SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY

The Diocese of Venice states that, "all employees, covered volunteers and religious brothers and sisters must be electronically fingerprinted. Eligibility for employment/ volunteer work/ministry will be contingent and conditioned upon a satisfactory background investigation. A reasonable effort shall be made to update the criminal history background information every five (5) years".

The Diocese classifies a covered volunteer as "any unpaid adult person engaged or involved in a Diocesan activity in which he/she is entrusted with the care and supervision of children or allowed unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults" (e.g. when screened personnel are not present).

St. John the Evangelist also requires the following volunteers to go through the background screening process (through fingerprinting):

- Volunteers who handle cash, credit cards, and other financial transactions
- Volunteers who are entrusted with confidential information, such as donor records and parish registration forms
- Volunteers who serve, distribute, and administer the Holy Eucharist

Weekly Divine Mercy Reflection

Reflection 67: Hidden Roses of Love

Some acts of love are meant to be shared only between lovers. Acts of the utmost intimacy and self-giving are precious gifts of love shared in the secrecy of a relationship of love. This is also the case with our love of God. We should regularly look for ways to express our most profound love of God in ways that are known only to Him. In return, God will lavish merciful graces upon us, interiorly, known to us alone. These mutual exchanges of love are powerfully transforming to a soul and the source of the greatest delight (See Diary #239).

Reflect, today, upon the intimacy of your relationship with our merciful God. Do you take great delight in showering Him with Your love? Do you do so, regularly, in the secrecy of your heart. And do you open yourself to the countless ways that God bestows these graces of love upon you?

Lord, may my interior acts of love for You be as a rose I place before Your Divine Heart. May I delight in offering You my love and may I rejoice, always, in the secret and profound ways that You lavish Your love upon me. Jesus, I trust in You.

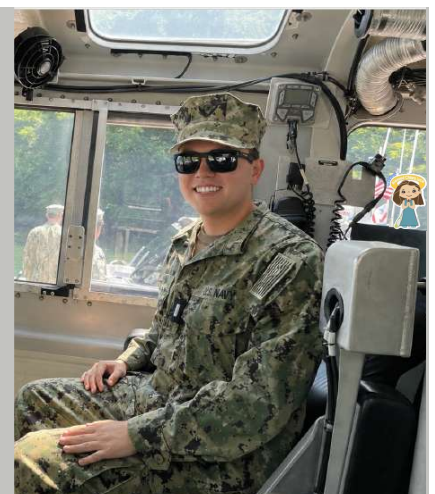

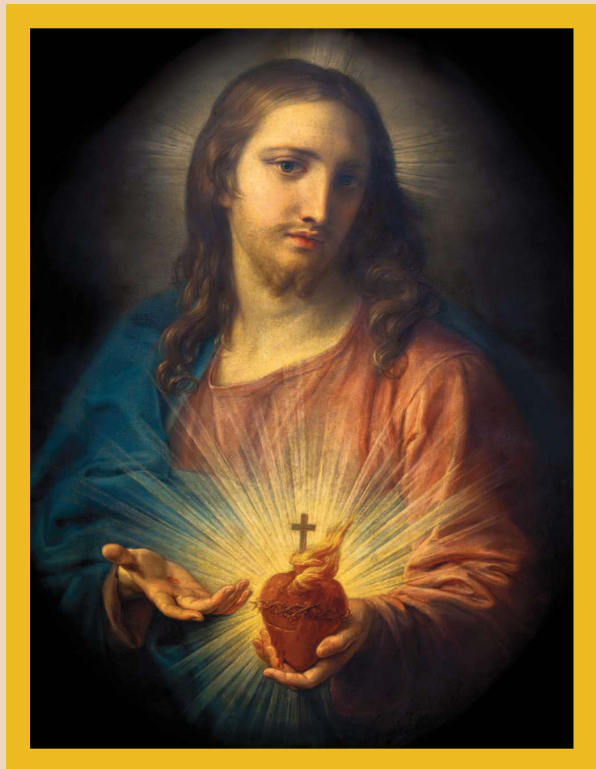

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS PILGRIM ICON



When we think of the human heart, we call to mind the admirable qualities of love and devotion, as well as courage, faithfulness and sacrifice. When we think of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, we see all these virtues and many others raised to perfection. At the same time, the image of the Sacred Heart is not intimidating; rather, it draws us toward itself. Though perfect, Our Lord's heart remains a human heart, and an accessible bridge between God and humanity.

For centuries, devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus has been central in the life of the Church, focusing on the divine love of our Savior expressed in the familiar human qualities of the heart. As the Knights of Columbus launches its new Pilgrim Icon Program centered on the Sacred Heart, we see a providential confluence of events. It comes amid the steady expansion of our Cor initiative, which takes its name from the Latin word for

heart and invites every Knight to deepen his charity through a more intentional life of prayer, formation and fraternity. In October 2024, Pope Francis issued his fourth encyclical, *Dilexit Nos* (He Loved Us), which is focused on the Sacred Heart of Jesus and resonates perfectly with the Cor initiative and our mission as Knights. Pope Francis writes, "St. John Henry Newman took as his motto the phrase *Cor ad cor loquitur*, since, beyond all our thoughts and ideas, the Lord saves us by speaking to our hearts from his Sacred Heart" (§ 26). The Holy Father also notes, "In union with Christ, amid the ruins we have left in this world by our sins, we are called to build a new civilization of love" (§ 182).

In many ways, *Dilexit Nos* can serve as a mission statement for the Knights of Columbus in today's world. The pope observes that we live in a fragmented and divided society, but the heart of Christ is a unifying center. It is the source of truth and goodness that we all need.

The Holy Father's encyclical and our new Pilgrim Icon Program both coincide with the Church's commemoration of the 350th anniversary of the visions of the Sacred Heart received by the French nun St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, who has given us the Twelve Promises of the Sacred Heart and the First Friday devotions. In one of the apparitions, Our Lord told her: "Behold this Heart which has so loved men that it has spared nothing, even to exhausting and consuming itself, in order to testify its love."

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS PILGRIM ICON

There is a strong connection between the Knights of Columbus and devotion to the Sacred Heart, beginning with our Blessed Founder, Father Michael McGivney, who clearly had personal devotion to the Heart of Christ. An image of the Sacred Heart was found among his family's belongings after his death, so we know he grew up with the devotion, which grew in popularity in the 19th century. Though only 13 letters in his own hand have come down to us, it is significant that he signed one of them, "Yours truly in the S.H." — an abbreviation for the Sacred Heart. Indeed, the French Jesuit, Vincentian and Sulpician priests who oversaw his seminary formation in Canada and the U.S. all had a devotion to the Heart of Jesus, which they undoubtedly encouraged in Michael McGivney and his seminary confreres. We can see evidence of that devotion in perhaps the most evocative example of McGivney's priestly ministry — his extraordinary pastoral care for Chip Smith, who approached the gallows accompanied by Father McGivney, with the penitent prisoner wearing a cloth badge of the Sacred Heart, entrusting himself to divine mercy. And, finally, Father McGivney himself was buried with a depiction of the Sacred Heart, which is on display with his burial vestments in the Blessed Michael McGivney Pilgrimage Center in New Haven, Connecticut.

The particular image chosen for the Pilgrim Icon is the most famous depiction of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, painted in 1767 by Pompeo Batoni and now venerated in the Church of the Gesù in Rome — the mother church of the Society of Jesus, which evokes the Jesuits' longstanding resolve "to practice, promote and propagate devotion to His most divine Heart" (23rd General Congregation, Decree 46 – 1883). In Batoni's beautiful painting, Jesus holds out to us his heart, enflamed with love and wrapped in thorns, so we can meditate on the sacrifice of his passion and be engulfed in his love. Thus, we see that devotion to the Sacred Heart is profound yet simple. It reminds us of God's love for us and is meant to inspire our love in return.

As my brother Knights of Columbus bring reproductions of this beloved image to parishes around the world, I hope that they will invite their families — and all families — to consecrate their homes and themselves to the Sacred Heart. In the heart of Christ, we see the heart of the Father. And we ask Our Lord to help us make his heart our own, so that we may see and love in others what he sees and loves in us.

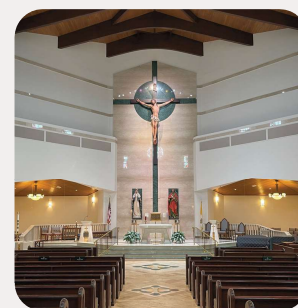

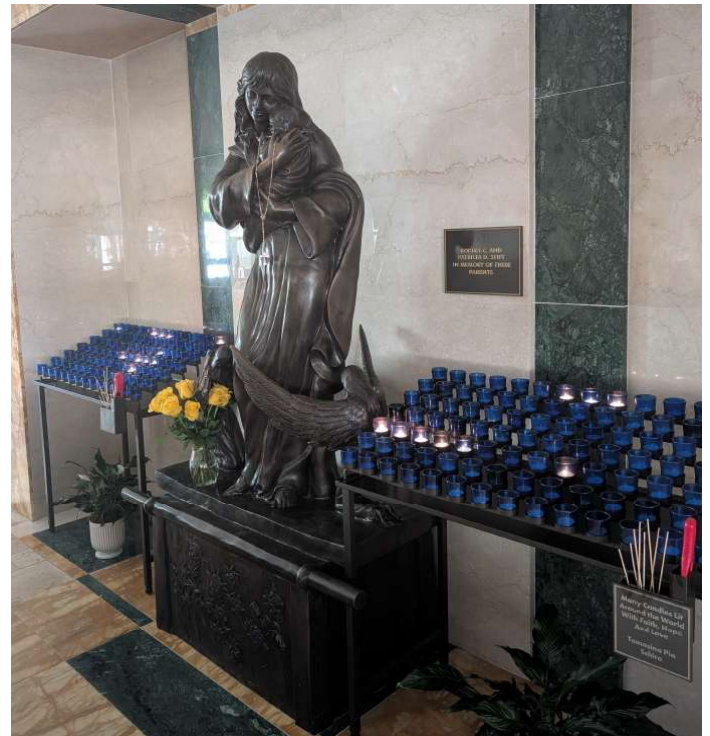
Offertory In Action

Invigorated by our faith, St. John the Evangelist lives our mission to Know, Love, and Serve God in His Church and Our Community. Your offertory donation supports the operations of our parish, including grounds and facilities maintenance, liturgical supplies and needs, Faith Formation programming, utilities, ministries, staffing, and more. When a second or special collection is designated, this supports the Diocesan and Universal mission of the Church.

Offertory supports the purchase and upkeep of **Prayer candles** in our Church. These candles represent Christ as the Light of the World, symbolize prayers extending into heaven, and act as a physical sacrifice of petition, thanksgiving, or solidarity with those for whom we pray.

- **Extended Prayer:** The term "votive" comes from the Latin votum, meaning a vow, wish, or promise. Lighting a candle acts as a physical extension of a prayer. Long after you leave the church, the burning flame symbolizes your continuous petition or intention rising to God.
- **Christ the Light:** Jesus said, "I am the light of the world". Lighting a candle places a physical representation of Christ's presence and hope in a dark world, especially when praying in front of a statue of a saint, the Virgin Mary, or the Tabernacle.
- **A Sacrificial Offering:** The flame is an offering or sacrifice. Traditionally, a small donation is placed in the coin box when lighting a votive candle. This offering offsets the cost of the candle while mirroring the biblical principle of giving from one's means to support the church's ministry.
- **Symbol of Solidarity:** Lighting a candle for a loved one—whether they are sick, deceased, or facing a difficult time—shows communal care. It visibly embodies the idea that you are carrying their intentions to the altar.

Over the past year, over 44,000 candles have been used in prayer! Thank you to our amazing volunteers who care for our candles and Sacristan Polly for maintaining our supplies.



Catholic Faith Appeal

Reaching our CFA goal is a wonderful accomplishment and we are so blessed to have such generous donors. And now that we have reached our goal, we have the opportunity to help our Diocese and our own parish even more!! Anything we collect over our goal, up to 25% over goal, comes back to our parish to support our ministries and programs. 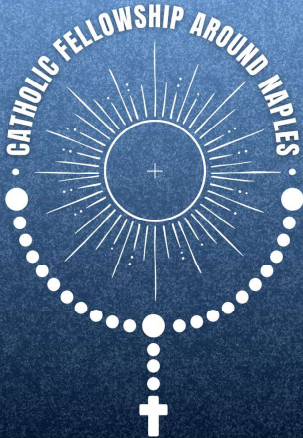

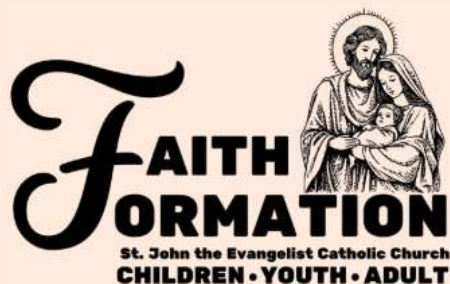

K-8 Faith Formation

We are pleased to offer Faith Formation sessions to our K-8 children in our parish. We have over 58 catechists who serve in our ministry. It is a blessing to have this time with children to encourage and support the faith of the family. Sessions are offered on Wednesdays from 5:00-6:15PM and Sundays from 9:30-10:45AM. New students to the program will need to submit a copy of their Baptism Certificate at the time of registration.



First Reconciliation & First Holy Communion Preparation

The Faith Formation Program, which runs from late August through early May, provides sacramental preparation for the youth of Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church. Specifically, to receive the sacraments of First Reconciliation and First Communion, children must be at least seven years old and in the second grade. Children must have a minimum of two consecutive years of religious instruction. Our curriculum includes preparation from Ascension Press RENEWED and RECEIVED.



PreK3 & PreK4- Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Atrium

The Saint John the Evangelist pre-school catechism class, based on the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, Level 1 program meets on Wednesday mornings from 9:45AM-11:45AM . NEW TIME for 2026-2027 School year! The program is under the direction of Charlotte A. Williams.

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is an approach to the religious formation of children. Level 1 is given to children from the ages of 3 years old up to 6 years old.

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd's (CGS) formation of the child is rooted in the Bible and Liturgy and is founded on the educational principles of Maria Montessori. The children gather in the "atrium", which is a room prepared for them containing simple yet beautiful materials that they use to help them absorb the most essential proclamations of our Catholic faith.

Faith Formation

High School Confirmation

Preparation for the sacrament of Confirmation is an exciting time for high school youth. Confirmation encompasses two years of preparation, typically in ninth and tenth grade. However, each program year often includes students in eleventh and twelfth grade who have not yet received this sacrament. We view the program as a journey, rather than a race. In this way, youth are afforded the opportunity to explore their faith at a reasonable pace, given the myriad of other obligations that occupy time in their lives. Students study the faith, choose sponsors to help them along their journey, and get to learn more about their chosen Saint, who will provide inspiration to each candidate through extraordinary stories of living the faith. Our confirmation program is open to ALL high school-age youth. We meet on Sunday afternoons from 3:45 – 6:00 p.m. approximately twice a month. As part of our class sessions, we attend Mass together, and families are welcome to join us. Video-based programs and direct instruction provide the framework for small, supportive formation groups. Youth attend 1 retreat per year and complete 4 Parish service hours per year as part of the preparation.

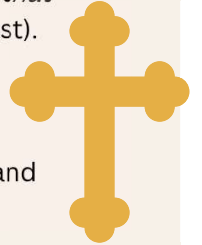
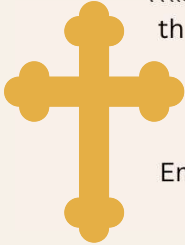
Question: Why do we sign ourselves at the Gospel?

Answer: At that moment, Catholics trace a small cross with their thumb on the Gospel book and then on their forehead, mouth, and breast, while responding, "Glory to You, O Lord." This gesture echoes what the priest or deacon is instructed to do: first he makes the sign of the cross on the book at the beginning of the Gospel and then on his own forehead, mouth, and breast, and the people do the same.

This gesture serves as a prayerful reminder that God's Word is meant to dwell in us wholly: that the Gospel may be in our mind (forehead), on our lips (mouth), and within our hearts (breast).
