meals — benefits millions in more than 100 countries.

25% of funds go to local food programs

Of each year’s collection, 75% supports humanitarian programs operated by CRS, the official relief and development agency of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. The remaining 25% assists local efforts to eradicate hunger.

The outreach began with a Lenten project Msgr. Coll launched while he was pastor of St. Thomas More Parish in Allentown — and ultimately led the Pennsylvania-born priest across the world, bringing him face-to-face with the most impoverished.

In a 2021 interview with CatholicPhilly, the newspaper of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, Msgr. Coll recalled that “the idea was simple.”

“I have food, my brother has no food, so I will give him some of my food,” said Msgr. Coll. He recalled in the interview that he had encouraged his parishioners to “eat a truncated meal, maybe soup and a sandwich, and take the difference between that and what you would have spent as a kind of symbolic” form of aid.

In Loving Memory

Creation of Rice Bowl date to 1976

“While our little group was designing this project in the basement of the world, the Archdiocese of Philadelphia was planning its Eucharistic Congress,” said Msgr. Coll, who was contacted by then Msgr. (and later Cardinal) John P. Foley, editor of *The Catholic Standard and Times* (the print predecessor of *CatholicPhilly*) and a pioneer in Catholic communications.

Rice Bowl was a providential fit for the congress’ theme, “The Eucharist and the Hungers of the Human Family,” which — with the blessing of St. Paul VI — aimed to explore humanity’s physical and spiritual hungers, Msgr. Coll recollected.

Philadelphia Cardinal John J. Krol and CRS soon endorsed Rice Bowl, and by 1976, at least 118 U.S. Catholic dioceses had raised over \$5.1 million.

The iconic cardboard box, a Lenten fixture in U.S. Catholic households, became Msgr. Coll’s ticket to the devastated communities he’d sought to help.

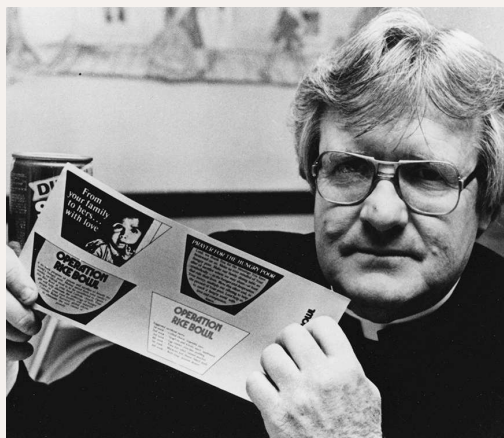
Commitment to global Church

Callahan pointed to Msgr. Coll’s “commitment to the global Church,” which “was never more evident than when he answered the call in 1983 and traveled to Ethiopia to lead the Joint Relief Partnership for the Church’s response to the devastating famine.”

“His presence on the ground was a turning point — bringing urgency, organization, and humanity to CRS’ response at a moment when the world desperately needed them,” said Callahan.

Travels to Yemen, Poland, Lebanon

The CRS missions also saw Msgr. Coll travel to Yemen, Poland and Lebanon. He met with St. Teresa of Calcutta and brought relief supplies to several of her Beirut-based Missionaries of Charity sisters, whom he found sheltering “in a bombed-out building” during Lebanon’s long-running civil war. “The more funds you receive from the people, the greater pressure you put on governments to assist in a variety of ways,” he said.



Msgr. Coll said that “the idea of Operation Rice Bowl itself is an appeal for the world.

“If you spell out the initials, it’s ‘O.R.B.’ — Latin for ‘world,’” he said.

He noted that the funds realized through Rice Bowl “enabled you to do more with the international community,” since “you could substantiate and put in progress programs immediately” through “the backing of the international community, including Caritas Internationalis,” the official humanitarian network of the universal Catholic Church, which has a presence in most nations.

In Loving Memory

'People understood what you were trying to do'

Msgr. Coll told OSV News that he believed "the satisfaction (of Rice Bowl) comes from the fact that the people understood what you were trying to do.

"In other words, if there were grave problems in the world, to ignore them would itself be unacceptable as a Catholic and as a Christian," he said.

Msgr. Coll stressed that he had envisioned Rice Bowl as a way of uniting families during Lent, with the meatless meals accompanied by Scripture and reflection.

'An informative experience for the family'

"My great fear was that it would become a collection," he admitted. "It was never intended to be a collection. It was intended to be an informative experience for the family."

In his statement, Callahan said Rice Bowl "gave U.S. Catholics a way to live the Church's call to solidarity — recognizing the God-given dignity of every person and the shared responsibility to care for our neighbors, especially those living in poverty — so we might truly feel connected to our sisters and brothers across borders and oceans.

"Millions of families use the program each year to put their faith into action and become one global Catholic family," said Callahan.

His faith never wavered," his enthusiasm never faded. And the warmth and inspiration he gave to those around him lives on in every Rice Bowl collected and every hungry family fed.

A Mass of Christian Burial will take place at 11:00am on Tuesday, May 12th with visitation and the Rosary in the Church beginning at 10:00am. Then, please join us for a reception in the ballroom following.

SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years". The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel are not present). St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprinting):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

Weekly Divine Mercy Reflection

Reflection 63: How do You Speak to Others?

When speaking to others, the love and Mercy of God must flow from our lips. But how? What should our speech look like? One way to examine our speech to others is to look at it in the light of how we should speak to God. When speaking to God we should speak with honesty, simplicity, humility and confidence. Think of a sincere child praying to God. This pure soul exudes these qualities well. So should we. And if we speak to God with these qualities, they will also be a good guide in our speech to others (See Diary #215).

Reflect upon the people and conversations that you have. Do you speak from pride or sarcasm? Do you struggle with gossip or carelessness? Think about what your speech would look like if it were honest, simple, humble and confident in God's grace. Joy will be present in each conversation guided by these virtues.

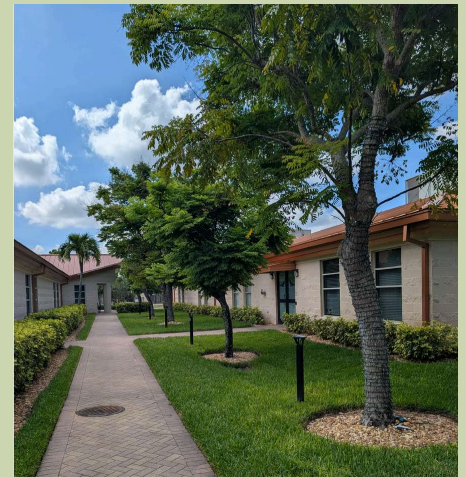

By proclaiming a Jubilee Year of St. Francis and offering an indulgence, the Pope is calling on the faithful to transform their lives and become "a model of holiness" in the example of St. Francis of Assisi. God's mercy means that any sin we confess will be forgiven. We also believe in God's justice, which means that penance or reparation is needed to repair the harm caused by sin. One form of penance is the Catholic Church's practice of indulgences, a means of restoring justice and purifying the soul.

How to Receive a Plenary Indulgence

Baptized Catholics can receive an indulgence during certain occasions as determined by the Church, such as this year's Jubilee of St. Francis. The Church prescribes specific actions to be taken to receive the indulgence and to conform the heart closer to Christ. In this article, we outline these actions and provide answers to frequently asked questions about the Jubilee Year of St. Francis. Here are the six steps for receiving a plenary indulgence during the Franciscan Jubilee Year:

1. Visit in the form of a pilgrimage any Franciscan conventual church or place of worship named after St. Francis or connected to him for any reason.
2. Spend time in meditation and prayer, focusing on the example of St. Francis, his love for all and his zeal for peace among people.
3. Pray the following: Our Father, Nicene Creed, Invocations to the Blessed Virgin Mary, St Francis of Assisi, St Clare and saints of the Franciscan Family, Intentions of Pope Leo XIV
4. Detach yourself from all sin, even venial.
5. Participate in sacramental confession.
6. Receive Holy Communion.

Opportunities for the Homebound

The homebound and their caregivers can also receive a plenary indulgence provided they are detached from any sin and intend to fulfill the three usual conditions (sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father) as soon as possible. They must join spiritually in the jubilee celebrations of the Year of St. Francis, offering their prayers and sufferings to God.

Jubilee Year of St. Francis

Why is 2026 a Jubilee Year of St. Francis?

According to Pope Leo XIV in his letter to the General Ministers of the Conference of the Franciscan Family, "Eight centuries have passed since the death of the Poverello of Assisi, who wrote the word of Christ's salvation indelibly in the hearts of the people of his time. May the example and spiritual legacy of this Saint, strong in faith, steadfast in hope and ardent in active charity towards his neighbor, inspire in everyone the importance of trusting in the Lord, of living a life faithful to the Gospel, and of accepting and illuminating every circumstance and action of life with faith and prayer."

What is an indulgence?

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "An indulgence is obtained through the Church who, by virtue of the power of binding and loosing granted her by Christ Jesus, intervenes in favor of individual Christians and opens for them the treasury of the merits of Christ and the saints to obtain from the Father of mercies the remission of the temporal punishments due for their sins. Thus, the Church does not want simply to come to the aid of these Christians, but also to spur them to works of devotion, penance, and charity" (#1478).

What are the dates of the Jubilee Year of St. Francis?

According to a decree issued by the Apostolic Penitentiary, a key Vatican office that oversees indulgences: "His Holiness Pope Leo XIV, Minister of our faith and our joy, establishes that, from January 10, 2026, to coincide with the closing of the Ordinary Jubilee, until January 10, 2027, a special Year of St. Francis may be proclaimed, in which every Christian faithful, following the example of the Saint of Assisi, may himself become a model of holiness of life and a constant witness of peace."



The Year of St. Francis will be realized in the Diocese of Venice in a particular way, as the Diocese is blessed to have a Parish named for this saint. St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church in Grove City, located at 5265 Placida Road, has been designated by Bishop Frank J. Dewane as a Jubilee site, and will be welcoming pilgrims throughout the Jubilee Year for Mass, visits, and special events and activities. The Church Sanctuary and Poor Clare Adoration Chapel will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays to welcome pilgrims, and at other times by arrangement. 

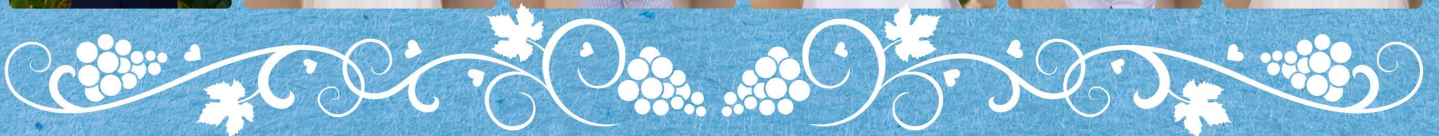
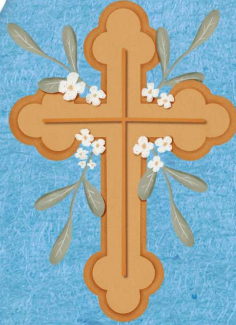

THE CATECHETICAL COLUMN

Question: Is it a mortal sin to miss Mass?

Answer: In a previous column, we made the distinction between a mortal and venial sin. A mortal sin is a sin of grave matter committed with full knowledge and deliberate consent. Mortal sin involves a loss of charity and turning away from God, and it can be remedied through the sacrament of Confession.

According to Canon 1247, the faithful are obliged to participate in Sunday Mass and holy days of obligation. If a person deliberately fails in this obligation, the Catechism says they commit a grave sin. Whether it is mortal sin depends on whether the person had full knowledge and deliberate consent and was not excused by a serious reason such as severe illness or something that makes attendance impossible or very difficult.

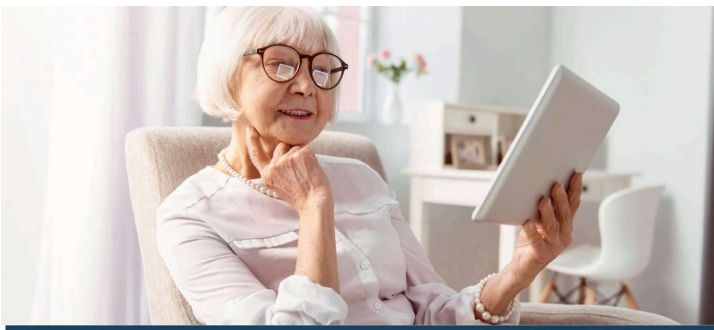
